Fresh paint is only the beginning. Hardy-Heath sends an expert design team to infuse each renovation with vibrant color and creative flair. “We transform spaces,” she smiles. “Think about Extreme Home Makeover, but School Edition.” The organization updates everything in aging schools from lighting to desks to pencil sharpeners -- and upgrades essential infrastructure like electrical boxes to provide crucial access to the Internet. Once the space is certified ready for the 21st century, modern digital learning tools are provided for students. “We have infused more than \$7.5 million in learning technologies, mostly computers and individual devices into schools and community centers.”

Often laced with fentanyl, these deadly drugs can be 100x stronger than morphine. "It's terrifying," says Pat Aussem of the Partnership to End Addiction. Ed Ternan, co-founder of Song for Charlie lost his college-aged son to one pill and now helps other parents warn their children. "We still say 'just say no' but we spell it K. N. O. W. because many of these young victims are dying from taking a substance they didn't ask for."

Their farm, Mountain Peaks Therapy Llamas & Alpacas, is a faith-based nonprofit organization that connects people of all walks of life with their social animals. Most recently, Shannon was invited to take a pair of llamas to Portland International Airport (PDX) to help travelers alleviate stress, "You get to see the unexpected come over peoples' faces. They're not expecting to see a llama, let alone two, just walking down the hallway." Shannon and Lori's faith plays a large role in what they do. Shannon says, "For me, personally, my church always conveys to be like Jesus. It's my way of bringing unconditional love to those who need it most." The farm offers to travel but they also have on the farm visits too.

It’s a rare birth defect known as tetra-amelia syndrome. Nick tells us the Australian doctors were extremely apologetic that they had not detected the syndrome and offered his mother the option of abortion. For a growing boy, not having limbs and knowing what the doctors had said, gave little Nick a rough path. “Looking at my brother and sister born after me – and them having arms and legs – kind of felt a little unfair and weird. And with no answers, it’s easy to start believing the lies, the little voices that say, ‘you’re not good enough, you’re a mistake, there is no greater purpose for your life,’ and so as I went to school, I was facing bullying. I went through depression at age 8 until age 12, and I felt like there was no hope for my life.” During that period, Nick attempted to take his own life by drowning. Fortunately, he failed. Fast forward to today. “Here I am now at age 40, with a beautiful wife, four beautiful children, and this incredible ministry Life Without Limbs – being the hands and feet of God (even without hands & feet), standing in front of the gates of hell and redirecting traffic. I now try to encourage everyone that no matter what pain we go through, that God can do beautiful things with our broken pieces...if we give those broken pieces into his hands.”</p>

Josh utilizes many gaming platforms to build relationships with other gamers. “I personally believe that the online community is the largest, unreached, unengaged people group in the world.” With a background in Biblical counseling, Josh is able to walk with those struggling or facing trials in life. He shares, "What video games provides is...a common ground that's there to forge a relationship." Josh says we cannot know what someone is going through. Oftentimes, they hide behind their smiling profile. But connecting those people with Jesus comes natural for Josh. He says, "It's so important for us to not only acknowledge that people have real life that's going on, but that Jesus can answer those real-life situations in your life." Claremore First Baptist Church caught wind of Josh's success in reaching young people. He was hired, during the pandemic, to boost their online following.</p>

The COVID-19 lockdowns only worsened already alarming levels of childhood obesity, as the CDC found the BMI (body mass index) in children ages 2-19 years old increase nearly doubled during the pandemic. Excess weight weakens growing muscles and joints and can lead to juvenile diabetes or even trigger life-threatening asthma “Prevention is what we really want, right?” says Geri Henchy, Director of Nutrition Policy at the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC). “We want kids to be in environments that are not obesogenic; where they're gonna get healthy meals, where there isn't a lot of junk food, where they have activities -- that's really gonna make a difference for kids.”
Childhood Issues	Closer Look	2/18/24	7:15pm	15min	Teens Aged-Out of Foster Care Get Help From 'Dream Makers' Without family and often lacking lifeskills, former foster kids become homeless adults by the thousands, turning to drugs and crime on the streets just to survive. “Every statistic you hear that is going bad in the United States, a lot of them link back to the foster care system and those kids just not being taken care of.” Dream Makers steps in to link aged-out foster kids with practical assistance by connecting them with the generosity of strangers. “It totally up to the community to fulfill the dream.” The young adult with a need fills out an application to ask for things that teens with families could easily get from a mom or dad: like money for work clothes, or a laptop for school, or maybe a used car – but Melton says the most common dream request from these youth by far is – food.

"We were all locked away," and the idea was to offer a 'dad video' to encourage or entertain people coping with the pandemic. "I put up my 'How to Tie a Tie' video on April 2 of 2020 and about a month-and-a-half later, my channel went viral! That was scary for me, but I'm grateful that I went viral for something wholesome." These days, Rob is on multiple social media channels, including Instagram, Facebook, and YouTube as Dad, How Do I? And "On TikTok, I'm The Real Dad, How Do I? because there were people who were imitating me." The videos show Rob demonstrating how to put air in your tires, unclogging a toilet, applying deodorant & cologne, how to shave, explaining an Allen Wrench, or making popcorn. Things a dad would share with a child. Why is Rob committing so much time and effort to these videos? "I think that there's definitely a need for people to understand how cool it is to be a dad. I feel like that's a mission that God has given me to try to encourage dads to hang in there, and you're needed and you're valued." It bothers him when he sees TV shows offering "stereotypes, Homer Simpson and Al Bundy...the bumbling dufus of a dad. And you know, I've met a lot of cool dads and a lot of very good dads. We need to encourage that behavior." Due to the popularity of his channel, Rob authored a book "Dad, How Do I?" which shares about important character traits for a good life, his own faith in Christ, and 58 useful 'how-tos.'</p>

But how do you reach a people group that has what might be considered an unusual affinity? Geeks. First off, let’s define the word: “A geek is merely a person who is very much – I won’t say obsessed – but very much in tune with what we call ‘Geek Culture’ – things involving comic books, video games, anime, and movies and fantasy books,” explains Dallas Mora, who along with his wife, Celeste, lead the Christian outreach Geek Devotions. Dallas and Celeste want you to know that people in the geek world - not unlike many people - often have issues with isolation and depression, but in different circumstances. It's sometimes almost like social persecution. For anyone who believes in Christ, Dallas believes there’s always a local mission field: your circle of associates and friends. “Speak to the culture that you’re in. People everywhere need to know about Christ. There are people everywhere who are hurting, who feel abandoned,” and Dallas reminds us, “You have this precious thing called Christ, salvation...and they just need somebody to speak their own (cultural) language – presented in a way that they understand – and allow the Holy Spirit to draw them to salvation.” And Celeste added a very soft, but heartfelt “yes” after that comment.</p>

By doing so, Vincent says, “that child is less likely to be incarcerated, more likely to finish high school, more likely to be successful in the job market,” and have better interactions with their peers.

U.S. combat vets adopt battlefield pets they must leave when deployment is done. Paws of War runs missions to find the soldier’s beloved cat or dog in countries like Iraq and Syria, Jordan, Kosovo. “We do it, we do it at no cost to our active military members; we get those animals back here and we reunite them.”

The non-profit also works to involve pastors and churches nationwide through the Faith Fights Food Waste campaign and recently added a program to feed malnourished people on Native American reservations.

Evans explains the effort is supported by a federal grant with the charge to reduce substance abuse in Kandiyohi County. PAL groups were first formed back in 2006 and the Christian-run non-profit now hosts more than 180 meetings nationwide. Members may attend in-person or choose to join online sessions available most days of the week.
