Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum has recently completed his first hundred days in office. The biggest activity of his first 100 days is the slow pace to put ideas in place.

(SK New Superintendent) (Wednesday, 4/11/12)

After 16 years at North Knox as principal, Tim Grove will move south to take over as leader of the South Knox School Corporation. Grove says he is excited about his new position, but knows challenges lie ahead.

(VCSC sells Washington School) (Tuesday, 4/17/12)

A 4-1 vote led to the sale of Washington School to First Christian Church of Vincennes. The winning bid was 30-thousand dollars.

The Vincennes City Council has approved a nearly million dollar claim (Bicknell finances) (Wednesday 5/2/12)

The Bicknell City Council met in special session last night to discuss cutting nearly 200-thousand dollars in financial shortage for next year. Council members considered various methods of cutting the gap.

(NWS-- extreme heat) (Wednesday 6/26/12 ... tlz 6a)

The National Weather Service is calling for triple-digit heat to strike the area beginning today. Temperatures of 105 or above are possible both today and tomorrow.

N-W-S forecasters say Indianapolis may near its all-time record of 106 degrees. N-W-S forecaster Dave Tucek says this area may even be a couple of degrees above that. Tucek also doesn't discount a possible all-time record high over 110 degrees somewhere today.

Despite the heat, humidity levels will remain relatively low. The low humidity and moderate winds mean the heat index will not rise above the air temperature today. However, those same conditions have led to a red flag warning being issued for the area as a precaution against wildfires.

(Heat wave--power) (Friday 6/29/12 ... tlz 6a)

Duke Energy officials say despite the current heat wave, plenty of power will be available for anyone needing it. The power will go toward keeping people cool, as temperatures are forecast to rise above 105 degrees today, and stay in triple digits through the weekend.

Duke Energy spokesman Lew Middleton says no disruptions are expected from the intense heat— and expected intensive power use. The heat, combined with extreme dry condtions, has also dropped river levels and raised the river's water temperature. Middleton also states Duke Energy is watching the water temperature and levels— both at Edwardsport and elsewhere.
