ISSUE: SAFETY / THE GREAT OREGON SKAKEOUT

Guest: Dan Douthis / PIO Portland Bureau of Emergency Management. KXL's Brett Reckamp goes in-depth with Dan about the upcoming annual Great Oregon Shakeout. It's an earthquake drill set for 10-10-18 at 10:18 a.m. Dan says over a half a million Oregonians participated last year. The idea is to make it seem like a real major earthquake has struck and take cover for at least a minute. Then you are supposed to talk about ways to prepare before the big one hits and what kind of plan you have during and afterwards.

Although it isn't confirmed the body is thought to be that of 30-year-old David Yaghmourian from Arizona. He was hiking with his friend at the high elevation when he decided to take a rest. His friend made it back but David did not. Collinson warns of the dangers of hiking in extreme elevations.

Jordan says they are not a surprise and are expected to keep climbing to perhaps 6% by next summer. He says the economy is strong and they're trying to slow it by raising rates. Meantime, Jordan believes we are at the end of an 8-9 year bull market and housing inventories are beginning to show the results. Houses are staying on the market longer on average and prices have stopped soaring. He says it is good news / bad news for homeowners. Retail prices for a home may be lower but interest rates are higher so you are paying more for less.

Laker LeBron during pre-game at Moda Center before the opening game of the season for the Lakers and the Blazers. LeBron says he did not know Allen but understands his impact on the Portland franchise and the NBA. Finally – we hear an interview with Allen done by Lars from 2008. They talk about a number of topics including Allen's philanthropy work where he was focused on brain diseases.

KXL covered the drill extensively leading up to the 10/18 at 10:18 a.m. event. People spent time pretending there was a major earthquake in Portland. They dropped and took cover for several minutes and made plans of how they would keep themselves alive and sustained for up to weeks at a time during the recovery process.

Bransford says we are ahead of the 2014 mid-term elections in terms of voter turnout - right at about 22 ½%. Multnomah County is at 23% turnout and Clackamas County has 22%. Bransford says every year they get the most ballots on election-day at the drop off sites. Usually about 45% of the ballots they receive are dropped off in person instead of mailed.
