In Albania, the Church has grown rapidly but the number of Bibles remains low. Jason says that, "The need for Bibles outweighs the need for food and water. You can give someone a cup of water and it will satisfy them for a minute, but when you give them the Word, it will satisfy them for all eternity."
November 22, 2020	Feeding the Hungry on Thanksgiving	Description: Walmart has teamed up with several brands to offer a free Thanksgiving dinner to customers during the pandemic; the dinner comes complete with a turkey breast roast, canned soup, green beans and all the trimmings.
