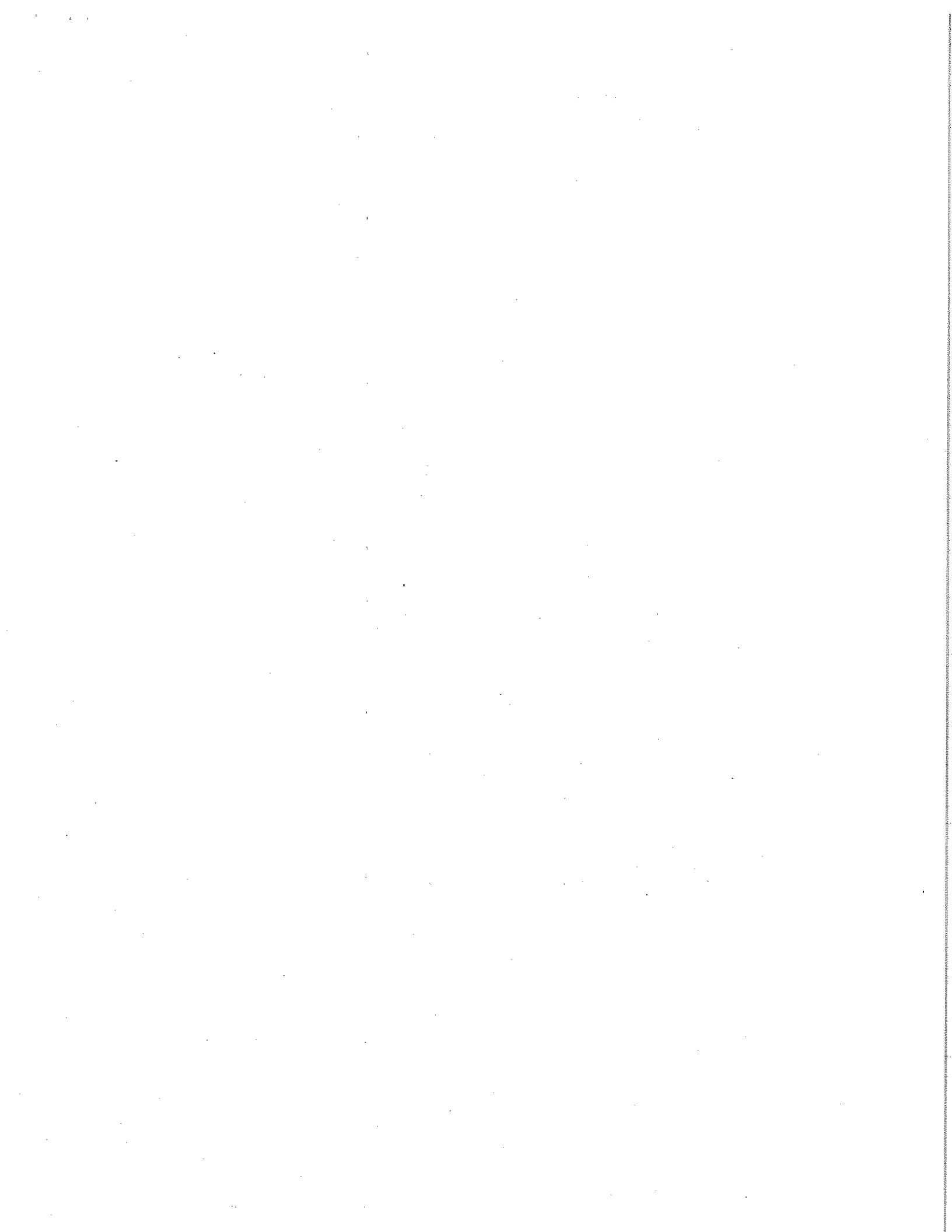

Special Election Coverage 09/21 6A 1min 30 sec The Boone County Clerk's Office releases the unofficial election results and will have a final count on Monday. In Harrison, incumbent school board members Mitch Magness and Rhonda Purdy will continue to serve on the

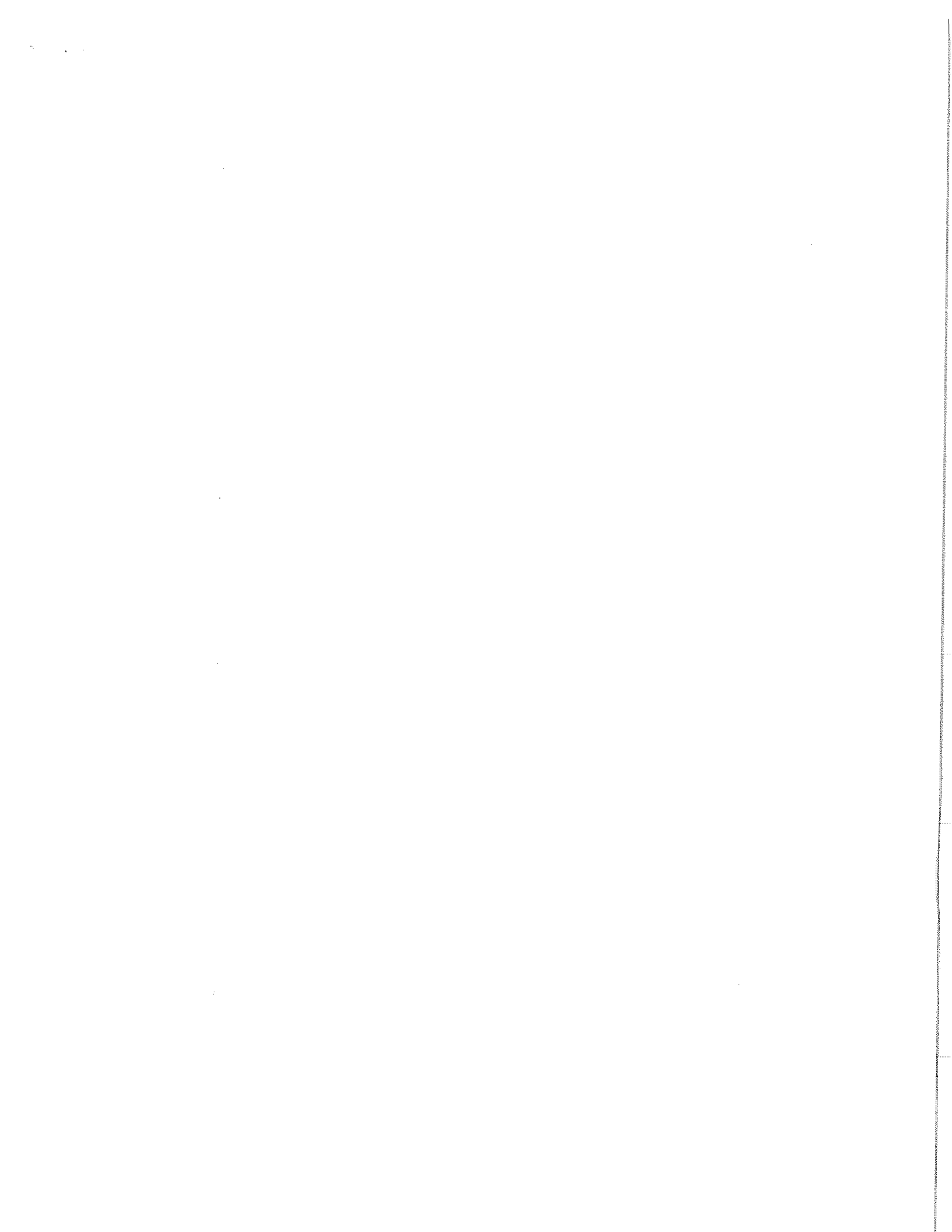
board. Also, Jeri Pritchett will remain seated on the Berman School Board. In Alpena's School Board Race, Trisha Cantwell was favored to fill the open position. For the Lead Hill School Board, Bill Peece claimed victory. Additionally, Lead Hill voters passed the Millage extension so they can now attempt to refinance the current bonds and free up money for construction. Over in Valley Springs, voters choose to reject a millage increase that officials say would have helped build a new school and fund other general improvements.

The City of Branson is canceling its contract with Olsson Associates, the firm providing engineering services and construction management for the now halted Highway 76 revitalization project. City Engineer David Miller spoke with aldermen. The city entered into the three-year, 4-million dollar contract last August. First-year expenses approved by aldermen exceeded 1-point-3 million dollars. The board has approved first reading of the contract cancellation, with second reading scheduled for September 26th.

Grand Country Music Hall is teaming up with Nexstar Media Group (our partners), to produce a special taping of Branson Country USA to raise money for the hurricane victims in Texas, Florida and Louisiana. Grand Country General Manager Mike Patrick says conversations for this "telethon" began when Nexstar, which is headquartered in Texas, approached them about doing a show when Hurricane Harvey struck: Patrick adds the show will feature a star-studded lineup of Branson talent: Those watching the show when it airs will be able to make donations to OzarksFirst.com. Encouraging Food Safety	At Your Service	6/28	10A	1hr	Summer time is here, meaning water activities, fireworks and barbeques will be in full swing in the coming weeks. For this 4 th of July, the Taney County Health Department is encouraging cooks, grillers and fryers to keep a few helpful guidelines in mind when preparing their holiday feasts. TCHD Environmental Manager Craig Rhoads says one of the most important things to remember when cooking is the internal temperature of meat.
Flash Flooding Causes	Round The Clock	5/28	9P	5 hrs.	Flash Flooding in Branson causes several evacuations on Saturday night. Jennifer Langford with the City of Branson says heavy rainfall caused the Lake Taneycomo to rise approximately four feet. She says rapidly rising water levels forced twelve campers to become stranded at the Lakeside RV Campground. These campers were later found safe and accounted, according to Langford. Additionally, she says 35 people with the Hoops Basketball Tournament taking place in town were moved from a motel at Fall Creek Road and Highway 165 to a dormitory space at the Ball Parks of America. Near that same area, a restaurant was evacuated. Branson Fire Chief Ted Martin says several roads were impacted by the flooding incident including Fall Creek Road, Roark Valley Road, State Highway 165, and South Drive.
Crime News	Noon News	6/16	12P	1 min 30 sec	A woman from Rogersville is charged in connection with the shooting death of 32-year-old Chad Deadmond of Branson early Thursday morning, June 15 th . Twenty-five-year-old Najee Donson is charged with second-degree murder and armed criminal

action. She is incarcerated in the Taney County Jail on 500-thousand dollars bond related to those charges, and is also being held without bond for revoking her probation in a previous drug-related case against her. According to a probable cause statement, Donson was still on scene when deputies arrived at a location near the intersection of U-S 65 and Rose O'Neill Drive in Walnut Shade, where officers responded on a report of a man that had been shot in the face, around 3:20 that morning. Deputies found Deadmond's body lying near a vehicle, with an obvious gunshot wound to his face. Four people were inside the vehicle prior to the shooting. According to the report from Detective Ronnie Roberts, Deadmond's girlfriend had walked away and left the scene following an altercation. Two other female occupants, including Donson, were still there. One of the occupants, not identified in the redacted probable cause statement, stated Donson was in possession of a pistol that she drew from her waistband. This witness advised that Donson and Deadmond argued in front her, and she observed Donson shoot Deadmond in the face with the pistol. This individual also admitted that she had "moved and stashed one of the guns in the edge of the wood line." During a search of the area, deputies located two guns and two spent shell casings near the vehicle. So far no other charges have been filed in connection with the incident. Donson appeared in court today (Friday) and pleaded not guilty as charged after being formally arraigned. She is scheduled to appear in court again on Monday.

While water levels have drastically subsided in recent weeks, many of the residents of Bull Creek Village are living in tents, as their flood damaged homes are no longer safe to occupy. According to Emergency Manager Jim Fullmer, donations of clothes and furniture have been coming in for the residents of Bull Creek Village since the heavy rainfall ended. But at this time, those donations are being left untouched as residents have no place to store them. Fullmer, who lost two homes in the flood, shares the village is still without power. And without power residents can't cook food or even take a shower. So how can you help? Fullmer asks anyone who can to deliver a hot meal in the evening or a bagged lunch during the day. If you have a spare bedroom or a hotel room vacancy you can donate so they can have a roof over their head while they sleep. Also anyone who has a shower they would be OK with someone using to get cleaned up for work. Fullmer shares The Salvation Army, the Red Cross and Christian Action Ministries have all been out to help, but they have all been pulled away to other emergencies. If you can help or would like to make a monetary donation to for food or a hotel for a family, you can contact Fullmer at 417-230-6472 to set that up.

The Swim Safe Life Jacket Loaner program is kicking off its 2017 season. Park Ranger Joyce Umbach says there are plenty of life jackets available for folks to borrow at all of the contact stations including Buffalo Point and Steel Creek Information centers and at the Tyler Bend Visitor's Center. She says the staff at the national river are trying to raise awareness of the importance of life jackets, particularly for children. This is a free program funded by grant money. She says there are more than 400 safety vests in all sizes distributed throughout the contact stations. The only stipulation is that once you are done using the jacket, you return it. For its initial season last year, visitors borrowed more 89 life jackets. Umbach hopes more people will utilize the program this year.
