He offered security tips to prevent the loss of data if a phone is lost or stolen. Robert D. Morris, MD, PhD, environmental epidemiologist, drinking water research scientist, showed how despite better overall health conditions, the nation's water supply remains a serious health risk. He discussed potential disease pathogens, toxic chemicals, the link between chlorine relied on for water treatment with cancer and stillbirths, and the history of water-borne pathogens like cholera and typhoid. Greg Kaplan, PhD, Assistant Professor of Economics, Princeton University, talked about how roughly one-third of all U.S. families live paycheck-to-paycheck, even though these middle class families have decent incomes, but have their money tied up in homes or retirement funds. Dr. Kaplan discussed how this might not be as financially dangerous as it might appear.
