- 07/01/01 **"Why So Expensive?"**- a report on problems resulting from the rising cost of prescription drugs in the U.S., focusing on the plight of senior citizens, many of whom have no health insurance to offset the cost of medication they need to keep them alive. As a last resort, some of these seniors are traveling to Canada or Mexico where the same drugs are sold at a fraction of the price. (C: Mike Wallace - P: Scott Bronstein) (OAD: 10/17/99)
- "Officer Young"**- Cornel Young, Jr. an off-duty police officer and son of the highest-ranking minority officer in Providence, R.I., was shot and killed by two white police officers during an altercation at an all-night restaurant. The white officers claim that they did not recognize Young who, with his gun drawn, was coming to their assistance. Includes comments by a panel of observers: Dr. Drew Pinsky, health and relationship expert; Ellen Fein co-author of The Rules of Marriage, herself recently separated; and Anne Meara, the actress/comedienne who has been married to Jerry Stiller for nearly 50 years, who tried to predict the outcome and discussed the reasons why two couples remained together while the third opted for divorce. After a year in prison, her conviction was overturned for lack of a motive, but the court did not throw out the expert testimony of the investigators who said the fire was arson. At Sheila's retrial, three and a half years after the incident, the state's experts were countered by Gerald Hurst, a fire expert who claimed there was no reason to label the blaze arson. The couple managed to escape to America but Meriam was arrested for entering the country illegally. Following her temporary release from jail, the couple married, but U.S. immigration officials have yet to decide whether she may remain. - 07/16/01 **(48 HOURS MYSTERIES) "Ghosts of Mississippi"**- a report on the investigation of a string of unsolved homicides in Columbus, Mississippi. 48 HOURS has been following the mystery since the end of 1998 when five elderly residents, all living within a mile of each other, were killed within 18 months. With no apparent motive or forced entry associated with the crimes, police say, a terrified community believes a serial killer is on the loose. To complicate the situation the town's police chief was imprisoned for embezzlement. His successor is still trying, with little success, to solve the killings. - 07/20/01 **"Murder They Wrote: While Innocents Slept"** - a report based on the book While Innocents Slept by Adrian Havill which follows a murder case involving the deaths of two infants which were originally attributed to SIDS (Sudden Infant Death Syndrome). A new investigation instigated by Missy Anastasi, mother of one of the infants, unearthed new evidence which pointed to her ex-husband Garrett Wilson, a successful salesman of musical instruments and four-times married father of both infants. Wilson who had taken out life insurance policies on both babies, was tried for the 1987 murder of his son, Garrett Michael, found guilty and sentenced to prison. A trial for the 1981 death of an infant daughter, Brandi Jean, has been postponed. (C: Peter Van Sant - Sr. P: Reid Collins Jr. - P: Sophia M. Kim)
- 07/23/01 **"Kidnapped"**- In 1989, Cheryl Lamare's two-year-old daughter, Jamie, was kidnapped by her father, Stan Voulgareilis, and taken to his native Greece. For nine years, Lamare has done everything in her power to get Jamie back, but to no avail. In despair, she hired an ex-commando and his wife, Don and Judy Feeney, along with a team of Greek detectives, to help retrieve her daughter -- by force, if necessary. 48 HOURS has been covering the story for nearly a year and follows Lamare and her group through the secret planning and abortive rescue efforts that follow. - 07/26/01 **"Ecstasy"**- a broadcast focusing on the popular drug Ecstasy, featuring reports on: Kati Stephenson, whose first experience with Ecstasy at 16 led to cocaine, crack and heroin. Today, a recovering addict, Katie counsels other teens; Sue Stevens, a single mother who claims that Ecstasy helped her and her terminally ill fiance cope with his illness; Shari Rich, a 19-year-old college student, who died after taking adulterated Ecstasy; DanceSafe, a controversial organization which offers to test Ecstasy for adulterants; Ari Jackson, a college student who was arrested in Tallahassee, Florida for dealing Ecstasy and now faces a prison sentence. Broadcast is part of a cooperative project with MTV News, which will also broadcast a report on Ecstasy on Nov. 30. - 07/27/01 **"Murder They Wrote: The End Of The Dream"**- in the second "Murder They Wrote," based on the book The End of The Dream by Ann Rule, a former Seattle police officer and bestselling true-crime author, 48 HOURS reports on Scott Scurlock, whose colorful career started with the manufacture and sale of illegal drugs and ended with bank robbery. The charismatic Scurlock, known as "Hollywood" because of his flamboyant style and effective use of disguises in the commission of crimes, successfully eluded capture for four years while effortlessly robbing 18 banks. Finally apprehended following the robbery of a Seattle bank, Scurlock took his own life rather than face imprisonment. Includes an interview with author Ann Rule. - 07/03/01 **"The First Casualty"**- a report on the mystery surrounding the fate of Lt. Commander Michael Scott Speicher, the first American casualty arising from the Persian Gulf War. The Navy pilot, shot down over Iraq, was officially declared killed in action in 1991; several years later his plane's wreckage was discovered, along with evidence that Speicher had ejected and might have survived the crash. - "See How They Run"**- report on new prosthetic devices for amputee athletes and the records for speed and endurance being set at the Paralympics, a competition restricted to disabled athletes. The devices, made of NASA-inspired materials including carbon fiber and titanium, enable disabled people to perform as well as, and some claim, even better than their able-bodied counterparts. - "Qaddafi"** - profile of Muammar Qaddafi, the Libyan leader who denies that he is a terrorist and who is trying to change his image to that of a peacemaker who is trying to lead his country out of economic sanctions. - Charles Grodin - celebrities branching out into other fields (OAD: 12/05/00)
- 07/10/01 **"The Power Of Plastic"**- major banks pay royalties to colleges and universities to allow them to come on campus and try to sell students on the advantages of having credit cards. Problems have arisen because many young people lack the maturity to handle large amounts of credit. Includes footage of Todd Stallkamp, an associate producer, who posed as a student to show how vendors operate on campus. (C: Vicki Mabrey - P: Raylena Church Fields) (OAD: 01/23/01)
- "Tulsa Burning"**- few Americans know it, but the nation's most violent race riots took place in 1921 in Tulsa, Oklahoma, after a black man got on an elevator with a white woman. Nearly 80 years later, reparations may be made for the victims' families in a little known tragedy of racial violence that may have claimed hundreds of black Americans whose bodies were never found. - "The Last Place On Earth"**- anthropologist Birute Galdikas has as her goal saving infant orangutans in Indonesia. The species which once ranged from China through the South Pacific, is almost extinct due to the Indonesian Government's failure to halt illegal logging and gold mining in Tanjung Puting National Park, the animals prime habitat. - 07/11/01 **"Dope & Glory"** - a number of U.S. Olympic athletes claim that they were given illegal performance-enhancing drugs by their coaches. Includes interviews with Greg Strock and Erich Kaiter, athletes who suffered serious health problems; Dr. Wade Exum, U.S. Olympic Committee; and Dr. Joseph Califano, National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse. - "Going To Extremes"**- BASE (buildings, aerials, spans and earth) jumping, involves leaping off buildings or mountains with a parachute. - "Dixie Chicks"**- an interview with the Texas-bred country music trio, Dixie Chicks, who have sold 17 million CDS, won four Grammy Awards recently named entertainer of the year by the Country Music Association. Includes interviews with Clint Smith, sniper course director; Steve Rodriguez, an instructor; and Albuquerque, N.M. Police Chief Gerald Galvin who turns first to a crisis intervention team.  "Delinquents"- game rangers in South Africa's wildlife parks have discovered that the white rhino, a breed they had protected for years, were being attacked and killed by orphaned young male elephants. - 07/25/01 **"Hitler's Lake" Pts. I & II**- in 1945, during the final months of World War II, Nazi officers sank a number of wooden boxes in Lake Toplitz in the Austrian Alps. The contents of the boxes remained a mystery until this summer when 60 MINUTES II began an intensive search using an ROV (remotely operated vehicle) submarine to scan the bottom of the lake. The boxes were found to contain a cache of counterfeit currency, mostly British pounds, printed under duress by concentration camp prisoners.
