04/07/04 **"Juror No. 4"- Pts. I & II** - seventy-nine-year-old Ruth Jordan discusses her role in the jury trial of Tyco CEO Dennis Kozlowski and CFO Mark Swartz, who were accused of corporate fraud. Jordan was one of 12 jurors who, after sitting through five months of testimony, had their deliberations cut short when the judge declared a mistrial. She denies charges that: she flashed an OK sign to the defendants; that she was a wealthy eastside blueblood who came to court in a limousine; and that she had used an ethnic slur. Also includes interviews with Bruce Schaefer, a lawyer who is writing a book about the trial and Peter McEntegart, a fellow juror. (C: Dan Rather - P: Denise Schrier Cetta)

04/14/04 **"The Greatest Story Ever Sold"** - a followup to "Faith, Hope & Politics" (OAD: 02/08/04), a report on the impact of Evangelical Christians on American politics and culture. The followup focuses on the immense popularity of the "Left Behind" novels by Rev. Tim LaHaye and Jerry Jenkins and the rapture, the Evangelical belief that every true-believing Christian and every child under the age of twelve will vanish and go to a better place leaving all others to face tribulation. (C: Morley Safer - P: Barbara Dury, John Marks)
"The Interrogator" - an interview with "Tom," an interrogator from Guantanamo who was sent to Cuba by the Defense Intelligence Agency to design and supervise the questioning of suspected terrorists. "Tom" talks about David Hicks, an Australian cowboy who is being held as an illegal combatant. Hicks has been selected to be among the first at Guantanamo to stand trial although he has only recently had access to a lawyer. Terry and Bev Hicks, David's father and stepmother maintain that their son is an adventurer, not a terrorist. (C: Scott Pelley - Janet Klein, Michael Bronner)
"Choosing The Sex" - a report on PGD (pre-implantation genetic diagnosis), an embryo screening procedure developed for the purpose of identifying embryos that carry serious, often deadly genetic diseases, but are increasingly used to help couples choose the sex of their unborn child. Includes interviews with Dr. Jeffrey Steinberg, a California fertility doctor, who uses PGD; and Dr. Mark Hughes, who pioneered the procedure but feels that it should be used only to root out disease. (C: Vicki Mabrey - P: Miriam Weintraub)
"A Few Minutes With Steve Hartman" - "Memo To IRS: Audit Me" - Hartman wants recognition for his honesty over the last 25 years

- 04/21/04 **"Munchausen Syndrome By Proxy"** - Munchausen Syndrome by Proxy is a form of child abuse involving a mother who tries to get attention for herself by making her baby sick. The crime was first identified by Dr. Roy Meadow, a British pediatrician whose testimony in English courts sent many mothers to jail for murder. Recently, decisions in a few of these cases have been reversed and there is reason to question the validity of Dr. Meadow's expertise. Includes interviews with: Earl Howe, a member of the British Parliament's House of Lords; and Dr. Jim Morris, a pathologist and authority on SIDS (sudden infant death syndrome). (C: Scott Pelley - P: Paul Gallagher)
- "The Brothers Klitschko"** - interviews with the Klitschko brothers - Vitali and Vladimir -- who grew up behind the Iron Curtain, have movie-star looks; Ph.Ds; and are world-class heavyweight boxers. Includes interviews with legendary boxing trainer Emmanuel Steward; and boxing commentator Max Kellerman. (C: Dan Rather - P: Michael Rosenbaum, Elliott Kirschner)
- "The Unicorns Of Shangri-La"** - report on rhinoceros unicornis, a rare endangered species of rhino with a single horn found in the jungles of South Asia. 60 MINUTES II traveled to Nepal, the inspiration for the fictional Shangri-La, to join a group of scientists and park rangers whose mission is to save the rhinos by learning more about the way they live. Includes interviews with: Dr. Tirtha Maskey, the director of Nepal's national parks; and Eric Dienerstein, a biologist. (C: Lara Logan - P: Michael Rosenbaum)
- "A Few Minutes With Bill Geist"** - "Earth Day And The Automobile"- Geist looks around at the New York Auto Show
- 04/28/04 **"Court Martial In Iraq"** - last month, the U.S. Army announced that 17 soldiers in Iraq had been removed from duty after charges of mistreating Iraqi prisoners at the Abu Ghraib prison. Six of them were facing court martial. Includes photos of the mistreatment obtained by 60 MINUTES II that led to an Army investigation implicating military personnel ranging from Brig. Gen. Janice Karpinsky, the officer in charge of Abu Ghraib, to the military police guarding the prisoners. Includes interviews with Gen. Mark Kimmitt, Deputy Director of Coalition Operations in Iraq; former U.S. Marine Lt. Col. Bill Cowan; former CIA Bureau Chief Bob Baer; Staff Sgt. Chip Frederick, one of the soldiers facing court martial; Gary Myers, Frederick's attorney. (C: Dan Rather - P: Mary Mapes)
- "The Virus Hunters"** - a report on a group of American scientists who have set up a sophisticated biocontainment lab in northern Malaysia where they are working to find the origin of a new and deadly virus called Nipah. Includes interviews with: Dr. Abdul Aziz, U.S. Government scientist; Dr. Hume Field, an Australian virus expert; and Drs. Jon Epstein and Peter Daszak, virus hunters with the Consortium for Conservation Medicine. (C: Scott Pelley - P: Margaret Ebrahim, Jill Landes) (OAD: 01/21/04)
- "Love In The 21st Century"** - examines why Americans are spending over a billion dollars a year in an attempt to find the perfect mate including reports on a number of online dating services: match.com; Table For Six; Dinner In The Dark; and Speed dating. Also includes interviews with: Janis Spindel, a successful matchmaker, and Trish McDermott, vice president of the Dallas-based match.com. C: Bob Simon - P: Neeraj Khemlani)
- "A Few Minutes With Steve Hartman"** - Getting It Right" - mistakes that appeared in the correction page of newspapers

48 HOURS (continued)

- 04/21/04 **48 HOURS INVESTIGATES: "Diana's Secrets"** - explores information obtained in a confidential French investigation of the fatal accident (08/31/97) that killed Britain's Princess Diana and her lover, Dodi al-Fayed. 48 HOURS obtained thousands of pages of confidential documents, including the forensic analysis of the driver, Henri Paul, analysis of the car and never-before-seen photos of the Princess at the accident scene. In addition, the broadcast looks at the question of whether Diana was pregnant. Also included are interviews with the men who served as confidantes and advisers to the Princess who reveal, seven years after her death, what it was like to protect Diana. Because details of the French probe into the accident were not made public until now, conspiracy theories continue to flourish about the deaths of the Princess and Dodi al-Fayed. The program examines each conspiracy theory, examining the findings in the secret French dossier. Also examined is a claim by Mohammed al-Fayed, Dodi's father, that Henri Paul was not drunk and that the French switched the forensic samples. The report also reveals that Paul was receiving money from an unknown source before that fateful night. It also looks into rumors that Princess Diana's real 'prince charming' was Dr. Hasnat Khan, whom she met at the Royal Brompton Hospital. In January, the British government opened its own inquiry. None of the "johns" who patronized the brothel were exposed or arrested. Monica Montemayor, managed to stay out of jail but is fighting to regain custody of her young daughter. Shelton's husband, Clint, was convicted of Hierro's murder and is serving a life sentence. Hierro's widow claimed that Shelton was also involved. Shelton successfully sued Marisa for libel. A judge awarded her \$5 million in damages and ruled that, based upon the evidence presented, Catherine Mehaffey Shelton is innocent of the allegations of murder and assault. Gary Klinger of the Polk County Sheriff Department's Missing Persons unit, the stranger was identified as Franz Konstantin Baehring, a German national involved in pornography and prostitution, who lured the girl to Greece with the help of accomplices. Baehring is behind bars on charges of child abduction and exploitation. Stephanie Lavoie and her Congressman, Rep. Learning of her husband's infidelity, the doctor's wife Karen ran out of her home, pointed a gun into her mouth, and accidentally tripped, setting the gun off. She died three months later and her death was ruled suicide. Stephens married Stephanie and shortly after became seriously ill, suffering from liver failure, hepatitis C and diabetes. Stephanie said that her husband became depressed as his health declined and on May 1, 2001, she said she woke to find him lying dead next to her. Despite her claim that she had nothing to do with Dr. Stephens' death, authorities were suspicious. An autopsy revealed the presence in Stephens' blood of the drug Atricurium, a muscle relaxer used in surgery. Stephanie was tried and found guilty of murder and will serve at least 30 years in prison. She is trying for an appeal.
