The Binghamton University professor who invented the lithium-ion battery has earned a prestigious national honor. Stan Whittingham, Distinguished Professor of Chemistry and Materials, has been elected to the National Academy of Engineering. Whittingham is one of 83 new members and the first from B-U. He developed and patented rechargeable lithium-ion batteries while working for Exxon in the 1970's and 80's. That technology is now used in electric and hybrid vehicles as well as smart phones and tablets. New York State recently awarded his department 1 million dollars to develop a pilot battery manufacturing facility on campus. Whittingham, whose been at the university since 1988, says that besides the personal prestige that comes with his induction, membership in the National Academy will likely make it easier for him to bring grants and research funding to B-U. Whittingham will be formally inducted in September.

State Senator Fred Akshar says he wants to hear from school officials before supporting any efforts to improve school safety. Akshar says that in the wake of the Parkland, Florida shooting, public officials need to redouble their efforts to prevent school violence. The Senator is convening a roundtable discussion next Monday with local superintendents and law enforcement officials. He says he wants to know what sort of funding, legislation or other help local stakeholders need. With regard to renewed calls for more restrictions on firearms, Akshar says he remains a strong advocate of the 2nd amendment, but would be open to discussing new gun control restrictions. Akshar would like to see the New York SAFE Act gun control measure renegotiated. He likes the enhanced penalties, universal background checks and mental health provisions. But he disagrees with the handgun recertification and other elements. Following Monday's roundtable, Akshar plans a series of School Safety Summits across his district that will include teachers and students as well as administrators.

It's that time of year again when seemingly rational people appear to lose their minds and jump into a tub of cold water. 8 brave souls participated in the 5th annual Polar Plunge at SUNY Broome. Plungers receive pledges for the amount of time they spend in the unheated ice-pool with the money supporting the Wes Warren Memorial Scholarship Fund, named for the late criminal justice professor who initiated the plunge. The scholarships support SUNY Broome

students in the Criminal Justice and Emergency Services department. Faculty member Leigh Morrissey says her body went numb within a minute of getting in. Joining Morrissey and 5 members of the University Police force were 2 students. Andrew Kinner is in his first semester studying to become a police officer. He says he tortured himself by stepping down the ladder instead of just jumping in. Eventually, for their safety, Kinner and his pool-mates were asked to get out. Each year, the plunge raises thousands of dollars for the scholarship fund.

Detailed Description:

In the wake of the recent school shooting in Florida, State Senator Fred Akshar held a meeting with school officials and members of law enforcement today to discuss school safety. A School Safety Summit was held at the State Office Building that included well over 2 dozen local school superintendents, principals, chiefs of police and sheriffs from Broome, Tioga, Chenango and Delaware Counties.

The meeting lasted about 2 hours and focused on safety plans already in place, safety infrastructure upgrades, school resource officers, barriers to safety and mental health services provided in schools. One issue that came up was a massive delay on money that's earmarked for local school districts to upgrade safety features at their buildings. Suzanne McLeod is the Union-Endicott Schools Superintendent. She and other superintendents talked about a possible change to HIPAA laws that would allow emergency responders and educators to share information if a student has been arrested or taken to the hospital for a mental health evaluation in order to help that student seek services while keeping other students safe. For example, if a student was taken to the Mental Health Crisis Center, or C-PEP, law enforcement could share that information with administrators so they are aware of that situation. Police Chief Joe Zikuski made a point to say on some occasions, a student is taken to C-PEP only to return to school the next day with no wrap-around service or follow-up. Akshar says plans to hear from students and teachers at another forum in the near future.

In wake of the recent school shootings taking place across the country, the Chenango Valley School District is bringing parents up to speed on its safety procedures and polices. Chenango Valley District Representatives along with the school board held a meeting on safety last night in the auditorium. A few dozen parents along with some students came out to hear the current safety policies that are in place including visitors showing photo I-D upon entering the school along with utilizing security vestibules and a School Resource Officer that is shared with the Maine-Endwell School District. After the meeting, attendees were split into groups to discuss school safety in general along with what other improvements that can be made. The discussion also touched on mental health services provided in schools. Gill says the district is very proactive rather than reactive when it comes to school safety. Gill, who participated in Senator Fred Akshar's School Safety Summit, says he'd like to see more state and federal funding that can be allocated for safety infrastructure upgrades.

Governor Cuomo delivered his vision for the Empire State in 2018 today in Albany. Cuomo gave his 2018 State of the State and budget address this afternoon. The hour-and-a-half long speech began with Cuomo discussing 3 major challenges facing New York, discrimination and sexism, safety and quality of life and federal and economic pushback from Washington. He also discussed the opioid epidemic, expanding the Excelsior Free College Tuition initiative, protecting the state against terrorism, and the economy. The Democrat wants to ramp up clean energy efforts, including tapping into more off-shore wind power. Cuomo spoke out against the SALT deduction cap, and says the main focus in 2018 will be working with municipalities to cut property taxes. Cuomo says this budget year, in particular, will be difficult. Additional speech topics included campaign finance reform and fighting to end homelessness in the Empire State. Cuomo touted private sector job growth along with New York's booming tourism industry and says he wants to invest 63-million dollars for upstate state parks. Closer to home, Cuomo mentioned the Southern Tier's hemp industry and the creation of a hemp processing facility.

Congresswoman Claudia Tenney was in our area today to tour a number of local businesses. NewsChannel 34 caught up with Tenney at her first stop at Crowley Fabricating and Machining located at 403 North Nanticoke Avenue in Endicott. The facility manufactures parts used in defense, aerospace and commercial markets. Tenney touted the veteran-owned business, but criticized the New York business climate by saying Governor Andrew Cuomo is choosing winners and losers based on REDC award funding, which the Congresswoman calls a waste of taxpayer dollars. Tenney, who is also a business owner in the Utica area says the Empire State is not open for business. Tenney also made stops at Petcosky and Sons Plumbing and Heating in Vestal along with International Paper in Conklin. Tenney also says the recently passed Tax Reform Bill will help stimulate the local economy.

State Senator Fred Akshar stopped by a local non-profit that serves developmentally disabled people to see how he can help the organization. The Republican visited ACHIEVE located at 125 Cutler Pond Road in the Town of Dickinson this morning. ACHIEVE provides day habilitation along with skill development services for the intellectually and developmentally disabled. ACHIEVE used to operate Country Valley Industries which provided employment for 200 developmentally disabled clients, but the State's Office for People with Developmental Disabilities cut the funding for the program and transitioned to integrated employment opportunities. Akshar says he wants to ensure that people served by ACHIEVE are being cared for. Mary Jo Thorn is the CEO of ACHIEVE. She says the organization is looking to expand at Cutler Pond to bring on 40 clients as part of an adult social program. Some of the clients that were laid off receive services at home. Thorn says the new program would allow them to play a bigger role in our community. Thorn says ACHIEVE is looking to renovate space on its Cutler Pond campus to create a space for the adult program. The non-profit serves Broome, Tioga and Chenango Counties.

Congresswoman Claudia Tenney is introducing a bill in Washington that would try to prevent fentanyl from making its way into the country.

The Republican has created the DONT Act, standing for Deterring Overseas Narcotics Transport. It would use the State Department to prohibit countries from exporting fentanyl into our country. Tenney says China is the leading exporter of fentanyl, the potent controlled substance given to people for short-term pain relief. It's also sold on the black market with dealers disguising it as heroin. Tenney says opioid abuse in general is a hot topic in the White House. The legislation would cut funding and resources to countries that send fentanyl to the U-S. She's hoping a similar bill is proposed in the Senate, and Tenney says President Trump has agreed to sign the legislation if it lands on his desk.

U-S Senator Chuck Schumer was in our area to voice his support for a grant that pays for the salary and training of local fire fighters.

Schumer stopped by the Johnson City Fire Department located at 320 Harry L Drive this morning. He spoke about supporting and increasing federal funding for the SAFER grant, or Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response. The grant pays for training and employment of firefighters at career departments, like J-C Fire. The Village has 5 firefighters on the staff who are funded by the SAFER Grant. Schumer says he wants to ensure they stay on when the grant runs out. Matthew Lee is the Johnson City Firefighters Association Union President. He says the grants allow the department to fight fires more efficiently. Schumer says he wants to increase the amount of money allocated for the program and also says he's in full support of the Village's application for another round of funding. The Senate Minority Leader would also like to see an increase in funding used to provide equipment for local departments as well.

Binghamton Mayor Rich David was invited to Washington D-C to speak about our area's infrastructure needs. David was one of several mayors who were invited to the White House this afternoon for a meeting on a proposed infrastructure bill. David says he's looking to bring the perspective of small to medium sized cities to discuss their needs, specifically, water and sewer plants along with underground water infrastructure. The Republican says the proposed infrastructure plan is disappointing and unfair because the federal government is looking to provide less funding for infrastructure projects, leaving local governments to pick up the bill. David says the bill focuses on funding for major throughways, ports, airports and mass transit. David hopes the proposal will shift its focus to aging infrastructure and bridges while providing more federal funding.

In recognition of Birth Defect Prevention Month, a local non-profit is sharing tips on ways to keep babies healthy in the womb. The Mothers and Babies Perinatal Network held a news conference this morning at its office on West State Street in Binghamton. Broome County Medical Director Doctor Christopher Ryan discussed the importance of receiving a flu shot for anyone over 6 months old. Mark Roth, from Mother to Baby New York, discussed teratogens which is an agent or substance that can potentially have harmful effects on pregnancy. While some birth defects are genetic and cannot be prevented, others can be avoided by a healthy lifestyle and staying substance free. Around 10-percent of all birth defects are sourced to teratogens. In addition, expecting mothers are encouraged to take a multivitamin, which helps provide a sufficient amount of folic acid, which helps prevent spina bifida, oral clefts and heart defects. 1 in 33 babies are born with birth defects nationwide.

Broome County is receiving more state funding to fight the heroin epidemic in our area. County Executive Jason Garnar along with representatives from the Health Department announced a 2-year, 50-thousand dollar a year grant for services and outreach regarding the opioid crisis. Broome will partner with the New York State Opioid Overdose Prevention Program to decide how to spend the money.

Susan Wheeler is a community representative who sits on the Broome Opioid Abuse Council and is also a grieving parent who lost her 25-year old daughter Morgan to a heroin overdose in 2016. She says the County can use all of the funding it can get. One portion will fund a television and social media ad campaign to educate people on the dangers of opioids and the importance of talking to your doctor about the issue if opioids are prescribed. It will also expand the Peer Response Program which meets with local addicts to educate them on available services. Garnar says the drug treatment center located in the Town of Dickinson is slated to open on April 1st.

Broome County health officials have confirmed over 13-hundred cases of the flu in our area. A news conference was held this morning at the Health Department where Public Health Nurse Marianne Yourdon says Broome County has 1-thousand 310 cases of the flu. This year has been especially bad as the number of cases has already surpassed the total number of cases from last year and in 2014-2015, which was also designated as a particularly bad year. Broome County Jason Garnar and Deputy County Executive Kevin McManus received flu shots today as the health department encourages everyone to do. In addition to receiving a flu shot, Yourdon says staying away from those who are sick and frequent hand washing can keep the flu away. Anyone with a primary care physician can make an appointment to

receive the flu shot. In addition, anyone can receive one for free at the health department, even those who are not insured.

Rural Health Networks across the state are speaking out about a proposed cut in funding for the 2018 State Budget. According to Rural Health Network of South Central New York Executive Director Jack Salo, the non-profit along with 30 other organizations are facing a 20-percent cut in funding from the Department of Health. The Rural Health Network Development Program is a competitive grant that the organization has received for the past 20 years and is used to connect rural residents with services related to health care, housing and food. Salo says the organization received a similar cut in funding last year. Salo says residents should contact their state representative to advocate for restoring the funding. Detailed Description:

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation is updating the public on the status of Endicott's Toxic Plume.

The DEC discussed the monitoring of Operating Unit 7, the site located the Huron Campus in the area of Clark Street and Oak Hill Avenue. According to DEC Geologist Kevin Farrar, a recovery system was turned off in 2014 where groundwater was extracted to inject clean water to wash away contaminants, such as the industrial solvant TCE used by IBM. Since the system was turned off, the level of contaminants has not increased and the DEC is proposing to shut off the system to monitor it for the next 10 years. Only about a dozen residents showed up to the meeting held in the lecture hall at Union-Endicott High School. Ferrar says the group asked a lot of great questions. Ferrar says there is still a lot of work to be done, especially in the area of the vacant IBM buildings along North McKinley Avenue and North Street. Western Broome Environmental Stakeholders Association Member Frank Roma says although it's taken a while, progress is being made. Roma says he's concerned about how the DEC plans to clean up the contamination underneath the IBM buildings. In 2016, the DEC reported a 97-percent reduction in TCE groundwater concentration since 2004.

Detailed Description:

Smoking and tobacco trends have been tabulated as part of a regional study. Tobacco Free Broome and Tioga welcomed statistician and Jefferson Community College Professor Joel LaLone to present his findings on a recent tobacco survey. 41-hundred people in 11 counties were asked questions about tobacco use, policies and marketing. 21 percent of residents in Broome County are smokers compared tot 19 percent in Tioga County. In Broome and Tioga, 72 percent and 67 percent of people respectively support a policy to prohibit the sale of tobacco products in stores located near schools. LaLone says the data suggests people have been viewing tobacco differently over the past few years. The study also addressed electronic cigarettes. The rate of e-cig users in Broome County has increased 3 percent from 8 to 11 since 2013. In Tioga, the rate is 6 percent and has not significantly changed. 56 percent of Broome County residents consider breathing electronic cigarette aerosol as harmful.

Detailed Description:

Area sheriffs are reminding pistol-permit holders that they may be running out of time to recertify their handgun permits. Broome County Sheriff Dave Harder says that anyone who has a permit issued before January 15th 2013, must recertify with the state before the end of the month.

There are 2 ways to do this, online or through the mail. While gun-owners can come to the Sheriff's Office to pick up the form and receive help filling it out, it must be mailed to State Police. And Harder says he has no intention of going after those who fail to recertify. Harder says the recertification was authorized by the New York SAFE Act which he completely opposes. Harder says these actions punish legal gun owners instead of focusing on criminals who don't have permits. Tioga Sheriff Gary Howard says his office will also leave enforcement to the courts and the state. Harder says permits will need to be recertified every 5 years going forward. He estimates that about 20 thousand gun owners in Broome County are affected, of which he believes only about a quarter have done so. Dick's Sporting Goods will immediately end sales of assault-style rifles in its stores and won't sell guns to anyone under 21 years old following the school massacre in Parkland, Florida. The sporting goods chain was founded in Binghamton and has outlets in Vestal and Binghamton. Dick's will also stop selling high capacity ammunition magazines. Chairman and CEO Ed Stack said on "Good Morning America" this morning that after the shooting the company "felt it needed to do something." Stack says that the gunman, Nickolas Cruz, had purchased a gun at a Dick's store, but not the one used at the school shooting, even though all existing rules were followed. Stack says that the system that's in place won't stop sales to dangerous people and said lawmakers must do something. Stack says Dick's is prepared for any potential backlash, but will not change its policies on gun sales.

Detailed Description:

The Broome County Sheriff's Office is the latest location to host the Mobile Police Memorial Wall. Members of the Southern Tier Law Enforcement Memorial Association, which created the wall, were joined at a news conference today by Phil and Tom Tarsia, the father and brother of the late Kevin Tarsia. Kevin is the lone entry from the Broome County Sheriff's Office on the memorial. He was brutally murdered by 2 men on July 4th, 2002 in Kirkwood when he came upon them divvying up the loot from a gun store burglary. Tom says the family's wounds were reopened in 2015 when one of the killers, David Sweat, escaped from a maximum security prison in Dannemora, New York.

Tom says the escape strengthened his belief that Sweat and his co-defendant should have been executed for murdering his brother.

However, he is grateful to Broome County Sheriff Dave Harder and the Memorial Association for keeping his brother's memory alive.

The wall is on display and open to the public in the lobby of the Sheriff's Office, which is located behind SUNY Broome in the Town of Dickinson. The wall has been traveling around the region in advance of the annual Police

Memorial Week in Broome County which will be marked the first week of May. 38 officers along with 2 police canines from the State Police Troop C region are listed.

According to ABC News, Tercero was arrested at the request of the U-S government. Tercero, a B-U student, is accused of killing 22-year old B-U student Haley Anderson. Her body was discovered at Tercero's apartment at 23 Oak Street on Monday. Police say Tercero traveled to New York City and took a flight from JFK Airport to Nicaragua. Broome County District Attorney Steve Cornwell is currently preparing the case for a grand jury. Today, U-S Senator Chuck Schumer urged the acting Secretary of State to use all diplomatic resources to get Nicaragua to agree to extradite Tercero.

An effort is underway to create a lasting memorial for a local police officer who died in the line of duty almost a decade ago. July 27th will mark the 10th anniversary of the death of Port Dickinson Police Officer Aldo Rossi Junior. Rossi was standing along the Brandwine Highway in Port Dick, helping to clear a fallen tree and direct traffic, when he was struck and killed by a drunk driver. While there is a makeshift memorial near the site, the village does not have a permanent marker. Organizer Kathi Bailey regularly decorates the graves of fallen officers and tends to roadside markers. She's leading a fundraiser to erect a monument for Rossi outside Village Hall.

Bailey has launched a Go Fund Me page seeking 4 thousand dollars to erect the memorial. Current Port Dickinson Police Chief Doug Pipher was with a different department 10 years ago, but knew Rossi and says he was a good cop. Because the village's department is so small, only 10 officers including full and part-time, Pipher says it lacks a Police Benevolent Association thatt often spearheads such memorial efforts. He's hoping the community, including other law enforcement, supports the cause. Plans for the memorial include a granite monument with his picture and a bronze plaque, along with bluestone pavers, landscaping and possibly a new flagpole. The City of Binghamton and the Village of Johnson City have received an update on the Joint Sewage Treatment plant. Project Manager Ken Del Bianco gave a quarterly update on the status of the project last night. He says the current cost hovers around 262-million dollars, not over 300-million that some local Democrats estimated last month.

He adds the margin of increase due to unforeseen repairs, such as asbestos removal, is about 1 to 2 percent of the total project cost, which Del Bianco says is considered a "good" margin. In addition, Del Bianco says the recent reports of anticipated rate hikes omitted 40-million dollars in grant funding. Del Bianco also says the former project Democrats referred to was estimated at 60 to 90-million dollars, but only covered the cost of repairing a wall collapse and damages caused by the 2011 flood. In 2015, Binghamton Mayor Rich David and J-C Mayor Greg Deemie announced they were abandoning the 60-million dollar plan to create a comprehensive plan addressing many more issues. While rates are expected to rise, Del Bianco says this project is a complete overhaul of the plant. The BAF system is about 50-percent complete, new equipment is currently being installed and the administrative building will be occupied by the end of this month. Additionally, the flood wall will also be complete in a few weeks.

The project is about 3 and a half months behind schedule, and workers lost about 2 weeks of time to pour concrete because of January's subzero temperatures.

State Senator Fred Akshar hosted a panel discussion on ways to address our area's heroin epidemic. The Senate Joint Task Force on Heroin and Opioid Addiction, Co-Chaired by Akshar, held a discussion last night at Binghamton University. 4 sets of panels addressed a packed crowd at B-U to urge lawmakers to consider more treatment options, more funding to fight the epidemic and more wrap around services for addicts once they complete treatment. Truth Pharm Founder Alexis Pleus discussed the need for the state to mandate insurance companies to cover a minimum of 90-days. She also discussed the need for safe consumption sites, where addicts can use heroin under medical supervision, something Akshar opposes. Akshar says there are many approaches that need to be investigated to combat the epidemic. Penny Stringfield was a panelist and lost her son, Johnny, to a heroin overdose. She says her new insurance policy has no coverage for any treatment and was told it was too expensive for companies to carry the option. She says while more work needs to be done, people can overcome addiction. Other topics included the need for all emergency responders to carry Narcan, which reverses the effects of an overdose. One father discussed how many treatment centers across the nation are more concerned with money than treating people. In addition, panelists called for a tax for opioids and a tax on profits made by companies that push opioids.

Broome County Executive Jason Garnar is revealing major issues with the food producer at Willow Point Nursing Home. Garnar held a news conference this morning at Willow Point to address what he calls unacceptable food service at the facility. Philadelphia-based company Aramark has been providing meals for the nursing home since 2016, when then County Executive Debbie Preston privatized food service that used to be operated by Broome County's Central Kitchen, resulting in 1 point 6 million dollars in savings. Garnar says meals have been served late and are often too cold. He also says Aramark has not paid some of its bills and has threatened to serve food on trays, rather than from a steam table. Resident Rose Smith says Aramark routinely does not offer another option if people don't like the main course. Smith says she and other residents have skipped meals due to lateness and poor quality. She also says the issues started right when Aramark took over for Central Kitchen, which Smith says provided excellent service. Aramark also prepares meals for the Broome County Jail and Office for Aging, but Garnar says they have not had any issues with food service. Garnar is holding a meeting with Aramark executives tomorrow to address the problems and says he may consider terminating the contract. Aramark responded to our request for comment by saying "We share the County's dissatisfaction with the performance at Willow Point and are committed to working together to improve and deliver high quality service."

Binghamton Mayor Rich David is laying out his vision for the City in 2018. David delivered his State of the City address last night. He focused on topics such as homelessness, infrastructure, public safety, taxes and the arts. He announced a partnership with the Family Enrichment Network to build a 4 point 5 million dollar, 19-unit supportive housing complex for homeless families on the Northside. Since 2012, homelessness among students has increased 40 percent. David also announced state of the art renovations to the Binghamton Police Headquarters. He also discussed the crackdown and closure of multiple illegal after hours clubs. David outlined another year of aggressive infrastructure improvements including the Front and State Street gateway projects and the construction of a mixeduse parking garage at 7 Hawley street that will break ground this year and be complete by next January. He also discussed construction at the Binghamton-Johnson City Joint Sewage Treatment Plant where he disputed the claim that the project cost has tripled. He says instead of making band-aid improvements costing 100-million dollars, he and J-C Mayor Greg Deemie agreed to overhaul the site to prevent costly piecemeal fixes in the future. Democrat Conrad Taylor says he was pleased with the Mayor's Speech and initiatives, specifically a promise to cut residential and commercial taxes. David is applying for Greater Binghamton Fund money to create a Downtown Entertainment and Cultural Organizations, or DECO District. It would include a 1 point 2 million dollar streetscape improvement plan for the arts district, walkability upgrades, facade improvements to the 2 parking ramps, green infrastructure and a renovation of the Forum Theater and Artists' Row.

Broome County has issued a State of Emergency in response to Snow Storm Riley. County Executive Jason Garnar made the declaration today at 1:30. Those areas include the Towns of Sanford, Windsor and Colesville along with the Village of Deposit. There is a travel ban for those municipalities as well. Nearly 13-hundred NYSEG customers lost power in Tioga County and Delaware County has over 57-hundred outages. Broome County officials are demanding that New York City stop a program that pays the rent for homeless families who agree to relocate to our area. The county's Department of Social Services has discovered that 5 homeless families, all with children, have had their rent paid for 1 year in exchange to moving to Broome County. New York City's Human Resources Administration reportedly confirmed that they were sent as part of the city's Special One Time Assistance or SOTA program. DSS discovered the situation when the families came in to apply for SNAP food stamps, Medicaid and utility benefits, all of which they're now legally entitled to. Plus, once the year is up, the families are eligible for Broome County housing aid. Broome's Deputy County Attorney Howard Schultz says he's asked New York officials to cease the SOTA program, compensate Broome for the additional benefit costs and take the families back. Schultz says state law forbids government agencies from shirking their responsibility for caring for their needy. He says New York has promised to respond to Broome's concerns early next week. Schultz says that if they don't end the program, the county could seek either a civil injunction or a criminal investigation.

Members of the board overseeing the Binghamton-Johnson City Joint Sewage Treatment Plant say they have no say regarding an anticipated rate hike. NewsChannel 34 stopped by the plant's monthly board meeting today in Johnson City. Yesterday, local Democrats called on stakeholders to provide details on why the project cost has more than doubled. According to Binghamton Democratic Committee Chair Teri Rennia, the project began at an estimated 100-million dollars but has ballooned to 250-million, with room to expand to 350-million. Rennia says the rate increases, totaling 118 percent in the Town of Union, 92-percent in J-C and 84 percent in Binghamton, would be phased in. Board President George Kolba Junior says the Board only oversees day-to-day operations and does not have input on any of the construction costs. Instead, those decisions are made by the treatment plant owners, the Village of Johnson City and the City of Binghamton. Kolba says the lead agency is Binghamton which has the authority to determine on project costs. At today's meeting, Plant Superintendent Cathy Young says she's fielded a flood of phone calls regarding the rate hikes and suggested hiring a P-R firm to help educate the rate payers on how the process works. However, one board member dismissed reporting on the rate hikes as "inaccurate, full of omissions and fake news." NewsChannel 34 has not received a response from Binghamton Mayor Rich David.

Over a hundred people came out last night to hear the latest developments on the proposed natural gas compression station located in Hillcrest. A 4-hour long public hearing was held last night at the Port Crane Fire Station to appeal the Town of Fenton's designation of a compressor station as a trucking terminal. The opponents, which include a number of residents, Saint Francis of Assisi Church and the Chenango Valley School District stated their case to the Town's Zoning Board of Appeals. One resident, Maureen Singer, gave a presentation comparing trucking terminals utilized by UPS, FedEx and Frito Lay to the operation proposed by N-G Advantage. N-G is looking to tap gas from the Millennium Pipeline which would be compressed at 71 West Service Road in Hillcrest and trucked across the state. In August, the issue was taken to State Supreme Court and Judge Ferris Lebous ruled that the Town's Planning Board did not take a hard enough look at issues regarding traffic and environmental safety, but did not forbid the overall project. Singer says N-G's use is not applicable to the Town's current zoning laws, citing the compressor site as a prohibited use. After Singer's presentation and comments from the legal team representing residents, the church and the school district, N-G Advantage was given time to respond. N-G Advantage Vice President of Engineering Michal Cefalo says the operation involves loading and unloading trucks with compressed natural gas, therefore it is a trucking terminal. In addition, he says the compressors are electric-powered, non-intrusive and safe. N-G Spokesman Morgan Hook says he believes the project will move forward. After the presentations, public comments were heard, where over a dozen people spoke against the project and 2 people spoke in favor of it. About 90-percent of the room, based on applause from speakers, were not in favor of the site. The Zoning Board of Appeals members deliberated for about a half hour before deciding they would hold over their decision. They will continue their deliberations on February 6th at another public hearing. The time and location has not yet been determined.

Once it announced the lawsuit on January 2nd, Empire State Development responded and is in the process of turning over the numbers. Phillips estimates the advertising bill to be around 350-million dollars, which he says should be used for lowering taxes, not commercials. A Philadelphia-area developer is urging Broome County to allow him to make good on his promise to bring a piece of history back to life.

Alvaro Munoz, a partner at Odin Properties, has proposed a 10-million dollar rehabilitation of the historic Endicott-Johnson factory located on North Page Avenue in West Endicott. He's proposing to convert the facility into a 125-apartment mixed use senior housing facility with amenities. He purchased the building back in February 2016 from the previous owner, Alpine L-L-C and paid 300-thousand for the mortgage and 100-thousand for buyout rights. However, 27-thousand dollars was owed in back taxes. Munoz claims he sent a check for the back taxes to Broome County, but the County says it never received it. So, in May 2016 Broome foreclosed on the property and Munoz says they've ceased all communications with him. Munoz says he was never told that they didn't receive the check and didn't know the building was foreclosed until after the County moved forward with the process. He took the matter to County Court, where Judge Joe Cawley ruled in favor of the County. Munoz says he'll pay the 27-thousand in full and still wants to develop the building that the County wants to knock down. According to Broome County's Attorney, Robert Behnke, Munoz was aware of the pending motion to foreclose, and the county never received the check and never heard from Munoz again. Munoz says he hired a PR firm in an effort to get through to the Town of Union and Broome County. Munoz appealed the court decision and the matter will be addressed in Broome County Court next Thursday.

Broome County Executive Jason Garnar announced a 50-million dollar rehabilitation of the former Endicott-Johnson Manufacturing site, better known as the "E-J Victory building," located along Lester Avenue in Johnson City. Named for our effort in winning World War I, the 250-thousand square foot structure was built in 1921 as a shoe manufacturing factory until E-J left the building in the 1970s. Then, it became an industrial site and storage facility, until it was overtaken by Broome County for back taxes in 2014. The developer, 59 Lester Empire LLC, plans to create 228 apartments for seniors along with 2 floors of commercial space. Garnar says people will no longer consider it the "white elephant" of the Southern Tier. Garnar says 59 Lester Empire purchased the property for 250-thousand dollars.
