July 31, Development of Energy in the North Country, Employment, Taxes, and the North Country Economy, Health Care – Firefighters are no longer putting water on a fire at a Lyme solar farm. The fire blazed for days, restricting people from going near the area. Story ran 2:15, aired at 6 and 11 PM.

July 28, Development of Energy in the North Country, Employment, Taxes, and the North Country Economy, Health Care – Firefighters are still on scene at a solar farm fire. Though they say there is no immediate threats to health or safety, several area events have been canceled out of caution. Story ran 3:00, aired at 6 and 11 PM.
