Catholic community services of lane county is part of a national network that has taken a strong stand against the separation of families at the border. Today's executive order offers hope to the organization. But catholic community services says they're still waiting to hear more details before they celebrate. They say they worry. Not only about this happening again in the future. But also about the damage already done. The united states conference of catholic bishops reports that since last october 700 children have been separated from their parents at the border. Catholic community services says that they have not received any reports of separated families here in lane county. But c-c-s told us they are prepared to help in the future.—If they are called upon to help prevailes. Though there are in other parts of the state. They also told me that lane county does not have any foster programs for immigrant children seperated from their families.

Several democrats were calling her resignation after statements about the zero tolerance policy. Senator jeff merkley is one lawmaker that would like to see her step down. Another of the senator's reasons was the contradiction between members of the trump administration and nielsen about the policy used as a deterrent

It can affect people here on the south coast as well. coos county sheriff craig zanni says while they have no current detainees, they do have a regular policy that he says has been in effect for years. Ice can still use their resources. Zanni says if a child is with an immigrant who is arrested, the child is transferred to child protective services
- 6/22/18 **Oregon's News** @ 10 (10pm)-lawyers today filed a federal lawsuit saying they've been barred from talking to men detained at a federal prison here in oregon accused of trying to enter the country illegally. They say that violates constitutionally guaranteed legal rights for everyone not just u-s citizens. Civil rights and immigration attorneys say they've been trying to reach about 125 men being held at the federal prison in sheridan for the past two weeks. But each time they've been turned away from the facility. Now they want a federal judge to grant an emergency temporary restraining order guarenteeing them access to those in detention before they're interviewed by federal autorities. The hearing before a federal judge is set for eight o'clock monday morning.
- 6/25/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-a judge at the federal courthouse in downtown portland has ruled attorneys should have access to the more than 100 detainess being held at the federal prison in sheridan. Those attorneys sued the government on friday. Today the federal judge hearing the case granted a temporary restraining order against the government ruling that the government blocking lawyers' access to those detainees is unconstitutional. Bob heye has the report.
- 6/25/18 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-the springfield city council will vote on whether to approve changes to the city's agreement with immigration customs and enforcement commonly known as "ice." This afternoon some community members stood outside of springfield city hall demanding that the contract end or be suspended. They say that families are scared and that the agreement does not reflect the values of the community.

THERE WAS LESS SUPPORT FOR A BAN ON SEMI AUTOMATIC WEAPONS, LIKE AN AR-15, BUT BANNING THOSE TYPES OF GUNS STILL GOT A CLEAR MAJORITY FROM THE STUDENTS
- 4/20/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-today thousands of high school students across the country walked out of class, to demonstrate against gun violence. These peaceful protests are being held on the 19th anniversary of the columbine high school shooting massacre. Students from south eugene high school also participated in today's national walkout. Around a hundred students stood outside the school for about 30 minutes to show their support for changes in gun control policies. Students from south eugene and churchill high schools also went up to salem earlier today to call on lawmakers to pass tougher gun laws. The protest at the capitol in salem was a state wide rally featuring schools from all across oregon including portland.
- 4/20/18 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-as the students speak out against gun violence. A retired springfield fire chief is set to propose a new program to fight against violence on school campuses. It was called "Ribbon of Promise." Retired fire chief dennis murphy launched the non-profit, just days following the shooting. With help from students at springfield high, they put together an award winning/ national campaign, to get students to break the code of silence, and get information to authorities on any threats of shootings.
- 4/20/18 **Oregon's News** @ 10(10pm)-a surprising moment during today's school walk out. Portland mayor ted wheeler told students he would look for ways to ban assault style weapons in Portland. Right now in oregon, cities are not allowed to make their own gun laws. The mayor says during the next legislative session he'll try to convince the governor and lawmakers to lift preemption laws. 43 states have those laws--but if wheeler can get them lifted in oregon, portland could move forward with its own law. To change or remove preemption laws, the proposal would have to go through the state legislature. The multnomah county republican party says in part: "The multnomah county republican party regards legislative attacks on so-called "assault weapons" as a clear violation of the second amendment, supports state law preempting local decision making on this issue."
- 4/23/18 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm)-the controversy over gun control continues here in oregon. Gun control advocates are trying to get a measure on the statewide ballot to restrict assault weapons and large-capacity ammunition magazines. Now, in at least one county, voters are being asked to help put a measure on the ballot barring local officials from enforcing any gun control law. The proposed second ammendment preservation ordinance was filed in deschutes county last week
- 4/26/18 **Oregon's News** @ 10 (10pm)-a mid-willamette valley sheriff is coming out against an initiative petition in oregon that seeks to place a ban on assault weapons. Why he thinks ip-43 doesn't get to the root of the problem on school shootings and other violence.
- 4/30/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-oregon attorney general ellen rosenblum has filed a draft ballot title for a proposal that would ban unregistered assault weapons and large capacity magazines. The ban would cover the weapons and magazines. Except for military and law enforcement purposes or if the owner registered them with state police. Backers of the measure still have to collect about 88-thousand voter signatures by early july--to get it on the fall ballot
- 5/02/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-students across the nation walked out of class today -- in support of the second amendment. This walkout was at tigard high school. The rallies were part of a movement called "Stand for the second." Several students from local high schools participated. It started at 10 -- and lasted about 16 minutes. Students gave speeches and answered questions before going back inside. An organizer told us -- they feel they need to stand up -- and protest restrictive gun laws. Students also say they believe the solution to school shootings -- is a focus on mental health -- and possibly arming teachers. In addition to tigard. We're told similar walkouts happened at sunset, mountain view, clackamas, ridgefield, and monary high schools.
- 5/03/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-the Eugene 4J school district is looking at another way to combat gun violence in schools, when the board plans to make a decision on a draft resolution.
- 5/18/18 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm)-even if a shooting doesn't happen in your town or at your school, it can be personally overwhelming. But coping with a violent world is something doctors and others say you can learn to do. Today we talked to doctor ryan dix, a psychologist with providence medical group northeast. He says realizing that you're not the only one who may be anxious or depressed by violence you hear about is important. "normalizing" those feelings he calls it. Is a good place to start.
- 5/22/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-the owner of the trail blazers and co-founder of microsoft, paul allen, is now adding his voice to the gun control debate. He's throwing his weight. And money. Behind a new campaign to raise the age you can legally buy a semi-automatic weapon in washington from 18 to 21. In a tweet last night. Allen pledged a million dollars to "initiative 16-39". He calls the initiative "a reasonable" and necessary measure to improve school safety." Supporters need about 260-thousand signatures to qualify the initiative for the november ballot
- 5/24/18 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-"prohibits assault weapons large capacity magazines unless registered with state police criminal penalties." It doesn't exactly roll off the tongue but the attorney general's office has decided that's the ballot title for an assault weapons ban proposal. It's a major milestone for the interfaith group proposing the ban. They celebrated in northeast portland today but in the wake of yet another school shooting there was also a tone of urgency. The title also notes that "assault weapons" and "large capacity magazines" will be defined within the text of the bill. Organizers still have to collect more than 88-thousand signatures for it to make it on the november ballot

- 6/01/18 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-oakridge junior-senior high school cancelled classes today after a written threat of a shooting was found inside the school last week. School officials say the threat was found inside a pencil box, naming today's date at noon. Clara benitez, spoke with a concerned parent whose child is now taking online classes due to his fear of hallways of oakridge junior-senior high school. His mother says his fear of a school shooting got worse after a threat was made to his high school this past february. Oakridge school superintendent dr. don kordosky says threats and incidents like the one in february and last week are taken very seriously. His goal to make sure his students and staff returned to a safe place monday morning.Personally checking the campus himself. Dr. kordosky say, threats like these impact the entire community and right now the penalties are minimal. So for the remainder of the school year, he has banned backpacks and requested random searches of anyone who comes in the building. Dr. kordosky says this incident is a reminder for parents to update their phone numbers and email addresses with the school. So they can get updates on situations like these

The douglas forest protective association is urging homeowners in wooded areas to create a defensible space around their homes. People can create this space by mowing tall grass, pruning trees, and removing dead or dying vegetation within 200 feet of a home. Fire specialists say fire season depends on conditions, but can start as early as mid-may.
- 4/24/18 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-mckenzie river fire and rescue is asking residents to approve a levy on the may ballot. To help pay for staffing and day to day operations. The fire chief, who says this levy would not only help them keep their staffing but their student program as well. The current levy expires next year, in 2019.0nly allowing fire and rescue to use their funds for capital improvements—such as fire trucks, facility repair, and medical equipment. - 5/07/18 **Oregon's News at 7** (7pm) —The Federal Government is aiming to protect oregon's wildlife. The state received a 750-thousand dollar federal grant to protect threatened and endangered spicies west of the cascades. The grant comes from the U-s fish and wild life service. The state has agreed to pair the funds with an additional 250-thousand dollar grant. The funding will go to the oregon department of fish and wildlife and the oregon department of forestry. The next step is for officials from both agencies to collect data to detemine what is endangered in the northwest forest lands. Jason cox with 0-d-f says their habitat conservation plan will be the second phase. The plan takes into account 30 to 50 years, on how to protect threatened and endangered species while still allowing forest management
- 5/09/18 **Oregon's News at 10~(10pm)** —the fire season is on its way. Now the city of roseburg is reminding those who live in the area to clean their property before it's too late. Under a roseburg city ordinance, property owners are required to cut grass and weeds that grow taller than one-foot. City officials say low rainfall and higher temperatures can quickly dry out vegetation poison ivy and blackberry vines are other examples of vegetation that property owners need to keep below that twelve-inch height limit. The city will enforce the law to keep local residents safe
- 5/11/18 **Oregon's News at 7** (7pm) Temperatures are heating up in douglas county. And fire officials want people to be careful while burning yard debris. The douglas forest protective association says yard debris is one of the leading causes of human caused wildfires in oregon. People are not allowed to burn rubber or plastic products, tires, or garbage. The association says being careful and paying attention can go a long way specialists say you can be held financially responsible for any damage caused by burning yard debris.
- 5/16/18 **Oregon's News** @ 10(10pm)-it's mowing season for lane county crews who are out and about clearing rights of way and ditches. Every summer, crews cut grass and brush. The vegetation supervisor says the main reason is safety. One, it gives drivers a clear line of sight on the road and from their driveways. It keeps road signs visible. And two, it reduces fire risk. The mowing will continue

The oregon department of forestry suggests to keep your campfire small to make it easier to put out. They also say to watch the fire at all times and never use gasoline or other flammable liquids around a fire.

But he says they should have told people sooner. The city manager apologized for how the situation was handled. According to the oregon health authority, the cyanotoxins that triggered the advisory are unregulated, meaning there are only guidelines instead of hard-and-fast rules from the epa on what to do in an event such such as this one. And they say it's the first time in oregon they've gotten into the drinking water supply, though the city says algae blooms have been spotted in the detroit reservoir since 20-10
