July 5 2022 – **MoR -** From the archive comes one of the more distinctive Homegrown Music sessions. The series' emphasis has been on regional artists, but

we occasionally invite some notable performers whose recordings have been featured on WVIA's Mixed Bag program. MoR are a duo from Iceland who consists of only electric bass and vocals. They do very distinctive and beautiful arrangements of everything from songs by Cyndi Lauper and Duran Duran to Icelandic folk music in this memorable 2007 session.

July 12 2022 – Drew Kelly - Scranton singer-songwriter Drew Kelly returns to Homegrown Music with his fourth collection of original songs in a solo acoustic setting. This session marks the first all-new Homegrown Music session since the start of the pandemic.

July 19 2022 – Mountain Wave - A trio of veteran rock musicians from the Upper Delaware River Valley who got together in 2015, Mountain Wave made their Homegrown Music debut in 2017 with first-rate original material than runs from roots-rock to jam-band influenced. August 16 2022 – Hickory Project - The bluegrass scene was saddened by recent news of the passing of mandolinist extraordinaire Anthony Hannigan, founder and long-time leader of the regionally-based, nationally touring bluegrass group Hickory Project. We remember Anthony with this encore of the group's live 2015 Homegrown concert.

August 23 2022 – Kristen Toedtman - A multi-faceted artist who has divided her time between Baltimore and Los Angeles, Ms. Toedtman has performed with The Los Angeles Philharmonic, The Philip Glass Ensemble, and even Frank Zappa. She has sung on the soundtracks to the animated films Frozen, Minions and Despicable Me 3. Her album of original songs Limbo was featured on WVIA's Mixed Bag. On this 2016 Homegrown Music appearance, she performs her jazzy original songs in a solo piano/vocal setting.

August 30 2022 – International Orange - An outstanding jazz-rock fusion quartet, comprising musicians who have worked as backing musicians with jazz and rock groups worldwide. Their 2019 album A Man and His Dog was featured on the Mixed Bag album review. They perform a mix of new material and altered arrangement of tunes from their album in this all-new segment.

September 27 2022 – **Water Street -** From Blairstown, NY, Water Street formed in 2011, and have released three albums so far. They often appear in the Poconos, and landed a performance on one of the main stages at the Bethlehem Musikfest. The group are known for their melodic, often folk-influence original music. They make their Homegrown Music debut with some new songs and rearrangements of earlier recordings in this all new 2022 session.

Rhett Miller still finds the freedom to experiment and play on 'The Misfit'

Even though his new album is called "The Misfit," Rhett Miller sounds like he's found exactly where he belongs. Written and recorded relatively quickly in upstate New York, the new songs are warm and thoughtful. They also glow with the contented energy of an artist who has established himself but still finds the freedom to experiment and play. In this session, you'll hear Rhett Miller perform some of those songs from that just-released album in front of an audience at World Cafe Live, and we talk about the making of the record, how much he missed live performances, his side hustle as a children's author — and lots more.

Joan Shelley's 'The Spur' is evocative, immediate — and a return to familiar ground

When Joan Shelley last visited the World Cafe, it was for her album Like the River Loves the Sea. The Kentucky singer-songwriter had left the comforts of home to write and record in Iceland. Her latest, The Spur, is an evocative and immediate album and a return to more familiar ground, as she reflects on starting a family with her longtime partner and now husband, Nathan Salsburg. Charley Crockett's 'The Man From Waco' is country music through an R&B lens

Charley Crockett has a new album. That's something we've said more than a few times over the last few years on the World Cafe — he's released 11 albums since 2015, and on Friday, his latest, The Man From Waco, drops. It's a bit different from previous releases, as he opted to work with a new producer, longtime manager Bruce Robison, and recorded entirely with his backing band, The Blue Drifters. He also aimed for a live-to-tape sound — everyone recording in the room, and you can feel it on the album. To celebrate the release, we're broadcasting a session from the stage of World Cafe Live, recorded earlier this spring. Peeling back the layers of Amanda Shires' life and musical career

The cover of Amanda Shires' new album, Take It Like A Man, is a black and white portrait of her. She is standing, shoulders to the camera, but with her head tilted ever so slightly to the side. She's looking directly into the lens, and while it's an image that exudes confidence, this isn't a simple power pose — you can see in her eyes that there's something more complex going on. And that's one of the things that's so fascinating about talking to Amanda: There's always another layer to explore. In this session, Shires shares some of what she's been thinking about and talks about getting to a place of confidence again after thinking she was finished with making music. She worked on her latest album with Lawrence Rothman, an indie pop artist who has also produced for folks like Courtney Love and Angel Olsen.

Hear the piano thought to be too perfect by Beethoven

In Vienna's Central Cemetery, there is a section devoted to the many composers, musicians and other important figures from Vienna's classical music heyday.

Almost all of the luminaries buried there — Beethoven, Mozart, Schubert, Brahms,

Strauss — are men, but if you look directly across from Beethoven's tomb, you'll find the gravestone of a remarkable woman named Nannette Streicher.

Streicher was a great friend of Beethoven's — but she was also a business innovator and expert piano maker. She was born in 1769 in the Bavarian city of Augsburg into a family of piano makers. Her dad, Johann Streicher, invented something called the Viennese action, simplifying the inner workings of the piano to make the keys more responsive so you could play faster and louder.

To find out what made her and her pianos so special, we visited the Museum of Science and Technology in Vienna, where a couple of her pianos still survive. We were welcomed by Peter Aufreiter, the director of the museum. Come along as we look and listen inside the museum.

'I Am The Moon' is Tedeschi Trucks at their finest and most adventurous

Tedeschi Trucks Band don't do small. The musical partnership of married duo Susan Tedeschi and Derek Trucks has grown in size and scope over the last 10 years. In 2021, they released a double-live album showcasing their performance at the Lockn' Festival, one where they covered Derek and the Dominos' Layla and Other Assorted Love Songs. Layla is one of the characters in the epic Persian poem The Story of Layla and Majnun, a tale of star-crossed lovers that Lord Byron called "The Romeo and Juliet of the East." It's also the inspiration for Tedeschi Trucks' most ambitious project yet, "I Am The Moon." "I Am The Moon" is a collection of 24 songs spread across four albums, each with a corresponding film. Released over the last four months, the albums are Tedeschi Trucks at their finest and most adventurous. We caught up with Derek and Susan to talk about the inspiration behind the collection. Our session kicks off with this live recording of "Hear My Dear."

8/24/22

DIVES is one of the most exciting new bands on Vienna's music scene

Today, we're taking you to Vienna today for our "Sense of Place" series. Vienna is known for classical music, but if you know where to look, you'll find a flourishing indie rock scene. And one of the most exciting new bands on that scene is called DIVES. The trio formed in 2016 when its members met at Austrian Girls Rock

Camp and won the XA Music Export Award, a prize that aims to support new bands — and that was before they'd even released their debut, Teenage Years Are Over, in 2019. This October, their second album, Wanna Take You There, comes out — so here's your chance to get into them before everyone else in North America does! In this session, you'll hear my conversation with DIVES recorded in front of an audience at FM4, the national public radio station that covers popular music in Austria. How Michaela Anne's 'Oh To Be That Free' resonates within each of us

A good album doesn't need a backstory. You put the music on, you experience the songs and it leaves an impression on you. However, knowing what led to and happened during the creation of an album can give you a deeper understanding of where the artist came from. It can help connect the unspoken dots of why it resonated with you.

That's the case with Michaela Anne's new album, "Oh To Be That Free." She was pregnant with her first child, getting ready to put the finishing touches on her fourth record, when she found out her mom had suffered a stroke, leaving her in a coma. And this was all under the shadow of a pandemic. It turns out the music Anne was making was just what she needed to hear herself, in an incredibly uncertain time. In this session, Michaela Anne joins me to talk about making "Oh To Be That Free," but first, a performance recorded live for the World Cafe. Elizabeth King records 'Give Me Wings' a cappella, in-studio with her daughters

Elizabeth King had her first hit, a song called "I Heard the Voice," in Memphis in the 1970s, fronting an all-male group called The Gospel Souls. Stepping away from her family of 15 children, she returned to music and released her first new album in over four decades, Living In The Last Days, last year. King was a guest on the Cafe, performing songs from the album and talking about her long journey back to releasing her debut album, even though she always had the calling to sing.

King recently released a new album of gospel music, called I Got A Love. She went into Studio B at Sam Phillips Recording in Memphis with her daughters, Betsy Spring, Sonjia James and Yolanda Sherrod, and recorded four songs, one of which is an a cappella live version of "Give Me Wings." The performances were recorded by Matt Ross-Spang, produced and mixed Bruce Watson, and feature Will Sexton on guitar and bass and Will McCarley on drums and percussion.
