Despite testimony to the contrary, Sakic still maintains his innocence. (C: Peter Van Sant - P: David Schneider)
"Cirque du Soleil"- a report on Cirque du Soleil, the global company which offers an unorthodox approach to producing circuses. The Montreal-based company founded in 1984 by three former Quebec street performers now employs 1,400 and last year netted \$20 million in profit. (C: Bob Simon - P: Suzanne St. Pierre)
"Veronica Guerin"- a followup to "Veronica Guerin" (OAD: 60 MINUTES OAD: 02/02/97), about the murder of Veronica Guerin, a journalist with Sunday Independent, one of Ireland's largest newspapers, who wrote articles exploring Dublin's drug underworld. The followup is an interview with Paul Williams, a reporter for Dublin's Sunday World and a friend of Veronica Guerin; and an update on the Dublin Police Department's ongoing investigation of the crime. - 06/16/99 "Unsafe Haven"- (special edition - 10:00-11:00p) - CBS News' year-long undercover investigation of Charter Behavioral Health Systems, the nation's largest chain of psychiatric hospitals, focuses on Charter's children's wards, where CBS found evidence of deaths, injuries and hospital falsification of medical records in institutions from Massachusetts to California. Charter has 91 hospitals in 32 states across the country, which admit about 60,000 children and adolescents every year and take in more than \$300 million of taxpayer money annually. Dr. Reeves who also discovered that the woman did not in fact have cancer, initiated an investigation of a total of 19 similar deaths and was subsequently suspended from duty. "The Shame Of Srebrenica"- a report on the role of peacekeepers amid speculation that U.S. troops will be sent to Kosovo. Includes interviews with Dutch Army officers who were sent to protect the Muslims in Srebrenica. "Mixed Company"- a report on the problems that arise when young, mentally ill, potentially violent patients are housed in nursing homes with the elderly. - 06/03/99 "A Family Accused"- focuses on cases where people accused of sexually abusing children were tried and imprisoned based on little real evidence other than the testimony of young children. Includes: a report on the Amiraault family who ran the Fells Acres Day School in Malden, Massachusetts and whose careers and lives were ruined by seemingly unfounded charges; and an update on "Free My Family" (OAD: 04/03/97). - 06/07/99 "(MONDAY MYSTERIES) Dad's Double Life"- Fifteen years ago, after 15 years of a seemingly happy marriage, Elizabeth Welsh's husband, Patrick, left her and their two sons what appeared to be a suicide note and disappeared. Just last year, Elizabeth received a letter from the U.S. Government saying she owed them \$64,000 because she had been mistakenly receiving death benefits. After investigating the situation, Elizabeth discovered that Patrick is still alive, living in Texas under the name Tim Kingsbury and using his social security number that matches his real identity. 48 HOURS followed this story to an Ohio courtroom, where Patrick was convicted of insurance fraud and non-support and sentenced to spend four years in prison and to make full financial restitution (C: Russ Mitchell, Harold Dow - Sr. P: Reid Collins, Jr. - P: Mary Noonan Robichaux, Alec Sirken) (OAD: 10/29/98 with an update)

- 06/10/99 "Class of 2000: Driven To Extremes"- seeks context and perspective in the wake of the Columbine High School shooting in Littleton, Colorado and examines educational and societal measures that address youth violence in the Class of 2000 and beyond. The broadcast includes reports on: the Giddings State School outside Austin, Texas, where young criminals are treated with group therapy; Harry Lee Coe, Chief Prosecutor, Tampa, Florida who feels that juveniles charged with violent crimes should be tried in adult and given long, hard sentences; the shooting in Moses Lake, Washington, junior high school; Dr. William Pollack, a psychologist who feels that the fault lies in the way boys are being raised; survivors of the Littleton shooting; psychiatrist Dr. Daniel Amen who feels that violent behavior is caused by brain abnormalities; and a disaster that was averted at Burlington High school in Wisconsin. - 06/14/99 "(MONDAY MYSTERIES) The Killer Next Door"- in 1979, Donald Miller, a graduate of Michigan State University who majored in criminal justice, was sentenced to 30 to 50 years for rape and attempted murder, but was suspected in the unsolved murders of four other local young women. In a highly unusual plea bargain, Miller agreed to work with police in trying to recover his memories of other murders. The deal -- if he was successful in remembering, Miller would plead guilty to manslaughter charges for the other murders and no additional time would be added to his sentence. After serving 20 years, Miller was up for parole and only the discovery that he had in his possession, while in prison, a strangulation device in the form of a shoelace, has kept from going free. Currently a bill which could keep serial predators locked up is before the Michigan legislature.
