Could Ruling Mean Arizonans Lose ACA Health Insurance Subsidy?	07/24/14, 10:18am 07/28/14, 07:18am 07/31/14, 06:18pm	1 minute 30 seconds	<p>PHOENIX - A court ruling on Tuesday threatens to eliminate the government tax credits that the vast majority of Arizonans who purchased health insurance through the Affordable Care Act are receiving.</p> <p>The U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit issued a 2-1 ruling in a lawsuit against the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. According to the ruling, only states with their own health-insurance exchanges, which number fewer than 20 - and Arizona is not one of them - can offer the subsidies.</p> <p>"About 120,000 people were able to purchase a health insurance plan in Arizona," said Pati Urias, communications director for Enroll America, which helps Arizonans get insurance through the ACA. "Seventy-six percent of those did purchase a health insurance plan with the assistance of financial help."</p> <p>On average nationally, the subsidies provide about \$5,000 a year to each family getting insurance coverage through the ACA.</p> <p>The court concluded that the original ACA said subsidies would be made available through state exchanges only.</p> <p>White House Press Secretary Josh Earnest said the Justice Department will appeal the ruling. He told reporters the clear intent of the Affordable Care Act is to provide subsidies to anyone who gets insurance through the program.</p> <p>"You don't need a fancy legal degree to understand that Congress intended for every eligible American to have access to tax credits that would lower their health-care costs, regardless whether it was state officials or federal officials who are running the marketplace," he said. "I think that is a pretty clear intent of the congressional law."</p> <p>Earnest said there will be no impact on anyone who is receiving subsidies through the ACA as the case moves through the court system.</p> <p>Also Tuesday, the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in a separate case that the law's language was ambiguous, which allows the Obama administration to continue offering the subsidies nationwide.</p> <p>The ruling in case #14-5018 is online at cadc.uscourts.gov.</p>

AZ Organizations Staffing Up For Next ACA Open Enrollment		1:30	<p>The next open-enrollment period under the Affordable Care Act (ACA) starts Nov. 15, and organizations across Arizona are training staff members who help guide people through the process of getting health insurance. Comments from Pati Urias (YOU-rye-us), communications director at Enroll America Arizona.</p> <p>Organizations across the Grand Canyon State are staffing up as the next open-enrollment period for the Affordable Care Act quickly approaches. Pati Urias is with Enroll America Arizona, an organization that helps people get coverage under the Affordable Care Act. She says several organizations are hiring and training Certified Application Counselors who can be critical in helping guide people through the A-C-A process.</p> <p>"There are about 100 different insurance plans in every county in Arizona. So, many of these consumers do seek to have someone to help them kind of navigate that process, because it can be something that's a little bit intimidating if you're not really sure what types of questions to ask, or what sorts of things you need to be looking at in terms of selecting a plan."</p> <p>Urias says research shows that about half of the people who sign up for insurance under the A-C-A have not had health coverage in five years or more. The next open-enrollment period starts November 15th and runs through February 15th.</p> <p>Urias says more than 120-thousand people in Arizona enrolled in the A-C-A during the first open-enrollment period earlier this year. She expects the program will continue to do brisk business as competition among providers intensifies.</p> <p>"There will be a different variety of plans that people will have to choose from. So, even those who enrolled last year will have an opportunity to either stick with what they've got through a continuation of their benefits or they will have the opportunity to take a look at what's new out there."</p> <p>Arizona is among the states that operate directly under the federal government's Health Insurance Marketplace at "healthcare-dot-gov." Some states operate their own insurance exchanges. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services reports that more than eight-million Americans have enrolled for coverage under the Affordable Care Act.</p>

Arizona's Education Funding Cuts Rank Among Nation's Highest		1:30	Arizona's Education Funding Cuts Rank Among Nation's Highest Education funding cuts in Arizona rank among the nation's highest. That's the finding of a study released today by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities . Dana Wolfe Naimark, president of the Children's Action Alliance, says the research shows that Arizona's per pupil spending remains well below pre-recession levels. "That's not a ranking that we want to be high on," she says. "That bodes very poorly for our education system and for our future educational success." Wolfe Naimark says the study shows that when adjusted for inflation, Arizona has cut investments in K-12 schools by 18 percent since 2008. Only Oklahoma and Alabama have made deeper cuts. As the Nov. 4 general election quickly approaches, Wolfe Naimark says the next governor and state Legislature should make educating Arizona's future workforce a top fiscal priority. "And that means looking at both sides of the ledger, the spending side and the revenue side," she states. "And we need to reexamine some of our past decisions - both on K-12 education, on tax credits, on tax cuts, on other spending, on debt - we need to look at all of it and rebalance those priorities." Wolfe Naimark says Arizona's ranking on education funding will improve at least a dozen points if a court ruling requiring the state to fund education at \$330 million more per year in perpetuity, is allowed to stand. The state is currently appealing the court ruling, which determined that Arizona had under funded public education for several years.
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
