"The Suicide Of A 12-year-old" -on January 2, 2002, J. Daniel Scruggs, a 12-year-old Meriden, CT boy, the victim of relentless bullying at school, hung himself. His mother, Judith, was subsequently arrested, tried and found guilty of risk of injury to a minor for an unhealthy home environment. Tim McGuigan is trying to restart his career as a police officer, and John and Magi Bish have been speaking to police across the country, hoping to improve the way they handle missing child cases. Before Roger could testify he committed suicide leaving a note claiming that he was the killer. Bob Angleton was tried in state court and acquitted.
