But he says the fire got out of control because there was a mattress and other illegal materials in the fire. Fire crews contained the fire in twenty minutes. Chief harsh-barger says this is an example of *why you need to have a clear space around controlled burns. He suggests keeping burns small. So burns are faster, cleaner and don't smoke your neighbors out. Also, only burn legal materials. Anything else needs to be taken to the lane county landfills or recycled.
