## **Protecting the California Coast** JAN 17, 2019

Jennifer Savage, California Policy Manager for [Surfrider Foundation](#), an international organization that is dedicated to the protection and enjoyment of the world's ocean, waves, and beaches through a powerful activist network discusses Surfrider's efforts to protect the coastline. ## **Talking About the Bigger Picture of California's Legal Cannabis Industry** JAN 3, 2019

Are prohibitionary cities and counties unintentionally sanctioning the illegal cannabis market? Friends of the Eel River's Conservation Director Scott Greacen discussed this question with [HDL's](#) Cannabis Policy Advisor Mark Lovelace.

Legislation legalizing recreational cannabis in California provided robust local control by allowing cities and counties to choose their level of involvement with the new law. Given three options - to adopt the system as it stands, to modify it as they see fit, or to opt out completely - the majority of municipalities chose to opt out of the legal cannabis industry. The result is a continuing illegal market without competition. Lovelace comments that "embracing a well regulated legal industry is the best solutions to cleaning up the illegal market."
