## Section A: Newscast Overview

KAOO FM Radio produces 4 daily newscasts. Three to Five minute 'morning drive' reports air at 6:30, 7:30, 8:30 and 9:03am.

News Treatments: The nominal length of each of our lead or feature stories described below is between thirty-seconds and two minutes-thirty seconds.

News Cycle: Exclusive stories run in each of the daily local newscasts before being archived. As an example: A local story or feature will air 4 times in the course of a day, once in each newscast. In addition these stories are available to our audience on-demand via our station website for one week from date of first broadcast.

### Meth Lab Seized

A Minnesota man is in custody after a portable meth lab was seized by Canada border guards in Manitoba.

The border guards stopped the car June 4 at the Sprague crossing, in the southeast corner of Manitoba, and found the lab set up inside.

They also found a backpack containing more materials for a suspected methamphetamine production laboratory as well as 85 grams of suspected meth in a plastic bottle.

The man and evidence were turned over to the RCMP, while members of the RCMP's Clandestine Lab Enforcement and Response Team, as well as the Office of the Fire Commissioner and local fire department, came to the scene to dismantle the lab.

The man has been charged with:

- Production of methamphetamine.
- Importing-exporting methamphetamine.
- Possession for the purpose of trafficking.

He remains in custody at this time and the investigation is ongoing.

### SCAMS



The Better Business Bureau of Minnesota and North Dakota is warning against a slew of postcard scams circling the region. They say the scam offers "a reward of up to \$100 in gas savings" and are allegedly redeemable at Exxon/Mobil, Shell or Sunoco.

The postcards have no return address but urge people to call a toll-free 844 number. Those who call the toll-free phone numbers on these postcards are told they must provide a credit or debit card and will be charged a small fee – usually just over \$3 – for processing. BBB advises the public to either shred these mailings and never give out personal or financial information to unknown parties.

### Railway Safety Concerns

A legal challenge has been mounted against the U.S. Department of Transportation, claiming new rules proposed for oil-trains to protect those in Minnesota and nationwide who live along routes don't do enough. The law firm Earthjustice is representing the groups that filed the administrative appeal. Attorney Kristen Boyles says a major problem is that the new standards for tank cars announced last month have a phase-in time that extends too far.

"Which allow the inadequate, explosive oil trains to stay on the rails for another 10 years," she explains. "And that's a huge problem for anybody who lives anywhere near a railroad or has a town where rail lines go through."

Currently, more than 300,000 Minnesotans live within a half-mile of rail routes that carry North Dakota oil across the state. A half-mile is considered the evacuation zone if a train derails and evacuation becomes necessary. Boyles says another main reason for the challenge is that the proposed rules don't do enough to ensure that emergency responders know when trains are coming through their area or what's on them. "And we believe that should be more information, not less, so that people can be prepared for the what looks like inevitability of having more explosions and oil spills," she stresses. The rail companies say releasing more route and cargo details could compromise national security as well as letting competitors know too much about their business. In Minnesota, up to 50 crude oil trains pass through the state weekly, each carrying on average more than 3 million gallons of oil.

### Devils Lake Jail Security Beefed Up

A massive manhunt continues tonight in northern New York after a daring prison break by two convicted killers.

Here in our region, the Lake Region Law Enforcement Center has beefed up security after a recent jail break by a man who was already being held on escape charges.

Tom Rime/Law Enforcement Center Director: "It was a combination of things overall, and especially

when you can look back in retrospect.”

Back in March, 35-year-old Wesley Brown broke out of the facility. He was in jail waiting for sentencing on a previous escape charge. A corrections officer at the time, 26-year-old Rachel Chepulis, is charged with helping Brown escape. Law Enforcement Center director Tom Rime says it's hard to stop an inside job.

He adds, “We had to be honest with ourselves about how much we could really avoid from occurring, knowing he was being helped, reportedly, by one of our correctional officers.”

Rime says no other staff members did anything wrong. But the incident prompted some changes. For example, Brown, a federal inmate, worked as a custodian at the jail...with access to unsecured areas. Now, federal inmates can't work any jobs in the facility at the request of the U-S Marshals.

Rime says, “We looked at frequency of observation of the inmates and their movement within the jail, what doors should always be secured at all times.”

The law enforcement center isn't just working to prevent another prisoner escape, it's also working to help corrections officers deal with the constant stress of working in a jail.

Rime says, “It's called resiliency training. It's about burnout in these kind of facilities, prisons, jails, the constant negativity you're exposed to.”

The escape weighed heavily on jail staff.

Rime says, “Those are really difficult things to go through as a staff and as a facility. People work really hard to not have that happen.”

Now, the LEC says it's much better prepared to thwart an escape attempt, and that corrections officers have more confidence in each other, and the jail's security.

Devils Lake Oil Refinery

The City of Devils Lake has paved the way for an oil refinery to come to town.

The City Commission unanimously approved a development agreement with a company looking to build a 20,000 barrel per day refinery, but not before hearing from plenty of locals who are concerned about

what else a refinery could bring to the city.

Rick Morse/City Commissioner: "I think this is one of the best things that's ever happened to this community."

The words of city commissioner Rick Morse, after the city approved an agreement with Eagles Ledge Energy, to bring a refinery to town. City officials spent more than six months ironing out the agreement for a refinery to be built west of town. It would bring 100 jobs to the area and generate one-point-seven-five million dollars a year in revenue to the city.

Rachel Lindstrom/Forward Devils Lake: We took a lot of different opportunities to educate ourselves, have a really good understanding of what a refinery is and what it means to our community environmentally, financially.

Before the vote, the commission heard public comments...the majority of those from people worried about the refinery and the development process.

Margie Brekken/Concerned Citizen: "I think there's a lot of frustration that they're not being included in committee meetings or development meetings."

Locals like Margie Brekken say the city is keeping the public in the dark when it comes to the refinery.

Brekken says, "In my experience they've not returned emails, and they have not included residents on their committees."

Despite the myriad of concerns and complaints city leader heard tonight from locals, they say the development agreement should safeguard the city against any and all problems that could arise from the oil refinery.

Morse says the agreement, "Put everything on paper that needs to be looked at to protect everybody."

Officials say they're working with lawyers well versed in the oil industry.

Lindstrom says, "They have environmental legal backgrounds to ensure the safety of Devils Lake."

Even with the assurances, some locals say the agreement should be tabled...and more research done about the effects of a refinery.

Brekken says, "People say people live near refineries and have no problems, and I just think there's people who live on the slopes of volcanoes too, and they don't have a problem until it erupts."

City leaders maintain that only a small minority of residents oppose the refinery.



Now that the development agreement is approved, Eagles Ledge can now apply for a build permit from the state, a process that could take nearly a year.

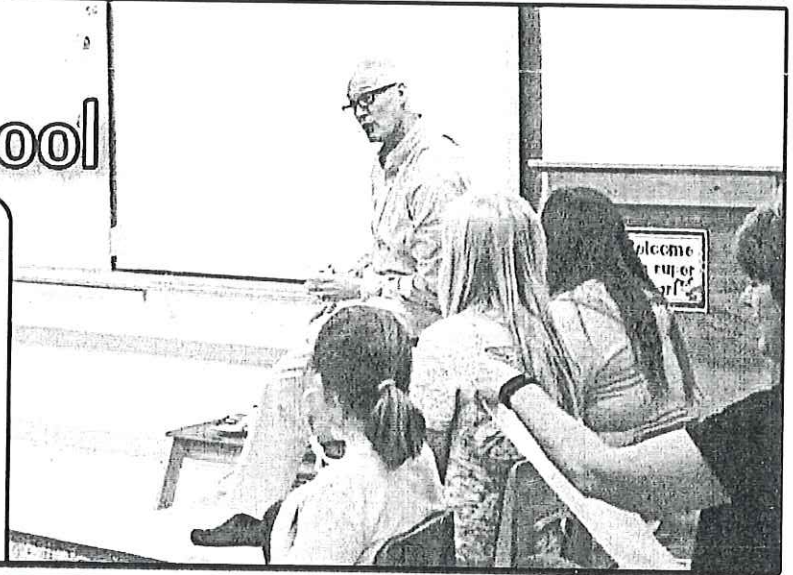


# PLAY BALL!
