Released after 33 days in captivity, Heggstad opted to continue his journey in South America rather than returning home. 04/05/02 **"Living With The Enemy"** - focuses on the victims of domestic violence and their reluctance to seek help, including reports on: Tori-Lynn Heaton, a former Miss Rhode Island, Miss America competitor and police officer in Cranston, R.I., who was being abused by her husband and fellow officer Joseph Fillion; professional football player Mark Gastineau who was sentenced to jail where he is attending a court-ordered program for batterers; Sarah Elinoff, co-director of Men's Resource Center, a men-overcoming-violence program in western Massachusetts; Erin Morrissey, a lawyer from San Jose, Ca. who was being subjected to abuse by her lawyer husband. (C: Harold Dow, Peter Van Sant, Richard Schlesinger, Erin Moriarty - Sr. P: Katie Boyle - P: Lisa Fred, Diane M. A list of potential suspects, included ex-lover Tony Jackett, a married father of five children whose affair with Worthington produced a daughter named Ava. Includes an interview with Tony Jackett and his wife Susan, both of whom proclaim his innocence. The district attorney has not, as yet, ruled out any suspect. (C: Susan Spencer - Sr. P: Al Briganti - P: Patti Aronofsky); **"Til Death Do They Part"** - a report on the poisoning death of 26-year-old Greg Devillers. His wife, Kristin Rossum, claims that Greg took his own life because he became depressed when she asked him for a divorce. Kristin, a former drug addict, was subsequently charged with murder when an autopsy revealed that Greg died of an overdose of fentanyl, a drug she had access to in her job at the county coroner's office. - 04/12/02 **"Tug Of Love"** - 48 HOURS and Reader's Digest, in a collaborative effort, report on the plight of Spencer Kass, a two-year-old caught up in an emotional custody battle involving his adoptive parents, Aaron and Lynda Kass, and Michael Elskes, his biological father. Crystal Kane, Spencer's birth mother had given the child up for adoption without Elskes' knowledge or consent. After over two years of fighting to get custody of his son, a Texas court agreed to hear Elskes' custody case, but while the hearing was in progress he abruptly asked for a meeting with Aaron Kass. He subsequently signed an agreement giving permanent custody of Spencer to the Kasses and allowing him visitation rights, a decision that he says was based on the best interests of his son. A juvenile court judge ordered police to stop questioning Mike Wehrung, the girl's boyfriend and the principal suspect, and instead sent him to a North Carolina military academy. No arrest was made until the case was reopened in 1999 when DNA evidence linking Wehrung to the crime led to his arrest. (C: Harold Dow - P: Paul F. Ryan); **"Above The Law"** - a new investigation of the 1975 murder of 15-year-old Martha Moxley of Greenwich, Ct. prompted in part by Murder In Greenwich, a book by former LAPD detective Mark Fuhrman, led to the arrest of Michael Skakel, a neighbor. Skakel, a member of the Kennedy family is now on trial for the crime. Includes interviews with Alice Dunn who met Skakel when he checked into the Elan drug and alcohol treatment center in Poland Spring, Me. and Marty Kruglik, a counselor who treated him there. (C: Troy Roberts - P: Sophia M. Kim, Lisa Freed) ("Never Forget" OAD: 05/11/00 with updates - Sr. P: Reid Collins, Jr.)
- 04/17/02 **"Spring Break Exposed"** - followup to "On Spring Break" (OAD: 04/10/91), focusing on the annual spring vacation rituals which college students participate in during semester break. Includes reports on: Panama Beach, Fla. which, this year hosted 500,000 students whose business accounted for one-third of the city's annual revenue; companies distributing free samples of their wares to students; the problems resulting from teen-age drinking, including the death of a student who jumped from a hotel balcony; five women who went on spring break 11 years ago; 29-year-old Joe Francis, the creator and producer of "Girls Gone Wild", a video series featuring women who expose themselves for the camera; and students from Florida International University who spent their spring break doing volunteer work at Ground Zero in New York City. Determined to win his acquittal, Deborah Nolan, a close friend and staunch supporter of Bradford's, quit her teaching job and went to law school in order to be able to take on his defense. Bradford's appeals -- based on arguments that the judge made mistakes, that some jurors lied during jury selection and claims of jury misconduct during the trial -- have so far been rejected. Although both trials relied heavily on the testimony of one key witness -- White -- a known con man, drug addict and felon, Betty Wilson was convicted and sentenced to life in prison while her sister, Peggy Lowe was acquitted. White, who changed his account of the crime several times during the course of the trials, has since recanted, saying that both sisters are innocent. He refuses to testify in court that he lied -- a step that could win Betty Wilson's freedom. Betty's appeals for a new trial have thus far been denied. - 06/28/02 **"Death In The Desert"**-- focuses on programs designed to help young people with disciplinary problems, including reports on: (1) the investigation of the death -- from dehydration due to heat exposure and complications of near drowning -- of 14-year-old Anthony Haynes who was enrolled in America's Buffalo Soldiers Reenactors, a military-style boot camp in Buckeye, Arizona. Charles Franklin Long II, a self-proclaimed Colonel who founded and runs the boot camp was arrested and charged with child abuse, aggravated assault and second-degree murder. He is awaiting trial; (2) an innovative and intense alternative treatment program for troubled teenagers called MST (Multi-Systemic Therapy) which assigns a counselor to the household not only to work with the teenager, but also every influence in his or her life -- neighbors, teachers, friends and especially parents.
