Business and economic development officials in central Arkansas are voicing their disapproval of President Biden's executive order halting construction of the Keystone XL oil pipeline. Officials with the Port of Little Rock and the state Department of Commerce spoke about the order in a meeting of the Senate Agriculture, Forestry and Economic Development Committee today (Thurs). Little Rock Port Authority Executive Director Brian Day says the cancellation will affect industries beyond those directly involved in the pipeline's construction.

The port's largest company, the Indian pipe-maker Welspun, had received an order for over 1 million feet of pipe to go toward the Keystone XL Pipeline in August. The company announced at the time that would provide steady work for about 500 employees. President Biden issued the executive order halting the controversial project on his first day in office.

Local officials say President Joe Biden's executive order halting construction on the Keystone XL Pipeline could have an economic impact in Arkansas. He says his company, which had a contract to build over 1 million feet of the pipeline, won't be the only one that suffers from its cancellation.
