ASSESSMENT MEETING OF COMMUNITY NEEDS
February 7, 2008
12:00 noon – 1:30 p.m.

The meeting was lead by Darren Dishman, KFJX General Manager and Danny Thomas, KOAM General Manager. Kristi Spencer, News Director and Dowe Quick, Senior Anchor were also in attendance and presented questions to the focus group.

The following leaders attended the focus meeting to help us decide some of the major issues in our community. Jeff McDonald, Girard Police Chief, was unable to attend.

Jane Wilson, Downtown Parsons Kansas. Issue: Strengthen independent ownership in retail.

Charles Cook, Salvation Army, Pittsburg KS. Issue: Raising children's expectations and standards to address poverty.

Dennis Burke, Baxter Springs Kansas Schools. Issue: Preparing children for the 21st century job skills.

Sandy Morris & Vicky Spears, Children's Advocacy Center, Pittsburg KS. Issues: Child abuse significantly higher. Access to quality healthcare. Lack of collaboration between agencies.

Kayla Joy, Mt. Carmel Medical Center, Pittsburg KS. Issue: Change of community leadership. Educate for someone to step up. Access to quality healthcare.

Brad Hodson, Pittsburg State University. Issue: Diminishing state funding hurting access to higher education.

Strengthen independent ownership in retail.

We need to strengthen the independent ownership of all businesses. Downtown retail cannot compete with Wal-Mart. It's a national issue. We need to keep and foster independent businesses. A solution would be education, training, webinars to help train business owners. Many owners are not doing emails or newsletters and some don't even own a computer.

Raising children's expectations and standards to address poverty.

We have an issue with the lack of education of our youth. Mom and Dad don't encourage their kids to do better. As far as education, they also need to be taught practical things such as having a checking account and a savings account. Catching this problem with young adults is too late. There is a problem with the home environment. Some think the school system should not only teach our children, but also take care of them. Children are formed by their upbringing and their surroundings. Families are setting low standards. We're not offering a solution to this problem.

We're a band-aid on society. It's easier to band-aid a problem than to come up with the solution. Don't think we are following through. We need to raise children's expectations and standards to address the poverty and lack of education. People who live in poverty have a whole different set of policies. We have to break the cycle. A lot of things people take for granted. We were taught education is important. We have so many poverty children. We have more poverty in Cherokee county per capita. We in the school system would like you to know we have a good education system. We have to raise not only the kids, but the parents as well. Kids need to have a higher vision of themselves.

Child abuse significantly higher.

Child sexual abuse awareness is an issue. Child abuse in this area is significantly higher. Awareness of child abuse and the Children's Advocacy Center is a problem. No one seems to know who we are or what we do. The abuse is significantly higher in Cherokee county. It goes along with poverty and drug abuse.

Preparing children for the 21st century job skills.

We need to do a better job at preparing our kids for 21st century job skills. We're trying to bridge the poverty gap a little bit and doing so with issuing every child a laptop.

Change of community leadership.

Community leadership development is a problem. We don't see ourselves as eligible to take leadership roles at all levels of the community. We need to make everyone aware of their ability to be a leader in our community regardless of how much money you have or what house you live in. We ask ourselves where our city fathers have gone, and realize, it's us. Who makes the decisions now? Pittsburg has changed their leadership program. It used to be that the city fathers were entrepreneurs and owners of large companies.

Diminishing state funding hurting access to higher education.

Breaking the cycle of poverty and secondary pricing for tuition is a problem. With diminishing state support we're not getting the funds we need. We need access to higher education. Diminishing state and federal funding for the Children's Advocacy Center is harming us. We've had to look at community funding. There is a lack of collaboration between same agencies with same goals.

Access to quality healthcare.

Darren asked the group how they felt about crime and drug abuse.

We all know that crime is a national problem. We have a lot of burglaries in this area that have to do with drugs. We also have a lot of child abuse cases that are related to drugs.

Cold medicines and prescription drugs are a problem in schools. There are a lot of kids on antidepressants and kids with bipolar situations.

Dowe: The station has a huge presence in this community. All of the issues seem to have an economic basis; lack of prosperity and guidance of young people. What role should the media have to improve the needs?

The group suggested doing things that will encourage young people since it's hard to get them to listen. Educate young people. An example was given by Sandy of the Children's Advocacy Center where they bought a curriculum and sold it to the schools. Many schools purchased it. It deals with inappropriate treatment by another person. Sandy said they are frustrated by the no child left behind project because there isn't time to teach about living and preventing abuse of a child. People in the past just didn't believe we had a problem with child abuse. It was something no one would talk about. It's up to all of us adults to help with this problem. We need great community awareness that there is a problem. Maybe there is a way to incorporate the abuse issue with the Kansas Health Foundation since there is a lot of emphasis into child development right now and a lot of funding for it.

There were comments about how the TV station has done a lot of segments and has done a good job. Issues have been timely and the TV station has the ability to put it out there and it makes it accepted by the community. Jennifer does a good job covering court cases.

Dowe: Is raising the issue of awareness enough?

Maybe we should put more help numbers out there.

Darren, Danny, Dowe: We have done public service announcements in the past following a focus meeting. We've also come up with lists and posted them on our website. Statistics were also mentioned. Statistics are shocking regarding child abuse. Statistics are powerful. We also did a call to action to our website. We had positive feedback with the teen pregnancy issues. We are not a service agency, but we have a huge megaphone.

There was discussion about consequences of the abusers. We live in a world of little consequences. We need to hold people accountable for not enforcing the consequences.

Dowe: How has the local media portrayed your service or business?

PSU gets a lot of positive coverage.

For Mt. Carmel, if we don't tell you, how would you know?

Children's Advocacy Center would like to see more PSAs on child abuse and domestic abuse. There are some PSAs that have been very touching. They need to have phone numbers on them. That's how the station can help; a higher visibility not connected to a news story.

We have a common theme and it is kids. Crawford County has a youth leadership program for 6th graders. Those types of programs are important and it's important to make people aware. Maybe other counties would want to do more of that.

Mr. Burke with Baxter Springs Schools feels they have good communications with the TV station. Appreciates that we don't publicize bomb threats.

Mr. Cook with The Salvation Army said most TV communication has been positive with KOAM/FOX and across the region, thinks we do a good job keeping it honest.

Ms. Wilson with Downtown Parsons said we've had coverage in Parsons and the TV station was there. She talked about the National Night Out Against Crime program. She said the station's coverage helped them try to find a better solution. With the Night Out program you bring the community together with your law enforcement, fire department, etc. With the TV station there, they were very visible. August 6th is the National Night Out Against Crime. Parsons Night Out is September 11th.

Find a focus in the community and work to solve it. Parsons has the 365 day program that they do with a partner, where you solve a problem in 365 days.

Dowe: It is easier to find problems, not solutions. Identifying problems is sometimes the first step to solving a problem. We try to expose the problem.

Mr. Hodson with PSU wanted to make a plea for balance. If it's crime and such all of the time, instead of something positive, it takes a downward spiral.

Ms. Joy with Mt. Carmel feels we do a good job of covering the celebrations and successes.

Dowe: Are role models important?

Danny mentioned Leadership Awards. It was a marketing idea to send a message to others to do more.

The Heroes spots are good. The kids see a lot of people they know.

We should focus on students to do more. Students need to know they are leaders now.

Dowe: Our 1st focus seems to be the influence on young people and our 2nd is economic conditions. How does this impact the other issues? Is there something we can do as broadcasters?

We have a disproportionate percentage of working poor that are not eligible for opportunities or don't have the means to better themselves. There's a lack of opportunities here. There is the working poor and underinsured. It spirals. We have Healthwave insurance in Kansas. It is still under-utilized. TV stations could tell what jobs are out there, what skills are needed, and where

you go to get the skills. People are looking for jobs that help their family. It would be helpful if they knew what jobs were out there. Here's financial help. People want to do well for their family. People in poverty see their kids as possessions. We need to get something that people find valuable and are attainable and turn on the incentive for them.

Darren mentioned that statistics can help tell a story. Also helpful are stories where a life has been changed. It speaks volumes.

Dowe: We show stories from different angles. We may tell the story from the abuser. We may tell a success story from a family that's turned their life around. This has greater impact. These things inspire people. We may come to you to help us find these stories.

Kristi: That gives you the balance that was mentioned. If we don't have the human element, that story may not be told. It's not worth the time unless it has an emotional effect.

Ms. Morris with The Children's Advocacy Center talked about a presentation they participated in for high school kids where 20 girls got up on stage and told their experiences. It was really powerful. They talked about date rape and domestic violence.

- 01/01/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Right Or Wrong"** - Susan Wright, a 27-year-old stay-at-home mother from Houston, Texas stabbed her husband, Jeff, 193 times. She claims she was a victim of domestic abuse and that on Jan. 13, 2003, her husband attacked her with a knife and she fought back in self-defense. Prosecutors charged that she was a cold blooded killer who lured her husband to bed with the promise of sex, tied him up and then brutally murdered him. They questioned why it took Susan five days to report the crime; why she buried Jeff's body in the backyard; and why she tried to clean up evidence of the death. A jury found Susan Wright guilty of murder and sentenced her to 25 years in prison. Includes interviews with: Susan's sister, Cindy Stewart; the victim's father, Ron Wright and his brother, Ron Wright Jr.; prosecutor Kelly Seigler; and attorneys for the defense Neal Davis and Richard "Racehorse" Haynes. - 01/05/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Death Without Mercy"** - On November 29, 2005, firemen put out a fire in a house in Morgantown, West Virginia -- and discovered in a bedroom the charred remains of Jimmy Michael, who lived there with his second wife Shelly, a registered nurse. A medical examiner's report found that Jimmy was dead before the blaze had even started, and that he had been injected with a lethal dose of a drug called rocuronium, used in hospital procedures when doctors need to temporarily paralyze muscles. Police investigation led to the arrest of Shelly Michael for the murder of her husband. At her trial, the jury found her guilty of first degree murder, but included a recommendation of mercy. She will be eligible for parole in 2027. - 01/19/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Secrets of Palm Beach"** - a report about the murder of Linda Fishman, a wealthy widow found murdered in her Florida home. The childless woman had always been known for her generosity and at first it was suspected that her nephew was responsible for the crime. As the investigation continued, police learned that there was no shortage of men in the life of Linda Fishman -- a financially strapped nephew, a former lover, a registered sex offender. Police were stymied, until an anonymous letter made them aware of Frederick Kretzmer, a man with whom Linda had had a relationship. After their breakup he joined the Navy, served time in prison, then resurfaced and he looked up an old girlfriend, Gissele Ospina. It was she who wrote the anonymous letter giving detectives their break. Kretzmer gave a full confession in open court and was sentenced to 20 years in prison. Included are interviews with Fishman's nephew, Michael Jamrock; Police Officers Eric Keith, Tim McCabe, Richard Loundsbury, Kenneth Buss; prosecutor Angela Miller; Kretzmer's former roommate Mario Segura; former girlfriend Gissele Ospina. - 01/22/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "In Too Deep"** - An account of the investigation into the August 2005 murder and mutilation of 21-year-old Jennifer Cave in Austin, Texas, in the apartment of her friend Colton Pitonyak. Pitonyak was tried for the murder, found guilty and sentenced to 55 years. Laura Hall, Pitonyak's girlfriend, admitted that she had gone to his apartment, at his request, right after the murder -- but claims that she did not know that she was going to be confronted there with a dead body in the bathtub. She then -- out of fear for her own life, she says -- drove Pitonyak, at his insistence, to Mexico. After their arrest in Mexico, Hall was interrogated, charged with hindering the apprehension of Pitonyak. In his testimony at his own trial, Pitonyak implied that Hall took part in the dismemberment of Jennifer Cave's body after her death. The prosecution afterwards came up with witnesses who said that Laura told them that she was involved in the dismemberment. Put on trial for that, and for helping Pitonyak escape, she was found guilty and sentenced to five years in prison. She is appealing her conviction. Dennis Priven, a 24-year-old fellow Peace Corps worker from Brooklyn, N.Y., who appeared to be obsessed with Gardner, was charged by Tongan police. At his trial, Priven faced death by hanging if found guilty. His attorney argued that he was a paranoid schizophrenic and was therefore not guilty by reason of insanity. A Tongan jury agreed, but with no Tongan facilities available to treat Priven, Peace Corps officials and State Department officials arranged for him to be returned to the U.S., where they promised he would be admitted to a psychiatric institution. Having returned to the U.S., the Peace Corps learned that they had no legal authority over Priven. A psychiatrist who examined Priven said that the murder was committed during a psychotic episode and that he was no longer a threat to anyone. With that diagnosis, Priven was free and returned to Brooklyn. However, based on her erratic behavior and her own confession just hours after the crime had occurred, prosecutors believed that Jenny was a woman scorned and had shot her husband out of anger. Prosecutors questioned why immediately after she had shot Drew, she went shopping at Wal-Mart, where she purchased several suspicious items; why she cleaned and made repairs to her apartment before police arrived; why Drew's body was placed in a storage bin and dragged outside; and why hours went by before she dialed 911. Based on testimony and the fact that her defense attorney never called an expert in domestic violence, Jenny was found guilty of murder and sentenced to 23 years in prison. After the trial, Correspondent Richard Schlesinger met with seven members of the jury, who stated that had they been permitted to hear testimony regarding her life with Drew, it may have affected the outcome. With only a fingerprint and the belief that one of the officer's bullets hit the killer, investigators searched for more than 45 years for the man who murdered two of their own. Important clues, including the gun used in the murders, were uncovered but almost 3,000 suspects were checked, all leading to dead ends. Two things helped police to crack the case: a call in 2002 from a woman who identified her uncle as the murderer and the use of forensic technology unavailable at the time of the crimes. Finally, investigators were able to track down the killer -- Gerald Mason -- an unsuspecting 69-year-old family man living in Columbia, S.C. Having pled guilty to murder, Mason was sentenced to prison and will be eligible for parole in 2017. Includes an interview with Darren R. Levine, Deputy District Attorney of Los Angeles County as well as other officers who were involved in the case. 02/02/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "No Way Out" (10:00-11:00p)** - In August 2005, after Hurricane Katrina had passed over southeastern Louisiana, many people thought the region had been spared from the most severe damage. But the worst was yet to come: on Monday, August 29th, the region's protective levees started to fail, and entire communities were overwhelmed by floodwater. In St. Bernard Parish, just southeast of New Orleans, thousands had evacuated the region, but others had stayed behind to shelter in place, including the residents, staff, and operators of St. Rita's Nursing Home, Sal and Mabel Mangano. The Mangano's and their staff saved 24 of the residents and got them to safety, but the wall of water and its aftermath left 35 of the residents dead. But when the bodies were discovered at the nursing home, no one thought of the Manganos as heroes. Having been evacuated to Texas, Sal and Mabel returned to Louisiana, where they were each arrested and charged with 35 counts of negligent homicide and 24 counts of cruelty to the infirm. Prosecutors claimed that the Manganos had no intention of evacuating, based on the inadequate evacuation plan on file with the state; the fact that the other three nursing homes in the parish had made the decision to evacuate; that the parish government adequately stressed the importance of evacuation; that telephone calls made by parish officials to the Manganos went unheeded; and that the Manganos turned down an offer of buses to help evacuate their residents. At the trial, several family members of the deceased testified that the Manganos had told them they would evacuate the nursing home before Hurricane Katrina struck - something both Sal and Mabel deny. The defense strategy was to make the trial about the government failures that led to the flooding of St. Bernard Parish -- and it was successful: they were both found not guilty on 118 counts. The police began to search for the baby, but soon the investigation began to focus on the parents as authorities became convinced that they knew more about their baby's disappearance than they admitted. Sheriff's detectives planted secret recording devices in the Aisenberg's home. After listening to and recording thousands of hours of conversations, the federal government brought an indictment against the couple, charging them with conspiracy and lying to investigators: charges which, if proven true, could send the Aisenbergs to prison for 30 years. Eventually, a pair of judges reviewed the case and the charges against the Aisenbergs were dropped. The couple still believe that Sabrina will be found alive and returned to them. 02/09/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Who Killed the Beauty Queen?" (10:00-11:00p)** - On December 15, 2005, 19-year-old college student and aspiring beauty queen Nona Dirksmeyer was found murdered inside her Russellville, Arkansas apartment. Nona's boyfriend Kevin Jones said he had been trying to reach her numerous times by phone but that his calls and messages had gone unanswered. Eventually, he and his mother decided to stop by Nona's apartment, where they discovered Nona's body. Police determined that she had been murdered, beaten to death with the heavy metal base of a floor lamp and left in her blood-spattered living room. Investigators questioned Kevin and he agreed to take a polygraph, which he failed. That, along with Kevin's palm print in Nona's blood on the murder weapon, kept the investigation focused on Kevin. Police believed that he flew into a murderous rage when he discovered a condom wrapper on her kitchen counter. After police questioned and cleared Nona's other sexual partners, Kevin became their only suspect. At the trial, prosecutors based their case on the blood evidence found on the light bulb. However, the texture of the blood was crucial to the case and police described it as being tacky. That description supported the defense claim that the print was left when Nona's body was discovered and was still sticky when police arrived at the crime scene. The jury agreed and Kevin Jones was found not guilty. Recently, Kevin's defense team found a match to the DNA found on the condom wrapper and a special prosecutor has been appointed to look into the case. 02/16/08 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Rage On The Run" (9:00-10:00p)** - bodybuilder David Bieber of Ft. Myers, Florida starting using steroids in high school and as an adult began selling them to support his expensive career. He went into business with fellow bodybuilder Markus Mueller, a German who was able to smuggle the drugs into the U.S. from Europe. Bieber had an affair with Mueller's girlfriend, Danielle LaBelle, and subsequently married her. In February 1995, Bieber drove LaBelle to Mueller's home to retrieve her purse while he waited in the car. When LaBelle found Mueller dead in the doorway she suspected that Bieber had killed him. Two men admitted to police that Bieber had hired them to kill Mueller, but before he could be arrested, Bieber disappeared. He bought the birth certificate of a deceased child, Nathan Wayne Coleman, took on his identity and, in 1996, fled to Leeds, England where he was undiscovered for almost eight years. On December 26, 2003, Leeds police apprehended a stolen car; the driver was Bieber. In the process of being handcuffed, he opened fire on the three unarmed arresting officers and escaped. One officer died of his wounds and a nationwide manhunt was launched. Bieber was finally caught, was tried for the murder of the police officer, and sentenced to life in prison. Danielle LaBelle divorced Bieber in 2003. There are no plans to try him for the murder of Markus Mueller. Koulis, a plastic surgeon, had called 911 when she stopped breathing, and said he performed CPR, but that there was no pulse. When Lesa was rushed to the emergency room, the doctors trying to save her life said Dr. Koulis told them nothing about the drugs she had been using -- information that could have been crucial in saving her life. With Lesa dead, investigators quickly focused on drugs. At her apartment, detectives discovered used syringes with traces of oxycodone -- a powerful narcotic used to kill pain and available only from a prescribing physician. After a five month investigation, Dr. Koulis was arrested on four charges -- ranging from simple assault to second degree murder. At the trial, prosecutors alleged Dr. Koulis had injected Lesa with oxycodone during the course of the weekend, which eventually led to her death. But the defense claimed Lesa injected herself, and that she had a drug problem - a claim her family and investigators disputed. Ultimately, Dr. Koulis was found guilty of criminally negligent homicide. He will likely remain free until 2009, pending his appeal. (C: Troy Roberts - P: Ira Sutow, Taigi Smith)

Excerpts of her video diary are interspersed throughout the broadcast. In May of 2004, his dismembered body was found in three suitcases in Chesapeake Bay. He had been shot with a .38 caliber gun. Melanie claimed that Bill had vanished weeks before, after an argument. She had never filed a missing person's report and without having heard from Bill, she later filed for divorce. She claimed that he had been abusive and suggested that his disappearance and murder were the result of his gambling problem and that his frequent trips to Atlantic City had put him in contact with shady characters. However, a blanket wrapped around Bill's torso was the same kind of blanket used at the fertility clinic where Melanie worked as a nurse, making her a suspect. After extensive searches, police were unable to find a murder weapon or tool used to cut up Bill's body, and there was no evidence of a crime scene. Soon afterwards, police learned that Melanie had purchased a Taurus .38 special revolver just 48 hours before Bill had disappeared. Melanie, however, claimed that she had purchased that gun for Bill at his own request. She claimed he wanted it for his own protection, but couldn't buy it himself because of a felony conviction. Believing her to be guilty, Prosecutor Patti Prezioso intensified her investigation and had Melanie put under surveillance. This soon revealed two of Melanie's secrets -- she had been carrying on an affair for more than two years with her boss, Dr. Brad Miller, and she had been in Atlantic City the night after she claimed Bill had left her. She later stated that she had gone to Atlantic City in search of Bill, had found his car and moved it out of spite. Thirteen months after the suitcases were found, Melanie McGuire was arrested for the murder of her husband. Nine months after her arrest, the trial began. After seven weeks and more than seventy witnesses, Melanie McGuire was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. She will be eligible for parole in 2073, when she would be 100 years old. Evidence showed that Thomas Murray had been researching how to hire an assassin and how to get away with murder. Murray was tried, found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced to life in prison.
