Today, some schools across the country are using new technology to scan social media posts by students. A school district in connecticut pays two dollars per student for a service called 'social sentinel'. The software scans public social media posts within a geographical area for certain words and phrases that could indicate violence. The idea has troubled privacy advocates but the school says it's worth it. They say they've intercepted nearly 20 real situations since adopting the program five years the system does not allow schools to do their own searches. Instead, an algorithm does all the work. Here in oregon we have a tip line called "safe oregon." safe oregon is a website and app where students can report threats and concerns from every school and every district
