Though married and the father of a young son, Nodine dated Downs for six years. Friends and family say Angel wanted him to get a divorce, but he refused to give up his double life. On the night of her death, Nodine says he dropped Downs off, and then left to go back to his wife. Within two weeks, Stephen Nodine was indicted for murder and arrested. The timing raised eyebrows, because District Attorney Judy Newcomb was up for re-election, something which Nodine's attorney says was an opportunity to have some high-profile prosecution immediately before the election. Nodine's problems multiplied: he was charged with a violation of the seldom-used federal statute which prohibits drug users from using guns. Much of the evidence in the case was circumstantial, including alleged stalking and beatings, and a previous suicide attempt by Downs. Even the state's own Medical Examiner Eugene Hart could not settle on the circumstances of death. He called it inconclusive. The Georgia State Medical Examiner was called in; he deemed Downs' death a homicide. Jurors deliberated and a mistrial was declared. Stephen Nodine was a free man for four months; he agreed to plead guilty to the federal gun charge -- possessing a gun while using drugs. After convening a new grand jury, the new District Attorney Hallie Dixon, made the decision that Nodine not be charged again with murder. The family then went over Dixon's head and demanded a Special Prosecutor. Nodine was to be retried for murder. Surprisingly, there was a plea deal and an admission -- the prosecutors did not have proof beyond a reasonable doubt in the case. The state of Alabama dropped the murder and stalking charges. Nodine pled guilty to perjury for lying on a legal form. He also agreed to plead no contest to a charge that he harassed Angel Downs with e-mails and text messages. **Epilogue for the 07/02/16 rebroadcast:** Nodine's wife divorced him. He violated the terms of his probation and ended up back in jail. Now, out of jail, and unable to find a job, he has decided to move to Florida. Lee Barnett was in the midst of a bitter divorce with then-husband Harris Todd. Barnett had married him even though he said he did not want children. Problems began after she became pregnant. They went to counseling, and during this period a doctor diagnosed her as having hyperthymic temperament, a form of bipolar disorder. After Savanna was born, she filed for divorce. Harris counter-sued. The judge sided with Todd. Barnett then started to make plans to leave with 11-month-old Savanna. She obtained fake documents (birth certificates and passports) and disappeared. An FBI manhunt ensued. She was vilified in the press. In 1999, Harris Todd told 48 HOURS that she was mentally ill. Barnett countered with her side of the story: she cut off all contact with her family and headed to Europe, then Malaysia, Singapore, South Africa, Botswana and Australia. Along the way, she met and married Alex Geldenhuys, and had another child, Reece. Unbeknownst to Savanna, she became Samantha Geldenhuys. While they were on the run, Barnett also kept a secret diary for her daughter, planning one day to tell her the story of her life. In 2011, the FBI got a tip that Barnett was living in Australia. Samantha learned about her past from the agents. In 2013, Barnett was extradited to the United States. Samantha has read all the transcripts and the diaries and has a new understanding of her mother. Barnett pled guilty to all charges and spent 21 months in prison. Samantha eventually met her father and described it as a surreal experience. Forty-eight hours into the investigation, detectives received a crucial tip from a local resident, William Pennix (aka "Big Will") - a friend had told him that he had just killed a woman. The tip led investigators to a homeless man named "Greyhound" (Noel Stevens) who lived in the desert away from the Las Vegas strip. Police believed that George Tiaffay had befriended Stevens, and manipulated his friend with the promise of cash if he would kill his wife. They also matched the murder weapon with merchandise that the two men are seen shopping for, on video footage acquired by the police. Stevens and Tiaffay were arrested. Stevens pleaded guilty in 2013 to Shauna's murder. In a pre-trial deal, he agreed to testify against George Tiaffay once prosecutors promised not to seek the death penalty against him. Hayes and Tichelman met on an online dating service known for connecting wealthy men with women looking to be spoiled. The video footage recorded Tichelman injecting Hayes, cleaning up the scene and stepping over him to leave. At issue is whether Tichelman knew Hayes was in distress when she left, as police maintain, or if his death was accidental, as public defenders representing Tichelman claim. Tichelman led a troubled life which included eating disorders, drugs, and specialized schools. Investigators learned that just months before Hayes' death, Tichelman's then-boyfriend, Dean Riopelle, an Atlanta night club owner, also died from a heroin overdose. After an elaborate sting, Tichelman was arrested for the death of Forrest Hayes. Riopelle's death, originally classified as accidental, is being given a second look by Georgia authorities. **UPDATE:** On May 19, 2015, after nearly a year in jail, and now clean and sober, Tichelman pleads guilty to involuntary manslaughter as well as lesser charges and is sentenced to six years in the local jail, but with credit served, she will likely serve just over two years. Then, a bombshell from the prosecution: the Hayes family told them they never wanted Alix Tichelman charged and would have been happy if the case had been dismissed. They never wanted the video from the yacht from the incident and the previous six months to be made public, as the public defenders has been requesting for months. He was extremely smart, rubbed many people the wrong way, was a member of Mensa, and bragged about winning thousands of dollars on "Jeopardy". Only after they married in 1992, did she learn of Paul's two ex-wives and three children. She had several life insurance policies; Curry was the beneficiary on some. Curry also asked her to take out an additional \$1million policy, but she never did. Friends told her to dump him. In 1993, she became violently ill, needing hospitalization: poisoning was suspected after lab workers discovered lidocaine in a contaminated IV bag. The investigation focused on one person: Paul Curry. Five months later, she was again hit with a mystery illness. Her IV bag again was again tampered with. Friends believed that Curry wanted to kill Linda and cash in -- but Linda remained loyal. Six months later, Linda died. The cause of death was attributed to nicotine poisoning and Ambien overdose. Her death was ruled a homicide, but Paul Curry was never charged. Linda had drafted a note giving her sister half of her estate. Curry was beside himself even though she left him the house and close to a half-a-million dollars. The case grew cold. Afterwards, Paul Curry's lies came to light: he was a complete fraud. He was not an engineer; in fact, he did not even have a college degree. He left town. In 2002, the case was re-opened by the Orange County Sheriff's Department. In 2008, Sergeant Yvonne Shull felt she had enough information to present to the prosecutor. Curry was located in Salina, Kansas where he was living a new life. He was tricked into a meeting, believing he was talking to local detectives, but all the while talking to Sergeant Shull. Using the information he spoke about in the interview, he was arrested and charged with murder. At trial, the prosecutor used Mark Curry's own words to win the case. In October 2013, Fuhrmann got Guglielmelli to repeat that he would pay \$80,000 to have Olsen killed. To the authorities, it was a clear-cut case of murder for hire; Guglielmelli was arrested. Guglielmelli, in a telephone interview from jail, claims he is the victim; he was conned by Richard Fuhrmann. Authorities agree that Fuhrmann is a con man, but the conspiracy to kill Olsen was very real. In a surprise move, they offered Guglielmelli a plea deal: plead guilty to attempted murder in the second degree and serve only nine years in jail. He accepted. In a telephone interview from prison, Guglielmelli discusses his decision. Olsen is proceeding with the divorce and worries about the future. Bohn's attorney asserts he was abandoned by his mother Maureen O'Connell, a wealthy publishing executive, and he experienced profound neglect and abuse that caused a mental illness called Intermittent Explosive Disorder. Prosecutors dismissed his claims and they assert that audio recorded in an accidental phone call made while Thomas was still alive suggest Bohn knew exactly what he was doing. Friends and family of Julie Gonzales maintain that Art's version of events is completely out of character for Julie. And the police investigation uncovered that Gonzales was having an affair with a co-worker, Cara Kast, who was also involved with another FBI agent. Due to the outcome of the two previous trials, both the prosecution and defense agreed to a bench trial. During the proceedings, prosecutors suggested Art Gonzales relied on his FBI training to stage a crime scene to cover up a murder, while the defense maintained the evidence backed up Art's claim of self-defense. In the end, the judge reluctantly declared Gonzales not guilty of manslaughter. He hoped to put his life back together, get a job and stay out of trouble. Things did not work out as he had hoped. **Epilogue for the 08/20/16 updated rebroadcast:** In 2004, Chambers was arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance and driving with a suspended license. He pled guilty and spent 100 days in jail. Three years later he was arrested again, along with his girlfriend, and charged with selling drugs out of his apartment. Inside the home, police found evidence of a struggle and DNA evidence that led to a woman: Kelly Soo Park. Park was in the employ of Dr. Uwayda. She was arrested and within days Uwayda had vanished. Five years later, the trial commenced. While authorities thought the case was a slam dunk, the defense, with the help of jury consultant, Lee Meihls, presented a bold argument of DNA transference. The prosecution used the 48 HOURS interview to their advantage, because she had added an additional fact, claiming that it was not only an intruder, but that she thinks she knew who it was. She was found guilty of murder. Following the conviction, Michelle Fletcher, Greg Williams' sister and the widow of his best friend, Brynn Fletcher, says that she now believes that Michele Williams was also somehow responsible for Brynn's death, also by gunshot, which authorities had classified as a suicide. She suggests that Fletcher was about to tell her brother truths which Michele Williams did not want Greg to learn about. A few weeks later, police got a tip that Dinh Bowman, a young man described as a genius who had entered college at age 12 and now was a robotics engineer with his own business, owned a vehicle that matched the lead. Police investigation led to information that Bowman had a fixation with James Bond, was an expert marksman, and just wanted to kill someone for the thrill of it; and his wife, dentist Jennifer Bowman, may have had knowledge of the crime and possibly have been an accomplice. Bowman was arrested and held on \$10 million bond. At his 2014 trial, a portrait of pre-meditated murder was described to the jury by the prosecutors. Bowman, his appearance changed dramatically, claimed he was the victim; he had fired in self-defense, then threw out evidence and did not call police because he panicked. It took four years for prosecutors to charge Nunez with second-degree murder and forgery. Nunez hired two top New York City defense attorneys who presented a very different scenario, saying Tom Kolman died of natural causes, insisting this was a murder case without a murder. The verdict: Nunez was acquitted of the murder charges and found guilty on the forgery charges. The Kolman family was unhappy with the verdict. (1) The January 2016 disappearance and murder of 13-year-old Blacksburg, Virginia teenager Nicole Lovell, whose social media posts revealed a lonely and sadly typical teenage story. Nicole went missing after sneaking out to go on "a date". The investigation revealed she had regularly used the popular social media app Kik, which allows communications to be anonymous, and was communicating with 18-year-old Virginia Tech freshman David Eisenhower. Her body was found 90 miles away. Eisenhower and his accomplice, fellow Virginia Tech student Natalie Keepers, were arrested on abduction and murder charges. (2) In 2013, Branden Syrotchen of Spokane, Washington, found out that Elizabeth, his 15-year-old daughter, was communicating with a 30-year-old man she had also befriended on the Kik app. The two were planning to run away together. Because the police were not able to act without actual evidence of a crime, Branden hatched a plan to save his daughter. The man, Jason Richards, tried to turn his crime into a love story, but he eventually pleaded guilty to child rape and luring charges. Also featured in the broadcast is an interview with an online predator who details how easy it is to lure children using social apps. Ted Livingston, CEO of the billion dollar social app Kik, was asked questions regarding the safety of children using the app during a recent conference and claimed his app is as safe as the competition. **On-screen text graphic:** David Eisenhower and Natalie Keepers are scheduled to be tried separately next March. If convicted, they could face life in prison with no parole. Jason Richards is scheduled to be released from prison on June 3, 2017. Stand Up To Cancer Dream Teams, Translational Research Teams And Innovative Research Grants (IRGs)

Scientists supported by SU2C are at the forefront of cancer research today. SU2C-supported scientists have made critical contributions to the development of new therapies that are on the market **now** and are helping people with cancer live longer. Work supported by SU2C continues to propel forward the next wave of cancer therapies and approaches to detection and prevention of these diseases.

To date, more than \$370 million has been pledged to support SU2C's innovative model of collaborative cancer research. SU2C has launched 19 "Dream Teams" of top researchers and six Translational Research Teams, and has awarded 36 individual Innovative Research Grants (IRGs) to early-career researchers.

Altogether, SU2C has involved more than 1,200 researchers representing 144 leading institutions around the world. SU2C researchers have been involved in more than 160 planned, launched, or completed clinical trials, and more than 9,000 patients have participated in SU2C-related trials.

Dream Teams and individual investigators are taking insights from basic research and applying them in clinical settings to help extend and save more patients' lives. The types of cancers being investigated by SU2C-supported research programs account for 84 percent of cancer cases and 79 percent of cancer deaths in the United States. Each Dream Team is funded for three years. The cumulative potential impact on patient care is huge.

Stand Up To Cancer focuses on moving life-saving new treatments from "bench to bedside" in an accelerated timeframe. The research program, managed by our Scientific Partner, the American Association for Cancer Research (AACR), engages top scientists in a focused, disciplined search for new and effective treatments. Our research portfolio is guided by a blue-ribbon Scientific Advisory Committee chaired by Nobel laureate Phillip A. Sharp, PhD, Institute Professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and its Koch Institute for Integrative Cancer Research, with vice-chairs William G. Nelson, MD, PhD, director of the Johns Hopkins Sidney Kimmel Comprehensive Cancer Center in

Baltimore, and Arnold J. Levine, professor emeritus of systems biology at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, New Jersey. SU2C research teams are given significant funding, enough to make a difference in their search for answers.

Dream Teams include researchers from different scientific disciplines at various cancer centers and institutions, as well as other countries, which are often hundreds or thousands of miles apart. But, they focus on the same problem and offer unique approaches to solving that problem. The teams benefit from the cross-fertilization of ideas and shared use of data and observations. Researchers attack different parts of the problem bringing solutions together.

Pancreatic cancer is a particularly deadly disease, with a five-year survival rate at less than seven percent, which takes the lives of more than 40,000 people per year in the U.S. and over 8,000 in the U.K. The disease is typically diagnosed at a late stage and surgery is not an option for the majority of patients. The SU2C-Cancer Research UK-Lustgarten Foundation Pancreatic Cancer Dream Team is taking a new approach to tackle this problem. Team members believe that pancreatic cancers are in essence "wounds" that never heal, because biological events in tumors are similar to those in injured tissues where repair and regeneration are essential to restoration of normal function. However, unlike normal wound healing in which there is a shut-off mechanism, in tumors the process remains on, "hijacked" to constantly drive growth. The Dream Team believes that hot-spots in the cell's DNA called Super Enhancers (SE) control not only the cancer cell but also surrounding non-cancerous cells upon which the cancer cells rely for support. They aim to develop new approaches to reset malfunctioning SEs in pancreatic tumors, thereby dialing-up the sensitivity to chemotherapy and to anti-cancer immune cells, and pushing pancreatic tumors into lasting remission.

Patients with lung cancer that harbor a specific mutation in a gene called KRAS have poor responses to standard lung cancer therapies, making this type of lung cancer notoriously difficult to treat. The SU2C-American Cancer Society Lung Cancer Dream Team is incorporating targeted therapy — drugs designed to target the specific KRAS mutations — with immunotherapies, which use the body's immune system to attack the cancer. Using this approach, they hope markedly to improve the outcome for this group of lung cancer patients.

Ovarian cancer is typically diagnosed at an advanced stage and the death rate is high. Despite a good response to initial therapy, most ovarian cancers ultimately recur and require further treatment. This Dream Team is targeting a biological process in ovarian cancer cells called DNA repair using drugs called PARP inhibitors. PARP inhibitors have already shown benefit in treatment of ovarian cancers in which

one DNA repair pathway, called BRCA, is mutated. The Dream Team hopes to expand PARP inhibitor therapy to other DNA repair mutant cancers and to improve the PARP inhibitor therapeutic approach. They also are developing ovarian cancer genetic testing and prevention methods that will increase access to ovarian cancer genetic testing for more women and may prevent the occurrence of this fatal disease.

Colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer, the fourth leading cause of death from cancer in the world, and is second only to lung cancer as a cause of cancer death in developed countries, according to the World Health Organization's International Agency for Research on Cancer. Screening is the most effective strategy for decreasing the rate at which colorectal cancer occurs and number of deaths it causes. The MEDOCC Dream Team is focused on validation of highly sensitive molecular tests that detect cancer-specific molecules, called biomarkers, in stool samples, indicating the presence of cancer or precancerous lesions in the colon or rectum. The team is also developing a blood test that will fill a gap in treatment of early stage colorectal cancer by helping to identify patients who can benefit from chemotherapy after surgery.

The Van Andel Research Institute (VARI)-SU2C Epigenetics Dream Team is focusing on applying epigenetic therapies to multiple types of cancers. Epigenetic therapies are directed at mechanisms that control whether genes are turned on or off without altering the DNA sequence itself. The team is developing novel combinations of targeted therapies or immunotherapies with a promising drug, SGI-110, which they moved from the laboratory through clinical trials for treatment of acute myeloid leukemia. Their focus now also includes metastatic colorectal cancer and myelodysplastic syndromes.

Pancreatic cancer, one of the most deadly types of cancer, resists most forms of therapy, including immune therapy, which shows significant promise in other cancers. The SU2C-Lustgarten Foundation Pancreatic Cancer Dream Team is taking a “convergence” approach, bringing together experts in immunotherapy, genetics, informatics, biostatistics, regulatory/clinical trials, cancer biology, and pathology to tackle this problem. Their goal is to “reprogram” the tumor microenvironment so that immunotherapies can get to the cancer cells and kill them. The team is enrolling patients in five different clinical trials that use novel approaches to enhance anticancer immune responses in pancreatic cancer.

The Pediatric Cancer Dream Team is focusing on immunotherapies for childhood cancers such as leukemia and brain cancer, including an especially promising approach called chimeric antigen receptor T-cell (CAR T) therapy. In this approach, T-cells, a type of immune cells are taken from the patient to the laboratory, where the cells are genetically “armed” with a CAR that is designed to specifically seek out corresponding “flags” on the cancer cells. The modified CAR Ts are infused back into the patient to find and attack the cancer cells. The Dream Team is contributing to 15 pediatric CAR T clinical trials, and is continuing work to identify more cancer cell specific flags to direct CAR T therapy and to engineer the next generation CAR Ts. In addition, the Dream Team is working to develop a standardized diagnostic and management plan for Cytokine Release Syndrome, a common and potentially fatal complication that can occur when CAR T therapies are used.

This Dream Team is focused on one of the most rapidly growing and promising fields of cancer research — immunotherapy. Immunotherapy uses the body's own immune system to attack cancer. The team is focusing on two approaches: The first is adoptive cell therapy (ACT), in which a small number of cancer-killing T-cells (a type of immune cell) taken from patients are modified in the laboratory and grown into large armies of cancer-specific T-cells, and then transferred back to the patients, where they attack the cancer on a large scale. The other approach is called "checkpoint blockade," in which molecules that prevent the T-cells from doing their work are themselves blocked, unleashing the power of the anti-cancer T-cells. Work by members of this Dream Team contributed to recent FDA approval of two new "checkpoint inhibitor" immune therapies, which when combined are highly effective in treatment of melanoma. The Dream Team is running clinical trials examining immunotherapeutic approaches in more than a dozen different cancers. Included in their work are the first clinical trials to combine ACT with checkpoint inhibitor drugs.

A Dream Team supported by SU2C and the Prostate Cancer Foundation is focused on the problem of treatment resistance in metastatic prostate cancer. The team has collected more than 250 biopsies from patients with metastatic, treatment-resistant prostate cancer taken when the patient enters the trial and again after he has progressed onto therapy. The team is analyzing the molecular data from these biopsies to discover the mechanisms by which tumors are able to avoid the treatments' effects. Understanding the molecular characteristics of aggressive prostate cancer, the team hopes to develop new ways to treat this metastatic disease. Earlier this year, the Dream Team reported new insights into diagnosis of a more aggressive form of metastatic prostate cancer, potentially facilitating more effective treatment.

Prostate cancer therapies that work for some patients do not work for others. A precision approach is needed in which treatment is chosen based on the specific genetic characteristics of a patient's tumor. This Dream aims to use information about the genetic makeup from 500 castration-resistant prostate cancer (CRPC) patients to direct patients toward the treatment most likely to have an effect on their

tumor. Analysis of metastatic prostate tumors from a 150 men revealed that about 90 percent of the patients had clinically actionable mutations — meaning they had changes in genes that are already targets of approved or nearly approved drugs. They also discovered several other gene changes that were only present in the metastatic tumors (and not the primary prostate tumors) including mutations in either the BRCA1 or the BRCA2 genes, both of which are involved in repair of the cancer cells' DNA and are known to increase the risk of breast and ovarian cancers. This Dream Team is testing a drug called olaparib, a type of drug called a PARP inhibitor that is already approved to treat BRCA mutant ovarian cancers, in advanced prostate cancer patients. Members of the team recently published research that supported a recommendation that all men with advanced prostate cancer should consider being tested for inherited gene mutations to help guide their own treatment and to alert family members who might be at increased risk of cancer.

The SU2C-Melanoma Research Alliance (MRA) Dream Team is attacking metastatic melanoma, which carries a dismal prognosis with a five-year survival rate of only 10 to 15 percent. Their approach is to tailor treatment according to the specific genetic and biological makeup of the patient's tumor, choosing the most appropriate drugs from a pool of almost 30 agents made available by pharmaceutical companies. The team received, for the first time ever, approval by the FDA for a new way to achieve rapid genetic profiling of patients with melanoma. It is using this information to zero in on treatments that are precisely matched to the individual patient's tumors. The Dream Team has opened several sites across the United States for its precision medicine clinical trial, Stand Up To Cancer Consortium Genomics-Enabled Medicine for Melanoma (GEMM), and is enrolling patients for whom immune therapy has not worked or is not an option.

Bringing Epigenetic Therapy to the Forefront of Cancer Management

Epigenetic mechanisms, which control whether genes are turned on or off without altering the DNA sequence itself, play a significant role in cancer. Unlike DNA mutations, which are permanent, epigenetic changes can be reversed, which is the goal of epigenetic therapy. The goal of the **SU2C Epigenetics Dream Team** was to bring epigenetic therapy to clinical practice. The Dream Team's clinical trials have shown positive beneficial effects of epigenetic drug combinations in breast, non-small cell lung, and colon cancer.

The Dream Team, which completed its grant term in January 2015, has continued testing its discovery that epigenetic therapy may "prime" cancer cells to be more responsive to other treatments such as chemotherapy or immunotherapy. In August 2015, the team reported that an epigenetic treatment could turn on dormant viral signals in cancer cells, waking up natural immune response pathways that may strengthen patient responses to immune-based therapies. In other work, the Dream Team moved a new epigenetic drug (SGI-110) from laboratory experiments through early and now into advanced clinical trials in acute myeloid leukemia. If successful, this could be a life-saving therapy for patients. This Dream Team's ground breaking research is continuing through the Van Andel Research Institute-SU2C Epigenetics Dream Team launched in October 2014.

SU2C Pancreatic Cancer Dream Team:

Cutting off the Fuel Supply: A New Approach to the Treatment of Pancreatic Cancer

Pancreatic cancer is one of the deadliest cancers, with five-year survival rates at less than 7 percent. More than 50,000 new cases are expected to be diagnosed this year. Scientists have suggested that it may be possible to "starve" cancer cells to death by depriving them of a specific nutrient that they require for survival. The goal of this Dream Team was to understand how pancreatic cancers use nutrients and their surrounding environment to survive and grow so that new therapies can be developed. The Pancreatic Cancer Dream Team moved quickly into clinical trials of new drug combinations. The team demonstrated a significant improvement in overall pancreatic cancer survival with one combination, paclitaxel (Abraxane) plus gemcitabine (Gemzar), a combination that was approved by the FDA in 2013.

The team's grant term ended in May 2015 but two clinical trials continue, one that is testing if addition of a third drug, hydrochloroquine (an anti-malarial agent), improves paclitaxel/gemcitabine therapy for pancreatic cancer; and another testing if two older anti-growth drugs, metformin and rapamycin, can be used to maintain patient responses to chemotherapy after the treatment ends. The Dream Team developed new imaging methods to scan patients for pancreatic tumors and metastases. They also discovered that a vitamin D-like compound may reprogram the tumor environment — the cells and structures that surround and support cancer cells — in pancreatic cancer so that anticancer drugs work better, research that will continue as part of the new Pancreatic Cancer Dream Team announced in November 2015 (see below). Finally, in July 2015, the Dream Team reported their finding from in depth genetic analysis of pancreatic tumors. More than a third of the tumors they tested had mutations that may respond to existing drugs. In addition, they found that a blood test for tumor DNA may be a much more sensitive way to diagnose pancreatic cancer, which may allow patients to be treated earlier in the disease, hopefully improving their chances of survival.

More than 70 percent of common human cancers, especially women's cancers, have at least one mutation in a growth and survival biological circuit called the phosphoinositide 3-kinase signaling (PI3K) pathway. Drugs that block PI3K are effective in certain cancers and are currently in clinical trials. This Dream Team's goal was to predict which women's cancers would respond positively to PI3K inhibitors in order to personalize the use of these drugs for women who will benefit from them. During their grant term, the Dream Team was involved in clinical trials utilizing more than 25 PI3K pathway inhibitors. The team also persuaded two major pharmaceutical companies to collaborate in an unprecedented timeframe. As a result, the team moved a new combination of drugs – olaparib (Lynparza, which recently received FDA approval in ovarian cancer) plus an experimental PI3K inhibitor – into clinical trials, with very promising early results.

A number of the Dream Team's clinical trials continued after completion of the grant term. In April 2015, the Dream Team announced the results of their first clinical trial of the olaparib-PI3K inhibitor combination, and reported benefit in women with certain types of breast and ovarian cancers. Expanded clinical testing is now planned, and the work will continue through the SU2C-Ovarian Cancer Research Fund Alliance-National Ovarian Cancer Coalition Dream Team.

Cancer death occurs mainly when the original tumor spreads through the bloodstream – metastasizes – to other organs. Cancer cells that detach from the original tumor can sometimes be found in cancer patients' blood. These circulating tumor cells (CTCs) are extremely rare, with *one* CTC for every *1 billion* normal cells, making them hard to detect. The Dream Team's goal was to develop new technology to find, collect, and analyze CTCs. This technology could help physicians to diagnose and treat cancer. It could also help scientists learn how cancers spread and guide the care of cancer patients using targeted therapies. During their grant term, the CTC Dream Team developed new microfluidic chip technology, the CTC Chip, which can detect CTCs in a teaspoon of blood. This technology has proven to be a robust and broadly applicable technological platform for the entire cancer field.

The Dream Team's work has continued after completion of the grant term. Building from the development of their initial generations of CTC Chip technology that was supported by SU2C, the Dream Team reported in May 2015 generation of a new type of chip called the ClusterChip. Unlike earlier CTC Chips, which primarily isolate individual CTCs, the ClusterChip can isolate circulating cancer cell clumps. These clusters appear to be highly relevant to metastatic disease, so this new technology could be very important in understanding the biology of cancer metastasis and in patient-care management (diagnosis, prognosis, and new treatments).

The SU2C Breast Cancer Dream Team:

An Integrated Approach to Targeting Molecular Breast Cancer Molecular Subtypes and Their "Resistance" Phenotypes

The SU2C Breast Cancer Dream Team addressed some of the most significant issues related to the three major subtypes of breast cancer — estrogen receptor (ER) positive, HER2-positive, and triple-negative (simultaneously ER-negative, PR-negative, and HER2-negative). This Dream Team has also studied the resistance to treatment that these types of breast cancer develop over time. The Dream Team is using that information to develop innovative, less toxic therapies with the potential to improve the treatment outcomes for women with this disease.

A drug to treat advanced breast cancer in post-menopausal women, palbociclib (Ibrance), was granted accelerated approval by the FDA in February 2015 after the SU2C Breast Cancer Dream Team showed dramatically increased survival in women taking it. Before the approval, the FDA had granted the drug "Breakthrough Therapy" status to accelerate its review. In other work, members of this Dream Team recently found that metastatic breast cancer cells "borrow" from the biology of normal development, in which immature stem cells obey signals to mature into an adult cell type. Cancer stem cells, unlike their normal counterparts, remain immature and keep dividing and growing. By exploiting vulnerabilities in the very specialized programming of cancer stem cells, the researchers hope to develop new ways to treat metastatic disease.

Worldwide, persistent infection with certain types of the human papillomavirus (HPV) is responsible for more than 5 percent of all new human cancer cases. These viruses play a significant role in cancers of the cervix, vulva, vagina, anus, penis, and head and neck. Traditional vaccines can help prevent HPV infection; however, they do not benefit people who have already been infected. The team is focused on patients with HPV-driven cancers who relapse following initial therapy and have few therapeutic options. Their goal is to develop novel immunotherapy approaches to use vaccines to treat HPV-associated cancers. The team aims to open a clinical trial of a new vaccine for HPV-associated cancers this year.

Personalized medicine, in which information about a tumor's genetic makeup can guide selection of the best treatment for that particular patient, is the theme of this Translational Research Team launched by

SU2C and the Dutch Cancer Society. The team is analyzing DNA from the tumors of people with breast, colorectal, and pancreatic cancers and comparing the tumors' genetic makeup before and after patients undergo cancer treatment. By analyzing changes in the DNA and other molecular profiles, the team aims to predict whether patients will respond well to particular therapies, so that the most effective treatment can be chosen.

Ecology of the Tumor Microenvironment in Breast Cancer

Tumors consist not only of cancer cells, but also stromal (connective tissue) and immune cells that constitute the tumor microenvironment. Cancer cells can take on dramatically different properties based on the microenvironment. The clinical impact of the microenvironment is only becoming appreciated in recent years. In many different cancer types, including breast cancer, tumors with higher connective tissue fractions portend worse clinical outcomes. In contrast, tumors infiltrated by a type of white blood cell that kills cancer (CD8 T cells) have better clinical outcomes. Hence, tumors behave differently based on the collective behavior of the microenvironment. This Convergence Translational Research Team supported by the Breast Cancer Research Foundation (BCRF), and the V Foundation, investigates the idea that the microenvironment is an important determinant for the efficacy of cancer immunotherapy. The study brings together expertise in histology, image analysis, culturing cells from primary human breast tumors, bioinformatics, ecology modeling, and nanotechnology to study the ecology of the microenvironment in breast cancer and develop therapeutic and imaging applications. A detailed characterization of the breast cancer tumor microenvironment will be compared to normal breast tissue by analyzing to human primary breast tumors, 20 human metastatic breast tumors, and 20 normal human breast samples. We have begun to establish long-term cultures of cancer and stromal cells directly from primary/metastatic human breast tumors and are refining methods of single-cell molecular characterization to construct a set of population ecology models. The goal is to determine an interaction matrix that captures the basic way different cell types affect each other. The eventual goal is to devise novel ways (by using mouse models) to directly target cells in the tumor microenvironment in concert with traditional therapies to impact both the tumor and its supportive tissues.

Decades of cancer research and therapeutic development have made it clear that achieving durable control of metastatic solid tumors will usually require high-order therapeutic combinations. However, it has proven difficult to design such combinations. Unfortunately, combinatorial regimen design and delivery cannot be solved through empirical trial and error. Instead, new conceptual frameworks and approaches are needed to bring forth guiding principles for high-order therapeutic design/delivery. To address this urgent need, with support from Stand Up To Cancer, the National Science Foundation and the V Foundation we assembled a collaborative team that includes theoretical physicists and clinical investigators to integrate dynamic network modeling and evolutionary analyses with systematic cell death and therapeutic resistance data to predict high-order combinations and nominate dosing/scheduling principles. This approach addresses the following: i) leverages both functional data from preclinical systems and genomic/molecular data from drug-sensitive and drug-resistant tumors; ii) incorporates the multifactorial nature of cancer drug resistance into robust network models; iii) determines the extent to which inhibition of various network components induces cell death; iv) interrogates resistance heterogeneity by modeling all possible resistant states; and v) blends network dynamics and tumor evolutionary patterns. The team has begun to construct dynamic models for estrogen-receptor positive breast cancer and already identified potential new mechanisms that cancer cells use to acquire resistance to treatment.

Pancreatic ductal adenocarcinoma (PDAC) is a frequent cause of cancer death in the United States; it currently is the fourth most common cause of cancer death and is expected to become the second most common cause of cancer death within the next five years. Unlike virtually all other major cancers, pancreatic cancer is both increasing in incidence and has shown essentially no improvement in five-year survival over the past two decades. The exceptional lethality of pancreatic cancer is multifactorial, resulting from an intrinsically aggressive biology, lack of effective means of early detection, and poor responsiveness to systemic chemotherapy. Clearly, novel approaches to this disease are needed. This project builds on previous findings to further explore potential immunotherapeutic approaches to pancreatic cancer. A consortium of three high volume pancreatic cancer centers (Massachusetts General Hospital, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, and the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania) are organized to conduct a Phase I clinical trial that will build on a trial currently underway that recently demonstrated that immune cells are enriched in pancreatic tumors treated with vitamin D. With support from SU2C, the National Science Foundation, the Lustgarten Foundation for Pancreatic Research and the V Foundation, we have assembled a team of physicians, cancer immunobiologists, computational biophysicists, and engineers to better understand the unique immunological microenvironment of pancreatic cancer, develop the technologies needed to take advantage of therapeutic vulnerabilities, and to form a multi-institutional clinical consortium to readily implement these strategies to help change the course of this deadly disease

The last two decades have seen the development of increasingly effective cancer therapies that target different facets of transformed cells, including aberrant proliferation/survival, immune evasion, hyper-activated signaling pathways and dysregulated transcriptional programs. In a subset of cancers, including acute myeloid leukemia (AML) and non-small cell lung cancer with activating EGFR (epidermal growth factor receptor) mutations, these therapies lead to dramatic clinical responses in a significant proportion of patients. However, in the majority of AML and EGFR mutant lung cancer patients who respond to anti-cancer therapies, therapeutic relapse subsequently ensues, although often after a considerable interval, such that these responses do not lead to long-term cures. We are investigating the process of response to treatment, the basis for persistence of a subset of cells during clinical response, and the mechanisms driving subsequent therapeutic relapse in these two tumor types. This

involves combining genomic, transcriptional, and phenotypic assays of tumors at the various stages of therapeutic response and resistance with mathematical modeling approaches to understand the evolution of drug resistance, and to develop novel therapeutic strategies aimed to prevent the emergence of clinical resistance. To do this we have assembled a collaborative team of cancer biologists, physician scientists with expertise in clinical oncology, and mathematical modelers. The overall goal of this team with support from Stand Up To Cancer, the National Science Foundation and the V Foundation is to use studies of patient samples and accurate preclinical models to understand and to build quantitative dynamical models of the therapeutic response, and the emergence of clinical resistance. Already, we have begun to analyze bone marrow samples that were collected from patients on a trial ten years ago in order to understand how cancers evolve when undergoing different treatments. The understanding gained from our studies will be used to develop and test innovative therapeutic strategies with informed, multimodality therapeutic regimens that include tumor-directed therapies and immunotherapy. Our goal is to inform the use of combination therapies which are aimed to prevent therapeutic resistance and to maximize clinical response.

INNOVATIVE RESEARCH GRANTS

Innovative Research Grants (IRGs) are grants to individual, early-career investigators conducting high-risk, high-reward projects in cancer research. Each grant is for \$750,000 over three years.

- Melissa Skala, Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University is combining a new imaging approach with tumor organoid technology to record how different cells within the same tumor respond to drugs so that treatment selection for individual patients can be much more precise.

HPV is a very common virus; nearly 80 million people—about one in four—are currently infected in the United States. About 14 million people, including teens, become infected with HPV each year. HPV infection can cause cervical, vaginal, and vulvar cancers in women, penile cancer in men, and anal cancer, cancer of the back of the throat (oropharynx), and genital warts in both men and women. When should my child be vaccinated? The HPV vaccine is recommended for preteen boys and girls at age 11 or 12 so they are protected before ever being exposed to the virus. HPV vaccine also produces a more robust immune response during the preteen years. Finally, older teens are less likely to get health check-ups than preteens. If your teen hasn't gotten the vaccine yet, talk to their doctor or nurse about getting it for them as soon as possible. HPV infographic. 3 Things Parents Need to Know about Preventing Cancers The HPV vaccine is given in 3 shots. The second shot is given 1 or 2 months after the first shot. Then a third shot is given 6 months after the first shot. The CDC recommends reaching the full HPV vaccine series.
