APRIL 1ST- JUNE 30TH 2020

In an ongoing effort to serve the public interest, KQOB and its owners, Champlin Broadcasting, Inc. offers a variety of programming, responsive to the issues of concern to the listening audience. Below is a list of the station's most significant programming treatment of those issues for the period of APRIL 1ST- JUNE 30TH 2020

HEALTHCARE- This station chose to address a variety of health issues of continuing importance to our listeners. These issues cover areas of health care ranging from infants to adults.

THE ARTS- This station believes it is important to support the arts and the entities that work hard to bring the arts to this community, whether it be a museum or a theater group.

ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS- This station strives, whenever possible, to alert the community to opportunities to make the environment in which they live a better, healthier one.

COMMUNITY AWARENESS- This station has worked to provide non-profit agencies an outlet to inform the community about services available to them.

SAFETY- this station makes an effort to inform its listeners of ways to make their world safer by having knowledgeable people talk about a variety of pertinent issues.

EDUCATION- this station chose members of the educational community to inform listeners of classes, workshops and other opportunities to be better educated.

ECONOMY- this station has given professionals the chance to inform its listeners of its economic health and ways to improve the business environment.

FAMILY- this station supports families and their day-to-day issues. It has brought information that covers issues ranging from better parenting to how to be a better sibling/student.

2ND QUARTER PUBLIC SERVICE 2020

April 5th

On this week's program we featured an interview with the Oklahoma City County Health Dept. We had two experts discussing statistics from Covid 19 case numbers and strategies on how to best help the public stay informed about testing an protection.

We also featured a representative from the Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma. The increased need by the public for food from the organization has caused a larger need for the food bank's services.

April 12th

Because of the global pandemic, the deadline for filing taxes has been pushed back to July by the federal government. Jimmy Williams joins the program as a representative of the Oklahoma Society of CPA's to give us the details.

We check in again with Cathy Nestlen from the Regional Food bank and find out what the public can do to help get more meals out to needy families, and to connect with those who need food assistance.

April 19th

On this week's program, we were able to talk with a specialist in convalescent plasma from the Oklahoma Blood Institute. He was able to explain what plasma is, and why those have recovered from the virus are need for plasma donations.

On the second segment of our program we again featured the Regional Food Bank with more strategies in getting food assistance to the growing number of people who are currently unemployed and needing food to feed their families.

April 26th

We checked in with the folks at the Oklahoma State Health Department about their drive through testing and other ways in which they are working to help the public deal with the coronavirus outbreak.

May 3rd

More and more people are seeking food assistance, and the Regional Food Bank has closed down their volunteer portions of their operation, making their job much more difficult. We talked with them about how they are coping and bringing much needed food to the community.

The second segment this week is dealing with tips on how to deal with sudden financial loss. Amy Welch from the Oklahoma Society of CPA'S brings us information on what to do when you find yourself without a job and mounting bills.

May 10th

Summertime usually means kids getting ready to head for summer camp, but because of the outbreak that won't be happening. Campfire Heart of Oklahoma will not be holding in-person camps this year as of this time. They have developed some unique on-line classes for kids to help with the extreme cabin fever many children are experiencing.

Segment two this week talks about what to do to save money when you find yourself unemployed. Amy Welch gives us more tips from the Oklahoma Society of CPA's.

May 17th

Allied Arts association would normally be holding their largest fundraiser of the year for Oklahoma arts organizations around the state, but because of the pandemic they have had to reimagine their money raising efforts. We talked with them about what they are doing to support local artists.

Again we were able to talk to Campfire Heart of Oklahoma about their unique approach to "online camp" for local children to spend time with their peers and keep busy during lockdown

May 24th

Many restaurants have either closed or gone to curbside pick-up and the Paseo Farmers Market has been able to adjust their availability to safely serve the public with a website that allows customers to pre-order artisan items and food. The items are then picked up curbside on Saturday to keep patrons safe during the pandemic.

Struggling artists are again discussed as the Allied Arts association works to help support local artists who have no support system due to their unique lifestyles.

May 31st

Upward Transitions was formed over 100 years ago to help stranded travelers. Today they are still helping local homeless people as well as helping to keep struggling families in their homes at this difficult time. We spoke with two of their representatives about what they are doing to help.

The topic for segment two is "going lean", how to pare down expenses and live on less during hard financial times. Amy Welch from the Oklahoma Society of CPA's gives great financial advice on where to cut and what to keep.

June 7th

More financial topics are top of mind with unemployment at record highs. The Oklahoma Society of CPA's gives more tips on what to do when your job is gone and you still have bills to pay. Amy Welch councils us to communicate immediately with the people you owe and set up payment plans.

Upward Transitions segment about assistance for people who need to pay rent but have no income is discussed. The demand for their services has increased and people who have never needed help are lining up for their services.

June 14th

This week we talk with Bridges of Norman and The Spot. These organizations were formed to help students who do not have an adult in their life continue with their high school education. The Spot provides a place for them to meet and mingle to use Wi Fi and play games in off hours in Norman.

Carpenter Square Theater's entire season has been effected by the pandemic. They have begun doing plays on YouTube and taking donations. Meanwhile they are building a previously planned new theater facility in hopes that they will have a season to produce in the fall. Two representatives joined us for a chat.

June 21st

The Oklahoma City County Health Dept. comes back to the show to discuss the alarming spike in cases of Covid 19. We talked about what businesses and the public can do to help stop further spread.

Bridges of Norman is back on the show talking about the rescheduling of two events they had planned to have as fundraisers pre-pandemic. The Spot will have two events in July, depending on the status of local case numbers of the virus.

June 28th

The case spike continues in the Oklahoma City metro and two representatives join us on the program to discuss strategies for dealing with it.

Two speakers will appear in July in Norman for two different topics in July at The Spot in Norman, a place for kids to gather in Norman. We discuss the nature of those performances and dates in the second segment of the program.
