- "Beatrice's Goat"** - a report on Beatrice Birra, a poor girl from Uganda whose mother could afford to send her to school by selling milk from a goat supplied to her by Heifer International, a Little Rock, Arkansas charity. - "The Recomposer Of The Decomposed"** - an interview with Frank Bender, a forensic sculptor who helps lawmen (and on one occasion the TV program "America's Most Wanted") solve crimes by rebuilding the faces of the dead and missing. Includes an interview with Colonel Ron Johnson, the unit's commanding officer. (C: Don Rather - P: Tom Anderson, Alex Spitzer)
"Decision To Die" - Michael Ross, a convicted rapist murderer was scheduled to die this morning, making him the first person to be executed in Connecticut in 45 years, but with only 36 hours to spare a judge stayed the execution. Includes a videotaped interview with Ross in which he pleads to be executed. Also interviewed are T.R. Paulding, Ross' attorney; and Gerard Smyth, Chief Public Defender for the State of Connecticut. 01/01/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Where Is Mrs. March?"**- on August 15, 1996, 33-year-old Janet Levine March, a wife and mother of two young children, disappeared. She had a flourishing career as an artist; a husband, Perry, a successful lawyer; and a beautiful home in Nashville, TN. However, one night, her husband claims that she left home, saying that she needed time alone, and was never heard from again. After Janet's disappearance, Perry March and Janet's parents searched for her for two weeks before filing a missing persons report with the police. Investigators found Janet's car parked a few miles away from her home with her belongings inside. Perry, the only suspect in case, moved with his children to Ajijic, Mexico where he remarried and began a new life. Janet's parents are convinced that Perry killed their daughter but, with no hard evidence that a crime was committed it is unlikely that Perry March will be brought back from Mexico to face trial. 01/06/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Who Murdered The Rock Star?"** (9:30-10:00pm)- On the morning of July 6, 1993, Mia Zapata's body was found raped and strangled to death on a deserted Seattle street. A lead singer in a popular local band called "The Gits," Zapata was about to start a national tour and was on the verge of signing a record contract. Police conducted an exhaustive investigation, but ultimately came up with few leads and little evidence. A decade later, Seattle's cold case squad, made up of detectives Richard Gagnon and Greg Miksell, reopened the Zapata murder investigation and with new forensic technology were able to pinpoint the murderer, Jesus Mezquia, through DNA evidence found on Zapata's body. A jury convicted Mezquia of first-degree murder and he was sentenced to 37 years in prison. (C: Harold Dow - Sr. P: Peter Schweitzer - P: Paul F. Ryan) (Edited version of "Who Murdered The Rock Star?" OAD: 05/15/04) No individual segment titles were used in this rebroadcast.

- 01/02/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Shot In The Dark" (10:00-11:00pm)** - Dr. Richard Illes, a successful heart surgeon, and his wife, Miriam, a homemaker and mother to their young son, were a prominent couple in their small community of Williamsport, PA. Then, on Jan. 15, 1999, Miriam was fatally shot as she stood in front of her kitchen window. Because Miriam had filed for divorce from her husband, investigators theorized that Richard Illes was responsible. Eventually, the killer's gun and sneakers were found not far from where Dr. Illes had been on the night of the murder. Illes had married his assistant and moved to Spokane, Washington, where he was finally apprehended and arrested. Upon searching Illes' home in Spokane, police found a manuscript in his computer entitled "Heart Shot: Murder Of The Doctor's Wife." A jury found Illes guilty of murder in the first degree. He maintains his innocence and is appealing his conviction. (C: Susan Spencer - Sr. P: Anthony Batson - P: Paul F. Ryan, Martin Zied, Lourdes Aguiar) No individual segment titles were used in this episode.
- 01/15/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Where's Our Baby?"** - in November 1997, Marlene and Steve Aisenberg, a Tampa, Florida couple, reported their five-month-old daughter Sabrina missing from her crib. The police began to search for the baby but, soon the investigation began to focus on the parents as authorities became convinced that they knew more about their baby's disappearance than they admitted. Sheriff's detectives planted secret recording devices in the Aisenberg's home. After listening to and recording thousands of hours of conversations, the federal government brought an indictment against the couple, charging them with conspiracy and lying to investigators; charges which, if proven true, could send the Aisenbergs to prison for 30 years. Eventually, a pair of judges reviewed the case and the charges against the Aisenbergs were dropped. The couple still believe that Sabrina will be found alive and returned to them. Includes interviews with Bill McGinty, reporter for WTSP, the CBS affiliate in Tampa; Graham Brink, a reporter for the St. Petersburg Times; and Barry Cohen, the Aisenbergs' attorney. - 01/22/05 **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Alibi" (8:00-9:00pm)** - in September 2000, David Camm, a former Indiana State Trooper from New Albany, returned home from a basketball game and claimed that he found his wife Kim and their two children shot dead in the garage. Two days later, Camm was arrested for the murders. 
It became apparent that many of these issues were tied together. In fact, most of them appeared to be. We were pleased to see that we were in tune on most of them. The same night of our meeting, we did News stories on several of them by coincidence. After review of what we could do to address them, we determined that our solving any one of them single-handedly was unrealistic. Our review did not conclude that there was nothing we could do. We were triggered by a comment made by Greg Dagnan of The Children's Center. He said they purchased a couple of billboards with the statement that a sex offender lives in every 3 square miles of Jasper County. He said the groundswell of attention calls to his agency were enormous. We know we can reach and educate far more people than a few billboards and with a more compelling message.

Beginning in March, we are going to produce a commercial(s) each month on one of the many issues that came up. We will create and focus on a different issue each month throughout 2005. In them we will point out the problem or issue. We know we can air a schedule that will reach in excess of 85% of the people in our viewing area more than 3 times per person over a given month. This can be determined by using Nielsen audience data scheduling software and their reach and frequency analysis. This assures a front of mind awareness of the problem. Before the end of the month, and when the issue has high awareness, our News department will do solution stories on the problems or issues featured in the Public Service Campaigns. This is far more effective than a 30-minute public affairs program because those types of shows historically do not garner large audiences and air only once. Using our strategy we will utilize the most watched shows on television in all viewing times to provide broad dissemination of information.

KFJX has agreed to team with us in this project and will assist in both the producing of the commercials, the airing of them and the addressing of the issues in their 9:00pm Newscasts.

We hope you will see the value and advantage in this marketing strategy. This uses mass media marketing to address single-issue concerns. The total monthly cost between the two stations if you were to pay for it would average over \$15,000 and that would not include any news coverage. The value over a year could reach \$200,000. All this will be provided free of charge. We welcome your comments and support of this strategy. With your help, we believe we can make a difference in the communities we serve.
