"Tough Love"- Worldwide Association of Specialty Programs, a Utah-based company, runs behavior modification schools in locations including Samoa, Montana, Jamaica and the Czech Republic. Desperate parents with unmanageable children whose problems include drug and alcohol abuse, failure in school, and running away from home, pay from \$30 to \$40,000 to have their teenagers subjected to a grueling hoot camp regimen in locations far removed from their familiar haunts and habits. The effectiveness of the program has come under question because the teenagers are often subjected to mental and physical abuse, with inadequate medical care and no licensed therapists. Includes an interview with Dr. Gary Glass, a psychiatrist who feels that programs such as these can be helpful to some young people but pose a serious threat to others. "Torn By Hate" - today the Ku Klux Klan and other hate groups are on the rise. Includes reports on Bonnie Jouhari, U.S. government fair housing advocate and mother of a biracial daughter, who was forced to leave her home; the Rev. "Dad's Double Life"- Fifteen years ago, after 15 years of a seemingly happy marriage. Just last year, Elizabeth received a letter from the U.S. Government saying she owed them \$66,000 because she had been mistakenly receiving death benefits. After investigating the situation, Elizabeth discovered that Patrick is still alive, living in Texas under the name Tim Kingsbury and using his social security number that matches his real identity. 48 HOURS followed this story to an Ohio courtroom, where Patrick was convicted of insurance fraud and non-support and sentenced to spend four years in prison and to make full financial restitution (C: Russ Mitchell, Harold Dow - Sr. P: Reid Collins, Jr. - P: Mary Noonan Robichaux, Alec Sirken)

Vote Early, Vote Often- in 1993 President Clinton signed the National Voter Registration Act into law in an effort to encourage people to vote by making registration easier. Problems have arisen because it also made it easier to commit voter fraud. To underscore the problem Paul Miller, publisher of a newspaper in Carmel, California, invented a woman who not only registered to vote but was offered an absentee ballot. "I've Got a Secret*- a report on the popularity of cosmetic surgery in Brazil, whose capital city, Rio De Janeiro, has more plastic surgeons per capita than any city in the world.
