48 HOURS MYSTERY: 'Blood Feud' - Nancy Seaman, an award-winning teacher living in Farmington Hills, Michigan, an exclusive Detroit suburb, was accused of the 2004 hatchet/stabbing murder of her husband, Bob. She admits killing him, but says it was self-defense, claiming that he had been mentally and physically abusing her for years. The couple's two sons -- Greg and Jeff -- differ concerning their parent's marriage and the life they all shared. Greg sympathizes with his mother, claiming that his father was abusive and that his mother's life was in danger. Jeff, who testified for the prosecution, denies that his mother was a battered wife. Nancy Seaman was tried and found guilty of murder in the first degree and was sentenced to life in prison. She is appealing her conviction. Includes interviews with: Nancy Seaman; her sons Greg and Jeff; defense attorney Larry Kaluzny; Lisa Ortlieb, prosecutor in the case and director of Oakland County's Domestic Violence Unit; and Dr. Lenore Walker, an expert on abused women. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: 'Prescription For Murder' - in Chester, S.C., 12-year-old Chris Pittman fatally shot his grandparents as they slept, stole money, weapons and his grandfather's truck and set fire to the house before fleeing. Having confessed to the crime, Chris was tried, convicted of murder and sentenced to 30 years in prison. Lawyers for the defense claim that the anti-depressant Zoloft, a drug prescribed for the boy shortly before the murders, turned him from a loving grandson into a killer. Includes interviews with: Chris Pittman, now sixteen; Pastor Chris Snelgrove, New Hope Methodist Church, Chester, S.C.; Joe Pittman, Chris' father; Delora Duprey, Chris' maternal grandmother; his older sister Danielle; Andy Vickery, defense attorney; Barney Giese, prosecutor; and Dr. Loretta Atkins, a forensic psychiatrist. Pfizer, Zoloft's manufacturer, agreed with the jury's guilty verdict for Chris Pittman, denying that Zoloft caused the boy's problems. Unless he wins an appeal or a new trial is ordered,

Christ Pittman will remain in prison until he is 42 years old.

 Memphis, Tennessee medical examiner was apparently attacked on
 June 1, 2002, as he was leaving work. He was found wrapped
 head-to-toe in barbed wire with a bomb strapped to his neck.
 Dr. Smith survived but expressed concern that his assailant
 might attack again. The police at first focused on Philip
 Workman, a man Dr. Smith's testimony helped keep on death row,
 but further investigation showed that Workman was not involved

A psychiatrist who examined Priven said that the murder was committed during a psychotic episode and that he was no longer a threat to anyone.
