Stephens, married for 34 years and the father of two adult children, was having an affair with Stephanie Steven, a nurse with whom he worked. Learning of her husband's infidelity, the doctor's wife Karen ran out of her home, pointed a gun into her mouth, and accidentally tripped, setting the gun off. She died three months later and her death was ruled suicide. Stephens married Stephanie and shortly after became seriously ill, suffering from liver failure, hepatitis C and diabetes. Stephanie said that her husband became depressed as his health declined and on May 1, 2001, she said she woke to find him lying dead next to her. Despite her claim that she had nothing to do with Dr. Stephens' death, authorities were suspicious. An autopsy revealed the presence in Stephens' blood of the drug Atricurium, a muscle relaxer used in surgery. The infant hit his head on the cement surface. The baby was rushed to the emergency room where he was treated and released.
