"Campus Insecurity" - fa report on safety issues on college campuses including: alcohol abuse, focusing on Steven Petz, a freshman at Ferris State University in Big Rapids, Michigan, who died after taking part in a fraternity drinking game; GHB (gamma hydroxi butyrate), increasingly used as a "date rape" drug; campus fires similar to the one that claimed lives at Seton Hall University in New Jersey; and Brian Nisenfeld, a student at Roger Williams University, R.I. whose disappearance was not promptly reported by university officials and whose body was later found. The report focuses on Robinson's inability to control her daughter following her divorce from the girl's father and Valessa's association with two teenage boys, her boyfriend Adam Davis and Jon Whispell. She now claims that Adams was the real killer while she is only guilty of not rescuing her mother. A Florida jury found the girl guilty of murder in the third degree. "The Road Back" - focusing on famous people who faced adversity, including reports on: Sarah Ferguson, the Duchess of York, who was scorned by the British royal family and humiliated by the press for her troubled marriage, financial problems and weight gain; NASCAR driver Kyle Petty, whose son Adam died in a race car crash just weeks after of the death of his grandfather NASCAR champion Richard Petty; comedian Richard Lewis who triumphed over alcoholism and drug abuse; heavyweight boxing champion Mike Tyson's attempt to change his image; and Kate Dillon's success as a model for larger women's fashions. "Compassionate Use" - before a pharmaceutical company can market a drug it has to prove to the FDA that it has completed a series of clinical trials. If, before the trials are completed, the drug shows promise, the company can opt to give it to critically ill patients under a `compassionate use' program. Includes profiles of two colon cancer patients: Ruth-Ann Santino whose request for C225, an experimental drug, was denied: and Amy Cohen, who was treated with the drug.(C: Lesley Stahl - P: Nancy Kramer) "The Tiny TV Network With A Big Mouth" - a report on Qatar's Al-Jazeera Satellite Channel, the first 24-hour television news network in the Arab world and the first Arab news organization that is independent and uncensored. What makes Al-Jazeera unique is its emphasis on news, investigative reports and documentaries, plus a wide range of talk shows discussing topics usually considered taboo in most Arab media. "The Execution Of Timothy McVeigh" Parts I & II - the execution of Timothy McVeigh, found guilty of the 1995 bombing of a federal building in Oklahoma City, has been postponed for 30 days because the FBI failed to turn over 3,000 pages of documents to the NcVeigh defense team before the trial. Prior to the announcement of the delay, Ed Bradley spoke to eight family members and survivors of the bombing who viewed and commented on the 60 MINUTES interview with McVeigh which aired on 03/12/00. "The Memorial" - a visit, accompanied by six family members and survivors to Oklahoma City National Memorial, a two-block area where the nine-story federal building once stood and which also houses a museum providing an hour-by-hour account of the events on the day of the explosion. "Murder Or Suicide?"- a report on allegations that the FBI, accused of mishandling evidence in the Oklahoma City bombing case, has also erred in labeling as suicide, the death of Father John Kaiser, an American priest in Kenya. Includes interviews with Francis Kaiser, Father Kaiser's brother; his sister Carolita Mahoney; and Sen. Paul Wellstone (D., Minnseota) all of whom believe that the Catholic priest was murdered because of his outspoken criticism of Kenyan President Daniel arap Moi.(C: Carol Marin - P: Peter Klein)
"DNA Dragnet" - controversy has arisen over the collection by the police of blood and saliva samples from hundreds of people after a crime has been committed. Proponents of these so-called DNA dragnets claim that the innocent have no cause for alarm. Critics call them an invasion of privacy charging that the government offers no assurance that the information gathered will remain confidential.(C: Morley Safer - P: Catherine Olian)

"Cash Crop" - a report on allegations of abuse by the taxpayer-funded Federal Crop Insurance Program. Under the program farmers buy insurance from private companies who have no reason to monitor risky policyholders or deny questionable losses because the cost of the claims is passed on to the government. "The Preacher's Daughter" - an interview with Anne Graham Lotz, daughter of the evangelist Billy Graham, who is following in her father's footsteps despite the Southern Baptists' ban on women preachers. (C: Morley Safer - P: Denise Schrier Cetta) "Billion Dollar Business" - organized crime is involved in a billiondollar business involving young, impoverished women from former Soviet republics who are smuggled into Europe and sold as prostitutes. Includes interviews with: Ala Mindicanu, a former member of Moldova's Parliament who is working to expose sex traffickers; and Ken Patterson, an American who has managed to rescue 165 girls.(C: Christiane Amanpour - P: Andrew Tkach) "His Honor The Mayor" - Milton Milan was elected mayor of Camden, $\ensuremath{\text{N.J.}}$, by people who hoped he could solve the city's problems. Milan was instead tried and found guilty of a series of charges, including drug dealing and money laundering, and faces nine to twelve years in prison. "Bridgestone Firestone"- since 1997, 47 people in Venezuela have died in accidents involving Ford Explorers whose Firestone tires blew out. Critics charge that the incidents were a red flag ignored by Bridgestone/Firestone and Ford and that the deaths could have been prevented by a recall. Includes interview with Hector Rodriguez, a senior Ford executive in Venezuela who places the blame on Firestone. The Venezuelan Government is seeking criminal charges against officials at both companies. In 1996 Congress passed the Flatow Amendment which allows victims' families to sue foreign countries that sponsor terrorists but when Alisa's father, Steve, won a settlement against Iran the U.S. government has done everything in its power to keep him from collecting. "The Osprey"- an investigation of the controversy arising from the admission by Lt. Col. Fred Lieberman that he asked Marines in his command to falsify maintenance records of the crash-plagued MV-22 Osprey in order to keep the aircraft in production. He and other Marine officers claim that they need the Osprey to replace a fleet of outdated helicopters, while critics cite the aircraft's high cost and poor track record. "The Strange Case Of Dr. Shipman"- Police in Hyde, England became suspicious when an alarming number of elderly women in the care of Dr. Harold Shipman, a respected local physician, died suddenly. Further investigation showed that Dr. Shipman had killed the women by injecting them with lethal doses of morphine with no apparent motive other the desire to control an individual's death. "Not As Private As You Think"- surveillance of Internet users is being conducted by so-called advertising networks who gather data by using a tracking device called a "cookie." Problems have arisen because millions of consumers are giving personal information on the Internet without knowing who is getting it or how it will be used. "The Earth Liberation Front"- a report on the FBI's efforts to infiltrate ELF (Earth Liberation Front), one of the most active domestic ecoterrorist groups in the U.S. Although the underground group has claimed responsibility for 30 acts of economic sabotage against companies, researchers and individuals it believes are harming the environment, none of its members have been identified or caught. "Nothing More To Worry About?"- a report on the rising number of deaths among AIDs patients due to several factors; drugs currently available suppress the virus but don't kill it; the serious side-effects of long-term use of anti-AIDS drugs; and the fact that people most at risk are not taking precautions because they think that AIDS is curable. "The Missiliers" Pts. I & II- despite the fact that the Cold War is over, tension between the U.S. and Russia is greater than ever. Both countries still maintain large arsenals of nuclear weapons which are continually tested and could be launched at a moment's notice. Includes an interview with General Eugene Habiger (ret.), former commander in chief of all U.S. nuclear forces, who attempted unsuccessfully to forge a mutual disarmament agreement with Russia. "Death By Suffocation" - an interview with Jerry Cochran, a former sailor who is slowly suffocating to death because of exposure to toxic dust while resurfacing the flight decks of U.S. aircraft carriers. Navy doctors first diagnosed Cochran's illness as sarcoidosis, a disease of unknown cause. Later tests confirmed that it was silicosis, a fatal condition directly related to Cochran's work on board ship. "Boy Wonder" - a profile of Sho Yano, a 10-year-old genius who is currently a student at Loyola University, Chicago. The book, containing the formula for the type of bomb used to blow up the Alfred P. Murrah Building in Oklahoma City, is reportedly a favorite with Timothy McVeigh, the convicted bomber. The followup consists of interviews with Pierce about his use of 'hatecore' rock with anti-government, anti-black, anti-Semitic lyrics; and Morris Dees, Southern Poverty Law Center. "The Celtic Tiger"- a report on Ireland, currently the country with the world's fastest growing economy and one of the leading exporters of computer software. Lured by the country's low taxes and technological growth, young people who left the country are returning in record numbers. (Bob Simon - P: Draggan Mihailovich) (OAD: 12/12/00)

"James Ellroy" - profile of crime novelist James Ellroy, whose 1990 novel L.A. Confidential was made into an Academy Award-winning movie. (C: Charlie Rose)

"Wall Street Prophets" - a report on stock analysts working for big brokerage houses whose advice is geared to make themselves, rather than clients, wealthy. Includes an interview with Tom Brown, a former analyst for Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette, who turned down the firm's offer of \$400,000 in severance pay because it entailed his silence. (C: Scott Pelley - P: Nancy Duffy) (OAD: 01/30/01) "Call For Help" - a report on problems arising when police officers are inadequately prepared to respond to calls involving EDP (emotionally disturbed persons). Because standard police procedure tends to invite rather than prevent confrontations, the result too often is the death either of the mentally ill person, the police officer, or both. C: Dan Rather - P: Steve Glauber, Chris Martin) "Swept Away" - a report on the conflict in Turkey involving the need for economic development and the preservation of the historic past, focusing on the building of a new hydroelectric dam which would flood the ruins of Zeugma, thought to be one of the wealthiest outposts of the Roman Empire. "Bitter Pill" - Stella Nickell of Auburn, Washington, was sentenced to 90 year in federal prison for poisoning her husband Bruce and Sue Snow, a Seattle bank manager with cyanide-laced Excedrin. Thirteen years after the tampering conviction, two private investigators, Al Farr and Paul Ciolino contend that authorities had little evidence to prove Nickell was guilty other than the testimony of Cynthia Hamilton, the accused's daughter. Hamilton was paid a \$250,000 reward for her cooperation but that and other pertinent evidence was never brought up at Nickell's trial. "Cyberstalker"- a joint 48 HOURS/Reader's Digest investigation of the dark side of the Internet, used by 15 million children every day. Parents are beginning to realize that, despite its many benefits, the Web may also serve as a haven for pedophiles and other sexual predators. Included are reports on Operation Blue Ridge Thunder, a Virginia-based program fighting cyber crimes against children; the murder of 22-year-old Amy Boyer of Nashua, N.H., by a stalker who used the Internet to find personal information about his victim and even detailed on two national Web sites how he would kill her; and Linda Alexander, a Vista, Ca. lawyer who has set up a service to perform background checks for people using computer matchmaking services. Following the broadcast, CBS News and America Online hosted a live online chat with experts from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children. Includes comments by relatives of victims and survivors of the bombing who watched McVeigh's execution on a closed-circuit broadcast; an analysis of Ed Bradley's interview with McVeigh (OAD: 60 MINUTES 03/12/00); an interview with Stephen Jones, one of McVeigh's attorneys; a followup on victims whose lives were shattered by the blast; interviews with: Mark Potok, an expert on the militia movement; Mike Kemp, a militia member; and Greg McCrary, a former FBI agent; and reactions of survivors who were present at the execution. "Medical Mysteries" - explores medical breakthroughs and experimental treatments including reports on: Peter Bradley, a Kansas City, Missouri man diagnosed by doctors with viral encephalitis after he went berserk on board Alaska Airlines flight 259 last March; Nathan Milto, a seven-year-old Indianapolis boy who has a rare and fatal genetic disease known as Batten disease. His father, Phil Milto, has started a foundation in Nathan's name to raise money for research and has been giving the child Flupirtine, an unapproved drug in hopes of slowing the disease; 20-year-old Mellissa Holley of Ridgeway, Colorado who was left paralyzed after an auto accident and travelled to Israel to undergo an experimental procedure; and the use of music therapy to help restore speech and movement in patients who have suffered brain injuries. (48 HOURS MYSTERIES) "Citizen Jane"- when Gertrude McCabe was brutally murdered, her niece Jane Alexander was named her principal beneficiary. Jane, a widow in her 70s, began to suspect that her live-in boyfriend, Tom O'Donnell, might have been involved in the crime. When O'Donnell, who was handling all Jane's finances, suddenly disappeared the elderly woman found that he had left her nearly broke. Spurred by Jane's persistence police tracked down O'Donnell who was charged with fraud and subsequently murder. Today, Jane, the founder of Citizens Against Homicide, devotes her time and energy to helping families of murder victims solve their cases. (48 HOURS MYSTERIES) "Impossible Mission" - in 1986 newlyweds Dyke and Karen Rhoads of Paris, Illinois were murdered and their house set on fire. A year after the incident, juries handed down guilty verdicts to suspects Randy Steidl and Herb Whitlock. Feeling that a miscarriage of justice had occurred, Professor David Protess of the Medill School of Journalism and four of his students began their own investigation of the 13-year-old murder. 48 HOURS follows their investigation as they uncover new evidence, speak to new witnesses and attempt to find the real reason for the murders.
