Governer brown vowed to defend latinos in the state including those who enterned the country illegally. This comes as an oregonain group is seeking signatures to repeal the statute which made oregon the first sanctury state. At the moment the law prohibits law enforcement from detaining people who are in the U-s illegally - but have not broken other laws

If the city council passes this request twenty eligible daca recipients will be able to renew at no cost to them.

The legislature passed the \$670 million tax package on health insurers and providers to sustain coverage for more than 350,000 local medicaid expansion recipients.

Fire officials say for rural communities, like pleasant hill, one of the best things homeowners can do is install sprinkler systems. That goes for mobile homes or regular homes. There's no requirement in oregon for home fire sprinklers. But officials say they can prevent total destruction, and most importantly, they buy time for the firefighters. That's because sprinklers contain the fire from the start: in rural areas, officials have to bring their own water because there are no hydrants. The fire marshal says it can take a while to haul that load especially if they have to go a long distance and navigate country roads. So the sprinklers get a head start on combating the fire while they're on their way.

The fire briefly closed down highway 58 in the area... While fire crews battled the flames. All lanes on highway 58 are clear now. Traffic is moving in both directions on highway fifty-eight, but the westbound shoulder is closed. Drivers can expect delays and possible road closures. You can go to trip-check-dot-com for the latest on traffic conditions
- 7/25/17 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm) & **Oregon's News** @ **10** (10pm)-Eugene and springfield fire crews responded to a small brush fire in west eugene off "Janisse" and dani street this afternoon. Crews initially responded to a structure fire. But it turned out to be an abandoned couch that had been smoking and eventually spread to a tree and nearby dry vegetation. Crews quickly put out the small blaze and are now monotring hot spots: nearby businesses were not affected by the fire. Investigators believe it may have been started by a discarded cigarette. The area is also known to have a lot of unwanted transient activity.
- 7/25/17 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm)-several trails in the mount jefferson wilderness are closed tonight due to a wildfire. Right now that fire is fifty acres -- with smoke visible from highway twenty-two. Whitewater trail, cheat creek trail, triangulation trail and crag trail are facing closures while fire crews work to suppress the flames. About eighty-five people and two helicopters are battling the fire.
- 7/25/17 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-the oregon department of forestry has delclared a high fire danger level for north douglas county and western lane county. That includes west of interstate five to the coast range. Residents are required to stop the personal use of gas powered or spark-emitting equipment between ten a-m and eight p-m each day. According to the department of forestry, most fires in lane county are human caused. The western lane fire district has already responded to two large grass fires this summer.
- 7/26//17 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-cleanup efforts continue after a large wildfire in oakridge yesterday. Crews spent the day chopping trees and mopping up hot spots to prevent anything else from sparking. The fire destroyed one home and covered about a half mile of hillside. But firefighters prevented it from spreading to nearby businesses on highway 58. The oakridge fire chief says it initially started when a dead tree fell on a powerline. Power is now back on in that area. Oakridge firefighters say that big blaze is just one example of what they're facing this summer. Reporter audrey well is oakridge tonight with the latest.
- 7/26/17 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-it's all cleaned up out here now. It took several neighboring fire stations and even community members who picked up hoses, to put out the flames. The oakridge fire department is grateful for that support because they're busier than ever this year and short on man power. Captain tim whittaker says oakridge fire department can't do it alone. At the latest count there are 5 full time firefighters and 13 volunteers. They'd ideally like close to *30 volunteers. It's a bad year to be short-staffed because oakridge is responding to a *Record number of emergency calls. Whittaker says he's not sure why the increase -- it could be more traffic in the area and this is a bad season for fires. So often they *are relying on those outside forces. He says it's thanks to their help, and the people of oakridge, that the firefighters were able to protect their community. The fire department is actively looking for volunteers. They have applications available at the station.
- 7/26/17 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-fire managers say a month-old lightning strike caused a fire to break out in the mount jefferson area. The fire has grown to eighty acres and it is fifteen percent contained. About one-hundred and twenty people are battling the flames. Crews are digging lines and helicopters are dousing the fire with water. Several trails are still closed in the area.

Starting today, a complete fire ban is in effect for linn county until further notice. That means *all* recreational fires are banned including campfires in city parks or campgrounds. You can still use barbeque grills, but fire officials say they should be used on concrete or gravel. And at least ten feet from any building.
- 8/02/17 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm)-that extreme heat is causing concerns about wildfires. Oregon governor kate brown has declared a state of emergency in response to wildfires burning in the state.
- 8/02/17 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-high temperatures and winds are fueling a wildfire in the mount Jefferson wilderness. The whitewater fire has grown to fifteen hundred acres and is ten percent contained. About 175 firefighters are working on that blaze. Crews are using helicopters and fire retardent planes to slow the spread of the fire. The willamette national forest has closed all trails leading into Jefferson park.
- 8/07/17 Oregon's News @ 7 (7pm) & Oregon's News @ 10 (10pm)-the whitewater wildfire grew just under 100 acres overnight. It's now burning more than 55-hundred and fifteen acres in the mount jefferson wilderness. Fire crews will continue to monitor and contain the fire from spreading. Portions of detroit lake will be closed until 6 o'clock tonight for scooper planes. Trail access points into Jefferson park remain closed.
- 8/07/17 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-steep terrain and thick fuel is bringing challenges to crews working to contain a fire south of blue river. The rebel fire has burned 84 acres around in the three sisters wilderness. About one-hundred firefighters and super scoopers are using water out of the cougar reservoir to contain the rebel fire. If you are travelling along the aufderheide scenic byway. You can expect to see some traffic and smoke. Rebel trailhead and red diamond campgrounds are closed.
- 8/08/17 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm) & **Oregon's News** @ **10** (10pm)-the rebel fire burning south of blue river has grown to about two-hundred acres tonight. Firefighters say there's no end in sight. The fire is spreading quickly. And as reporter audrey well shows us, it's in a remote wilderness area that's hard to control.
- 8/08/17 **Oregon's News** @ **7** (7pm) & **Oregon's News** @ **10** (10pm)-due to the dry conditions there already are restrictions on campfires in cmapgrounds. - 8/09/17 **Oregon's News** @ 7 (7pm)-weather conditions yesterday kept the whitewater fire inside mount jefferson from growing for the third day in a row. The fire is burning about 55-hundred acres. Fire officials are now working to determine when to begin burnout operations. That means they will all trail access points into Jefferson park remain closed.
