News items from 3rd quarter of 2016

1 - News Subject: Prep and reaction to November Election

Date	Description
7/7	Chair of the Republican Party for the county, Bill Feehan, says the Clinton e-mail scandal will be fresh in the minds of voters heading to the polls in November
7/13	Julian Bradley, the former chair of the county's Republican Party, says a family emergency used up his vacation time and he won't be able to go to Donald Trump's nominating convention.
7/21	A federal judge ruled to allow a signed affidavit in place of a photo ID for voting purposes. No rules yet on how that system would work. Donald Trump is now the official nominee of the GOP. Dan Kapanke welcomes Trump, but believes there's a lot of work down-ballot still to be done.
7/22	As a national delegate for the Democratic Party, Democratic Chair for the county Vicki Burk expects Clinton's speech to be focused on policy, not personal attacks. County Clerk Ginny Dankmeyer says the affidavit rule will require a signature and a reason for why a voter doesn't have a photo ID. Valid reasons would be because of a lack of transportation or bad work schedule not allowing access to the required process to obtain one.
7/25	E-mail leaks indicate Democratic Party leadership worked to rig the system to prevent Bernie Sanders from gaining the nomination. Dr. Joe Heim from the UW-L political science department says Sanders was a long shot to begin with, and did better than expected despite the deck being stacked against him.
7/28	Vicki Burke doesn't think the Clinton server scandal will continue to plague the nominee.
7/29	Donald Trump claims Clinton's optimistic speech was "from a fantasy universe." Former Senator Russ Feingold says voters who want a good economy and health care say there was no fantasy involved.
8/1	LaCrosse County Clerk Teri Lehrke says she expects to get more information from the state later this week on what the latest judicial ruling mean for the voter ID law. Steve Doyle, running for another assembly term, says the issues he hears about most are roads and schools. Additionally, everyone wants to talk about Trump and Clinton.
8/8	Primary voting day in Wisconsin.
8/9	About 15% voted in the primary, according to Ginny Dankmeyer. About as predicted. Dan Kapanke, Jennifer Shilling, and Russ Feingold all scored about 90% in their respective races.
8/11	Mike Pence's visit to WI is today. Clinton staffers accuse him of having a "dangerous economic agenda."
8/12	Is it too risky to support Donald Trump? Senate candidate Dan Kapanke hears that from fellow Republicans, but doesn't buy it.
8/14	Fundraising is the focus for a Trump visit to LaCrosse tomorrow. There's no public rally planned, but a "drop-in" event is expected.
8/15	Still three months to the election, but Republicans think these August visits will be helpful to the party. Security is tight around the Charmant, where Donald Trump is expected.
8/25	Sue Lynch, part of the National Federation of Republican Women, says it's unrealistic for people to expect women to support Clinton simply because she's a woman.
9/20	Voting starts today – in some places. In LaCrosse, you'll have to wait for October 17 th .
9/26	Long lines are predicted on election day. One way to avoid the crush is to pre-register if you still need to register. More than 5,000 registered on election day in 2012.

2 - News Subject: Merging County and City Library

Date	Description
8/11	Mayor Tim Kabat wants to merge the City and County library system. Council member James Cherf says voting so quickly is pushing things a bit.
8/16	No official reaction from the County on merging the library system. Kabat wants the county to provide the staffing and technology, while the city would provide the buildings. He says his plan would save money for both the county and the city.
8/18	The county administrator isn't too happy with Kabat's plan to merge the city and county library systems. Steve O'Malley says both library boards need to be involved in discussions. The county approved a resolution to set up a study commission, but it could take a year to review the services offered.
8/21	Library funding for next year will be debated over the next few weeks, but the city library staff also has a 5-year plan ready for the public. The first public discussion will be Saturday morning.
8/30	Merging the two systems would save money for the taxpayer. But there's also a question of fairness, because city taxpayers foot the bill for services for people from outside the city who use the city library. Twenty showed up for the first public meeting to hear about the library strategic plan over the weekend.
8/31	The feedback sessions planned by the library have nothing to do with Kabat's plan to merge the city and county library systems. They're about the strategic plan for the City Library.
9/7	The city council is set to vote on Mayor Kabat's merger plan tonight.
9/12	Mayor Kabat's plan will move forward. The effective date would be July 1 st next year, and would save the city 20% of the library budget.. The county board still has to approve the merger.
9/20	Plenty of moving parts in the discussions for the library merger. Part of the discussion will be the ongoing boundary talks with the town of Shelby. That could be settled by the end of the year.

3 - News Subject: Drug Addiction Issues

Date	Description
7/8	The Aids Resource Center has numbers that say they're well on their way to passing last year's Narcan use. 42 times by the end of May.
7/11	Narcan will be available through Gundersen pharmacies in the area. The price: \$80 per dose. Nationwide, 29,000 people died last year of opiate overdoses.
7/19	Local leaders had a roundtable discussion on the heroin problem yesterday. Police Chief Ron Tischer said they can't arrest their way out of the problem.
7/21	Cops say first responders saved the life of a 20-year-old man who had OD'd in a bathroom in the King on 5 th building.
7/28	Drug abuse knows no party. Dems and Republicans all agree things need to be done.
8/1	A woman OD'd in her car at the LaCrosse Center Friday. Narcan saves the day.
8/2	New guidelines are in place for doctors on how to prescribe opiates for pain. One big change is to use the lowest possible dose.
8/4	The LaCrosse fire department is called on average a dozen times every month to pick up discarded drug needles. UW-L students want to find another way to dispose of those needles.
8/5	More city employees will be picking up used Hypos. City workers will be getting training and equipment to deal with the needles.
8/12	LaCrosse is the only city with a needle exchange program with such a problem with discarded needles.
8/28	A decade ago it was alcohol. Now, instead of an Alcohol Task Force, we have the Heroin Task Force.
9/2	The AIDS resource center has been criticized for the needle exchange program, but there haven't been many complaints lately.
9/8	Narcan – it's not just for humans. A police dog accidentally OD'd on heroin at a training exercise, and a doggie-dose of Narcan saved the dog.
9/13	The Ho Chunk will host an awareness forum tomorrow to let people know the dangers of drug overdoses.
9/15	Heroin users are more honest than ever about their addiction.
9/18	Struggling with addiction? Coulee Council on Addictions will host a meeting Wednesday to talk about support for families dealing with addiction.
9/21	WI is doing what it can to take illegal drugs off the streets. A new synthetic – U47700 – is making the rounds.
9/23	Jill Billings has long worked with the Heroin Task Force, and Governor Walker has put her on a statewide group to tackle opioid abuse.

4 - News Subject: Memorial Pool

Date	Description
8/8	An official study of Memorial Pool's problems may have to wait until next month. A committee will meet to find out whether the old pool is worth saving.
8/10	The end of summer is coming, and the city council is finally getting around to deciding on a committee to decide the future of the pool.
8/22	There could be a bunch of people at a normally-quiet budget meeting. The Grandview Emerson Neighborhood Association is pushing for members to show their support for saving Memorial Pool.
8/23	The city has a full plate of capital projects, but most who attended a hearing yesterday were there to support Memorial Pool.
9/7	The Grandview Emerson Neighborhood Association is seeking help to raise money to pay for a study to look deeper into options for Memorial Pool.
9/22	Memorial Pool won't be in the city budget next year. The plan is to spend up to \$250-K for engineering work, and maybe the money will be available in 2018 for the pool.
9/23	A survey was sent out this summer regarding Memorial Pool. Only 23% filled it out and returned it.

5 - News Subject: Flooding and Recovery

Date	Description
8/11	Closed roads in Trempealeau County. Washouts from heavy rains.
8/12	Damaged homes and cars are normal when dealing with floods that hit parts of Buffalo and Trempealeau Counties last week.
8/19	The federal government is saying NO assistance for area flooding, but FEMA says money may be available through the Disaster Fund.
8/24	NE Iowa was pummeled by rain Tuesday night, with Decorah getting the worst. Those in the LaCrosse floodplain should brace themselves. Heavy rains up river will mean high water in this area.
8/25	Severe flooding has claimed a life in Iowa.
8/26	National Weather service is predicting more rain for NE Iowa.
8/29	An emergency order was signed by Scott Walker to help Trempealeau, Buffalo and Eau Claire counties damaged by floods.
9/4	A storm on August 10 th and 11 th dropped 5 to 8 inches of rain in a very short period of time, wrecking roads, farms, bridges, etc.
9/8	The worst flooding on the Kickapoo River is over, but towns downriver are waiting for the crest.
9/16	More help could be on the way for Buffalo County. The SBA begins assessing homes and businesses for flood damage.
9/21	Up to 7 inches is expected to drench saturated ground in the area. More than 2 inches fell overnight in SE MN and SW WI. Flash flood warning in Vernon and Crawford Counties through early afternoon. Watch in effect through Thursday night.
9/22	Severe flooding continues in the LaCrosse area. There are reports of a house sliding down the bluff near Victory. HWY 35 is closed as crews work to find out if anyone was inside. Crawford County dispatch says it's all hands on deck. Roads are closed because of flooding, mudslides have been reported, and there's a train derailment north of Ferryville. The lower part of Gays Mills is under several feet of water. State highways in the Viroqua area are closed as well. 3,000 gallons of diesel fuel was spilled from a BNSF train derailed near Ferryville after tracks were washed out. Wildlife Refuge manager, Sabrina Chandler says it's a small spill. The water moving through the area will disperse the spill before it can be contained. Now dozens of roads closed in Vernon and Crawford Counties.
9/23	A 53-year-old man was found dead inside the house that slid downhill near Victory this morning. Governor Scott Walker has declared a state of emergency in 13 counties in the LaCrosse area. Flood warnings continue. Another risk of flooding – failing dams. Debris in the Black River damaged a flood gate. No immediate risk. De Soto High School Football will not have another home game this season. Flooding has destroyed their field. Mudslides hit a car near De Soto. A dump truck headed the other direction plowed into the same slide. Nobody injured.
9/27	Floodwaters recede. Still more than 40 roads closed. Infrastructure damage could be 4 million, private property damage another 2.
9/29	“Homecoming” for De Soto will be at UW-LaCrosse.
9/30	Flood waters recede, but recovery will take much longer. Estimates of damage top \$21 million so far. Bridges, roads and dams took the biggest hit. Private property damage adds another \$7 million.
