Queen City News Chief Investigator Jody Barr give an update on the investigation into the disappearance of property after Hollis Slade's sudden death in January 2021. Security camera footage shows some of Slade's former coworkers and hunting buddies, including Marlboro County Deputy Probate Judge Tammy Bullock, remove items from his home after his death. The footage includes video as well as audio discussions of the search for a will, but also of money and papers taken with the intent of withholding them from Slade's family. The Slade family asked Marlboro County Sheriff Charles Lemon to investigate, and he said he would, but never did. A South Carolina Law Enforcement Division investigation was recently closed and the findings handed over to the South Carolina Attorney Generals. Tammy Bullock resigned as Deputy Probate Judge and a subsequent investigation into Sheriff Lemon resulted in his arrest on unrelated charges.

A grown man found hanging in his bedroom and the only suspect the mother of his child. The Darlington County (South Carolina) Sheriff's Office assumed it was a suicide, but the Coronor's office stepping in with evidence suggesting someone killed Jason Hoover. Even though two pathologist's reports agree with the coroner, the Sheriff's homicide investigator didn't believe the evidence. Queen City News Chief Investigator Jody Barr talks with Hoover's mother, who insists they Sheriff's office was wrong and has worked for five years to uncover evidence she believes the investigation should have discovered themselves. The Sheriff's office has re-opened the case after Queen City's news stories aired. The investigation is ongoing.

Queen City News: Seize & Destroy 12/30/22 4:00-5:00am

Queen City News Chief Investigator Jody Barr shares the story of one farmer's federal lawsuit alleging that members of South Carolina's top law enforcers, SLED, the State Agriculture Department and the State Attorney General's office conspired to illegally arrest the farmer and destroy millions of dollars of hemp that he had a legal license to grow and of hiding evidence from federal investigators. All charges against the farmer have been dismissed.

Caleb James, a high school senior, died of a single gunshot on girlfriend's floor. His mother was convinced his girlfriend pulled the trigger. The Darlington County, South Carolina's sheriff's office investigated and concluded it was either suicide or an accidental death. After James' mother reached out to Queen City News Chief Investigator Jody Barr for help, his work resulted in the sheriff's office re-opening the investigation and eventually arrested the girlfriend on murder charges and is free on bond with no court hearing set. The original lead investigator with the Darlington County Sheriff's Office on this case has since resigned.

Over hundreds of thousands of dollars and a bag of drugs were seized in a roadblock outside of Columbia, SC in July 2021. In the end, one State Trooper was demoted and transferred.

						approved raises, state officials say salaries are still not competitive. They also want more workers to have annual raises built in and to boost pay in more expensive regions of the state. The state is also making Adult Corrections its own cabinet agency, separate from Public Safety.

This new data comes from the Center for Educator Recruitment and Retention and Advancement (CERRA). They say more than 8,300 educators left their jobs this summer, about 2,000 of them transferred to another school district in the state. But educator groups say the most startling number this year is the amount of vacant positions. At the start of the school year, school districts reported 1,400 vacant teaching positions, the most ever recorded by CERRA. This is despite school districts having about 500 fewer educator positions compared to last year. CERRA says school districts made 8,000 new hires before the start of the school year - 17% of those hires were graduates from South Carolina education programs, the lowest they've seen in 15 years. The South Carolina Education Association says policy makers need to make improvements to working conditions in the state's classrooms.

Earlier this year, CINTRA, a private developer, proposed adding a 9.4 toll corridor south of the city to connect with South Carolina. It's the same group behind tool lanes in northern Mecklenburg County. The proposal has been met with protests and lawsuits. There is also the question of financing the project. The organization could move forward with a public/private partnership contract, which could prove to be the quickest, but not the cheapest solution.

The Court ultimately adopted its own map of those districts. There ended up being a 7-7 split between the two parties in the election. Republicans say the court went too far and appealed the case to the U.S. Supreme Court. They are arguing what's known as the 'independent state legislature theory', saying state legislatures have the sole authority to regular federal elections in their states. Critics of the theory say the case could have implications for voting rights and legislatures accepting election results.
