**Topic – Explosives explode at California discount stores and evacuate customers...No casualties.**

Explosives explode at California discount stores and evacuate customers...Two small explosives exploded at a warehouse-type discount store in Ontario, an eastern city of Los Angeles, California, on the 5th, leaving customers surprised by no casualties, the Associated Press reported.

The explosion occurred at the Ontario Sams Club, 72 kilometers east of downtown Los Angeles. Witnesses said they heard an explosion inside the warehouse.

Police said explosives exploded one after another, but no one was injured.

Police are investigating how they caught Hugo Gonzales, 49, who was fleeing nearby after the explosion and detonated the explosives.

Police searched the suspect's vehicle, but no further explosives were found.

The suspect is said to have little to do with Sams Club.

Agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF) are at the scene to detect the ingredients of explosives.

Sams Club is a member-based warehouse-type discount store created by Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton, and forms two major pillars of member-based marts with Costco.

**Topic – "Expanding temporary housing for homeless people."**

The city of San Diego has decided to expand temporary housing for the ever-increasing number of homeless people.

The homeless management department, under the city's housing committee, has begun to figure out the current situation to establish additional temporary housing for homeless people in nine areas.

"We're protecting hundreds of homeless people in East Village in early January, but despite the government's efforts, we can't handle the increase," San Diego Mayor Kevin Polcorner said. "The understanding will be completed before June."

The city is expanding homelessness because the number of people including economic conditions has increased every year, exposing the health of local security and residents to danger.

In September last year, the city officially announced that 16 homeless people died of hepatitis A and 421 infected people, setting up a separate place to wash their hands on 400 streets where homeless people are concentrated, and opening 14 toilets in Balboa Park 24 hours a day.

Despite the city's emergency measures, residents are still anxious that the city's unsanitary environment could spread the disease throughout the region.

##### **Topic – IMF Conference Can't Find A Solution to Trade Disputes...The U.S. strongly calls for easing imbalances.**

There is no solution between the U.S., which leads protectionism, and other countries that oppose it.

The Financial Times reported on the 21st that the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank (WB) spring meeting in Washington, D.C., ended on the 21st amid only differences over protectionism.

Despite pressure to comply with existing agreements on trade, the U.S. did not back down, saying that large surpluses in countries such as China and Germany should be reduced to ease trade imbalances.

South Africa's central bank governor, Reeza Kanyago, the new chairman of the IMF's governing commission, stressed that it is essential for member states to abide by agreed rules on trade and avoid the current situation leading to the introduction of trade barriers.

"There can never be a winner in a trade dispute," Kanyago said. "We can all just be losers," he said, refuting U.S. President Donald Trump's view that trade wars are good and easy to win.

However, the U.S. continued to shift its responsibility to other countries that are recording trade surpluses, urging the IMF to take a tougher response.

U.S. Treasury Secretary Steve Mnuchin told the steering committee that the surplus of major trading countries is not decreasing due to the lack of global coordination mechanisms, stressing that the IMF should do more.

"If member countries promote unfair competitive gains or maintain macroeconomic, exchange rate and trade policies that lead to disproportionate growth, the IMF should respond more actively," Mnuchin said, calling for a clearer policy recommendation.

The IMF is cautious about criticism of the U.S., the largest stakeholder, but expects the U.S. tax cuts to attract more imports and eventually expand its trade deficit.

The IMF Steering Committee aimed at the U.S. in a joint statement, saying that member countries' fiscal policies need to

avoid cyclical and that their share of public debt in GDP should be on a sustainable path. Economic compatibility refers to a mechanism of interaction between finance and real life, in which the financial system amplifies economic fluctuations and causes financial instability.

IMF President Christine Lagarde took an interim stance in a closing press conference, expressing interest in the deepening of protectionism and proper protection of intellectual property rights.

"We're all aware of these problems, and my main concern is to help them get resolved before they go to the point where growth and stability are undermined," Lagarde said.

##### **Topic – KYCC, \$500,000 Grant received**

The Korea Town Youth Center (KYCC) is the only Korean organization to receive 500,000 dollars in grant funding from the City Foundation.

According to the KYCC on the 26th, the Citigroup Sponsor Foundation selected companies, non-profit organizations, community organizations, and local governments across the U.S., including Los Angeles, to provide 20 million dollars in community economic revitalization assistance.

As a result, the KYCC received a total of 500,000 dollars in subsidies from the City Foundation for two years, 250,000 dollars a year.

The KYCC said it will use the City Foundation's Grant to strengthen more than 25 regional economic revitalization programs, including support for small businesses, tax reporting, and welfare services for socially vulnerable people.

"The prosperity of the community comes when families are healthy and stable," said Rick Kim, deputy director of the KYCC Community Economic Development Department. "We will start with the most socially vulnerable in the Korean town area and help the number of residents benefit from improved service."

In addition to the KYCC, the East LA Community Union, the LGB T Center and the LA County Economic Development Union were selected as 40 organizations in Los Angeles, Chicago, Miami, New York, San Francisco and Washington, DC.

"We started in 2015 to select organizations that lead to positive changes in the community as part of our charity project and to help local economy development through subsidies," said Brand McHale, chairman of the City Foundation.

The Korean Association of Los Angeles has decided to launch a campaign to encourage Koreans to participate in voting with Korean groups to prevent the split of the Korean Town Residents' Council (LBNC) in connection with the creation of the Little Bangladesh Residents' Council.

Former Korean Chairman Laura, former Korean Chairman Lee Chang-yeop and lawyer Grace Yoo held an emergency meeting with the LBNC at the Korean Center in LA on the 3rd to discuss the campaign to encourage Korean voters to participate in the LBNC referendum scheduled for the 19th of next month.

Participants said, "As the LA city council has said they respect the results of the vote, only voting can protect the Koreatown community council. We will focus on encouraging voters who live or have jobs in the region for the rest of the year."

Officials gathered on the day say they will hold a press conference with the heads of Korean organizations after the final meeting at noon on the 7th to formulate a campaign plan to encourage Korean voters to vote.

##### **Topic – Gas prices are soaring... It's over four dollars.**

As gasoline prices in Southern California have not stopped rising, the average price has been hitting new highs since 2015, and some gas stations have already surpassed \$4 a gallon, making drivers, including Koreans, more burdened.

The rise in gas prices has been affected by the recent surge in gas taxes in California, which took effect earlier this year, and the summer peak season is approaching, especially international crude oil.

According to the Southern California Automotive Club (AAA) and the Oil Price Information Service, the average gas price for regular gas in LA County hit \$3.727 per gallon on the 11th, the highest since August 21, 2015. The price per gallon is 72.5 cents higher than at the same time a year ago.

Orange County also saw its average regular grade rise by 69.9 cents a year to \$3.689 a gallon.

"In the spring season, gas prices are rising, and some refinery maintenance and oil prices are increasing, and gas prices continue to rise," said Jeffrey Spring, a spokesman for AAA.

In particular, there is a possibility that gas prices will rise further in the future as crude oil prices have been in a serious situation recently.

International oil prices are heading toward \$80 a barrel amid concerns that U.S. sanctions against Iran will be revived, with some predicting that it could hit \$100 a barrel next year.

According to Bloomberg's tally on the 11th, the price of Brent crude in North Sea, the standard for international oil prices, is trading at around \$77 a barrel on the London ICE Futures Exchange on the afternoon of the 10th. It has been three years and five months since November 2014 that the price of this species has risen to \$78.

The price of crude oil (WTI) from West Texas also reached \$71.89 a barrel on the afternoon of the 10th, close to \$72.5 a barrel, and traded at \$71.5 a barrel on the morning of the 11th.

This high-altitude of oil prices is due to concerns that U.S. sanctions will block the export of Iranian crude oil, and the production of Venezuela, the world's largest oil reserves, has decreased.

Bank of America predicted that the price of Brent could soar to \$100 a barrel next year because of these factors, according to CNN.

The agreement between OPEC members and non-member oil-producing countries was also cited as a factor to reduce oil supply.

OPEC and other oil-producing countries, including Russia, agreed to cut 1.8 million barrels a day by March 2018 to drive international oil prices, and extended the production cut to the end of this year.

##### **Topic – Growing Asian Voters...It could be a casting boat.**

Ahead of the California primary election to be held on June 5, a campaign is being held to actively encourage voters registration in Asia-Pacific as Asian voters, including Koreans, are analyzed to serve as casting boats to decide whether to vote.

According to the Asian American Justice Promotion Association (AAAJ), the number of Asian voters in California increased by 11% between 2012 and 2016, as 1.8 million were registered in the 2016 finals. In addition, about 9 percent of California's voters accounted for the 2016 finals.

"As the turnout is usually low in preliminary elections, if Asian voters gather, the Asia-Pacific community will have a greater impact. Voter cohesion can play a major role in Asian political growth, so it is necessary for Asian voters to participate in the vote."

"In fact, Asian voters are believed to have a high percentage of those who voted for election winners in many constituencies in California," said Shelly Chen, a statistics analyst at AAAJ.

Accordingly, more than 10 groups from Asia-Pacific, including the Korea Town Labor Union (KIWA) and the Asia-Pacific Policy Council (A3PCON), will join forces to encourage 25,000 voters from Asia-Pacific to register and vote in eight languages, including Korean, Chinese and Vietnamese.

"First-generation immigrants are not fluent in English and often give up election information due to lack of election information on election candidates and proposals, but if the outreach campaign encourages voter registration and voting, it will be an opportunity for more residents to participate in the election," said director Alexandra Suh.

"A grandmother who has lived in Koreatown for more than 10 years wanted to participate in the vote, but she couldn't even vote because she didn't know how to register for voters," he said. "This shows how important it is to participate in the election."

Michelle Im AAAJ, a policy activist for voter rights, encouraged voter registration, saying, "Voter registration is possible with a smartphone, and it takes less than five minutes."

Meanwhile, the deadline for voter registration in the primaries is on the 21st, and early voting and postal voting has already begun on the 7th. The deadline for voters to apply for a postal ballot is until the 29th.

California's governor, deputy governor, state general secretary, state auditor, state finance minister, state attorney general, state insurance director, state education director, and state tax equity district 1st and 2nd place winners will face off again in the June primary.

##### **Topic – Summer ultraviolet emergency... To protect my skin**

Fine dust is not the only thing to pay attention to before going out these days when the early heat has come. This is because ultraviolet levels that are as harmful to the human body as fine dust are higher than ever.

Solar UV rays help to maintain immunity and synthesize vitamin D, which is known to help prevent osteoporosis, cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and others, but excessive amounts of burns and skin aging, as well as skin cancer in severe cases.

If sunlight cannot be completely blocked, the best way to protect your skin from UV attacks is to apply sunscreen. However, not many people know exactly how blockers block UV rays. Only the higher the Sun Protection Factor (SPF) level and the higher the number of PA (Protection of UVA) '+', the higher the blocking effect, but few people know what the difference is.

To keep your skin healthy and choose sunscreen that suits your situation, it is good to know what kind of characteristics there are and how good the blocking effect is.

To this end, an understanding of ultraviolet rays is essential first.

Ultraviolet rays are the rays of visible light in invisible areas because they have shorter wavelengths than purple light. The wavelength is shorter than visible light and longer than medical X-rays. Because the wavelength is longer than X-ray, it is less permeable, but it has higher energy than visible light, so it has a stronger power to destroy cells or germs.

The wavelength range of ultraviolet rays is 10 to 400 nanometers (1 nm is one billionth of a meter), divided into three types, A, B, and C, depending on the length of the wavelength. ▲ The "UVA" in the area closest to visible light is divided into wavelengths of 315-380nm ▲ "UVB" in the area close to ▲ 280-315nm ▲ "UVC" in the area close to X-ray.

The UV rays that bother the skin are mainly UVA and UVB. Among ultraviolet rays, UVC, which has strong cell destruction and sterilization power, is mostly absorbed as it passes through the ozone layer in the stratosphere 10 to 40 kilometers above the Earth due to its short wavelength.

UVA accounts for more than 90 percent of UV rays reaching the surface and is considered the main cause of skin aging. While the sun is out due to its short wavelength, it is in the shade, but it affects the skin even if it is cloudy or rainy due to clouds, and it reaches the skin through the glass, unlike UVB, which does not pass well through the glass.

UVB is absorbed into the skin epidermis, causing burns, while UVA with long wavelengths penetrates the epidermis and reaches the dermis, promoting skin aging. UV light is into the human immune systems absorb some UV rays, it is to create a black pigment called melanin, brought by black stains and freckles and skin color changes.

Especially in the sunny summer, UVB causes strong chemical reactions in the epidermal layer, causing sunburn and skin cancer. Recently, studies have shown that the risk of skin cancer increases as much as UVB if the exposure time of UVA is long enough to tan the skin.

Let's get back to sunscreen now. PA and SPF, which are used in sunscreens, are indicators of how much they block UVA and UVB, respectively. SPF tells you how effective it is based on skin without any blockers. SPF levels refer to the amount of UVB that blockers prevent skin from causing erythema. The PA index is also determined in the same way, but the difference is that the range of numbers is expressed in + number.

SPF15~30 and PA++ or higher are enough for everyday life where there is not much ultraviolet light that touches the skin, but if you need to be outdoors for a long time, it is recommended to use products with the highest index. Although SPF is an international standard index, PA is mainly used in Asia such as Korea and Japan.

The most widespread misconception about SPF is that the blocking effect time increases in proportion to the figure. Park Jeong-eun, a researcher at AmorePacific's Skin Care Division, said, "The SFF index does not correlate much with the duration of the shutdown and just shows how much it can prevent erythema or blackness caused by ultraviolet rays."

It is also important to keep in mind that it functions differently depending on the ingredients of the blocker. Sunscreens are divided into organic products (chemical blockers) in which artificially synthesized organic materials absorb UV rays and disperse them with heat energy, and inorganic products (physical blockers) in which UV rays are scattered and reflected to prevent skin penetration.

Most sunscreens on the market are organic. Examples of organic products include octynoxate (ethylhexylmethoxysinamate), avobenzone (butylmethoxydibenzoylmethane), and oxybenzone (benzophenone-3).

Each ingredient also has different functions, so Avobenzone has a strong UVB blocking effect. Among them, oxybenzone is on the decline worldwide due to controversy over its harmfulness.

Physical sunscreen works by reflecting or scattering ultraviolet rays by inorganic compounds with high refractive index such as zinc oxide and titanium dioxide (titanium dioxide) on the surface of the skin.

**Topic – If the U.S.-North Korea talks in New York fail to reach a conclusion. Possibility of 'Plan B' postponement of June 12 talks**

The schedule for the June 12 U.S.-North Korea summit will be finalized according to the results of the "New York talks" with U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo in New York on the 30th (local time) and 31st.

Pompeo is scheduled to meet with President Donald Trump at the White House at 2 p.m. before leaving for New York on the 30th, so the high-level contact is characterized by the final negotiations between President Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong-un on the denuclearization agenda.

If the two sides reach an agreement, the June 12 summit is expected to be confirmed by Vice Chairman Kim's visit to Washington, but if there is a last-minute issue left, there is a possibility of finding a "Plan B" to reschedule the talks.

Vice Chairman Kim's visit to New York seems to be aimed at negotiating in a less politically burdensome place than Washington. This is because it is burdensome for the U.S. to immediately call Vice Chairman Kim, who is subject to U.S. independent sanctions, to Washington at a time when the agreement has not been finalized.

Vice Chairman Kim may also have judged that it would be better to seek contact with the U.S. under orders from Pyongyang in New York, where the North Korean delegation is located in Juyuen.

The atmosphere of the June 12 U.S.-North Korea summit itself is not bad. White House spokesman Sarah Huckabee Sanders and State Department spokesman Heather Nauert said in a briefing on the 29th (local time) that "there has been a clear sign of progress" in negotiations in New York, Panmunjom and Singapore, including meetings between Vice Chairman Kim and Secretary Pompeo.

"They've already had a very deep conversation about what the U.S. expectations are," Nauert said, while keeping a low profile on the agenda of the New York talks. "The main conversation will be to reach the summit we're planning for June 12th." In other words, the summit will be confirmed on June 12 once the agenda coordination is finalized.

However, there is still a final struggle over the speed of North Korea's denuclearization and the level of initial measures. Sanders said, "We are definitely preparing for the North Korea-U.S. summit to be held on the 12th of next month," and "We will be ready for any reason."

Kelly Ann Conway, senior adviser to the White House, also predicted in an interview with Fox News that the summit may not be held on the planned date, and that it will not be too late.

In particular, when asked about the factors that determine the summit and schedule, Sanders said, "There are many factors, but denuclearization is on the negotiating table and should be the focus of the talks," adding, "President Trump should feel like he is making progress in that direction.

The only person who will make that decision would be the president."

Due to the tight time, many predict that the U.S.-North Korea summit will reach an agreement on the basis of big principles of denuclearization and system security and the framework of future negotiations, but President Trump is reportedly trying to win North Korea's initial denuclearization measures.

At the working-level negotiations at the truce village of Panmunjom on the 27th, North Korea reportedly did not give a definite answer to the U.S. demand. As a result, President Trump is expected to make a judgment on the schedule of the talks after checking Kim's message through Vice Chairman Kim.

The Korea Broadcasting and Communication Agency (KCA) conducted a 2018 U.S. Western Regional Education Training Training" for Korean language broadcasting officials in North America.

The training, which was held at the Sweet Garden Hotel for two days from the 19th and 20th, was attended by more than 30 Korean-American broadcasting officials in the U.S., and was more enthusiastic than ever before.

"This year, experts from various fields shared information on broadcasting production technologies and new technologies, while scheduling broadcasting training centered on strengthening networks between broadcasting companies," said Han Sung-don, deputy director of KCA.

The foreign broadcasting producers who attended the event said, "I am grateful to the KCA, and it was very beneficial to learn more advanced production techniques in this training so that I could gain new awareness of the changing broadcasting environment and learn related technologies."
