## Quality Story Time

Experts have long recommended children be introduced to reading as early as possible – and now, new research can help parents make story times even more beneficial for their little ones. An international study headed by researchers at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center found greater brain activation in four-year-olds when they are "highly engaged" during reading time. Dr. John Hutton explains that means asking them questions and getting them more involved in reading – which he says works like a "turbo charge" for the brain...

The study suggests parents develop a reading routine that allows them to spend quality time with their child and a book on a daily basis. That also means turning off cell phones, which Hutton says are the most common preventable barrier to a quality story time.

Hutton adds that long-term studies are needed with very young children to better understand the parent-child connection to healthy brain development and literacy skills.

## Juvenile Center Major Expense Major Expense For OTC

It's becoming an issue in all parts of West Central Minnesota, juveniles in trouble and causing lots of it. The West Central Regional Juvenile Center in Moorhead is where these young people are sent between the ages of 12 to 18, who have committed a crime and which is punishable in the adult system, and also youth who have been sentenced by the courts for up to 90 days. They service 11 counties around the region, including Otter Tail County, which averages around thirty intakes per year. During Tuesday's board meeting Otter Tail County Commissioner Wayne Johnson of Pelican Rapids questioned why so much money was being spent on services for so few individuals...

OUTCUE: "...we're only talking thirty kids."

The main issue is that Otter Tail County is using more beds than they have pre-paid for. Center Director Steve Larson told commissioners that if they were to purchase more of the beds up front that it would actually be cheaper for the county in the long run. Larson also revealed that they usually they receive a majority of boys, but now girls are being brought in at a higher rate than ever, in fact a thirty percent increase has been seen in just the last couple of years.

## Child Care Deserts

09-11-17

There's good news and bad in newly-released data about the supply of good-quality child care. The bad news is 26 percent of Minnesotans live in so-called "child-care deserts," without sufficient care for the families who need it. The good news is that Minnesota ranks better than most states. Rasheed Malik with Center for American Progress says the data show slightly more than half of Americans don't have access to high-quality, affordable child care where they live...

The study says access to child care is much like infrastructure – essential to the economy, and worth more federal investment. A similar study last year showed three-quarters of Minnesotans lived in a child-care desert. But this year's study included licensed family providers, of which there are 10 thousand in Minnesota.

The study found that in child-care deserts, families are likely to face waiting lists, make unlicensed child-care arrangements, or decide not to have a parent work full-time.

## Human Trafficking Conversation

The Fergus Falls Area United Way Women's Leadership Council's "Conversations that Matter" program Tuesday at the Bigwood Event Center was a hit. The subject of the conversation was "Human Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation in Rural Minnesota."

One of the panelists presented to the 144 mostly women in attendance was herself sexually exploited. Jeville Sutton says at age 12, she was a chronic runaway in the foster care system with no parents around. And she had esteem issues...

She was rescued from human trafficking by a woman who gave her love, support, and services. The woman loved Sutton unconditionally until she could love herself. Sutton is now 32 years old and is helping other girls who are sexually exploited.

Leadership Council President Sharon Casey says United Way was pleased to be a launching pad for discussion on this Greater Minnesota problem, which many didn't know existed...

Sutton says what she's learned is that job training, housing, therapy and other services need to continue for victims past age 18 so they don't fall back into the same trap before they're capable of taking care of themselves.
