The following issues were identified as significant and were addressed by WUPW-TV in the 3rd Quarter 2019 to serve the community and act in the public interest as set forth by the Federal Communications Commission:

Saturday 10:30-11pm ET "Leading Edge with Jerry Anderson"

This weekly news interview and discussion program is locally-produced and hosted by FOX Toledo News former News anchor/reporter Jerry Anderson. It features guests from government and community agencies in discussion of one or more issues of typical/newsworthy/timely issues of interest to viewers in the Toledo market. The duration of each program is 30-minutes.

Public Service Announcement (National & Local)

WUPW-TV airs public service announcements (PSAs) relevant to the topics of interest to the communities it serves. These PSAs air throughout the broadcast day on WUPW-TV. The total number of PSA that aired on WUPW-TV and WUPW-DT2 in the 3rd Quarter 2019 are included in this report.
