Former Vincennes City Fire Chief Mike Siewers (Seavers) has passed away. Siewers died at Bridgepointe Health Campus at the age of 61; he was a victim of cancer.

The funeral will be held Thursday at ten a-m at Vincennes' Sacred Heart Catholic Church. Visitation will be from four to eight tomorrow evening at Fredrick and Son McClure-Utt Funeral Home. All Vincennes City flags will fly at half-staff through Thursday's funeral. The half-staff order came from a resolution approved last night by Vincennes City Council.

(Grove-- smooth transition) (Monday 7/16/12 ... tlz 6a)

New South Knox Schools Superintendent Tim Grove is starting his third week heading the South Knox School Corporation today. Grove's first day as head of the South Knox School Corporation was July second; he was named Superintendent following the retirement of former Superintendent Brad Case. He had earlier served as principal of North Knox High School, prior to taking the South Knox job.

Grove says the South Knox community has welcomed him with open arms. Grove also praised the help of former Superintendent Case and other administrative workers in the transition.

(NK-- Roofing second phase) (Monday 7/16/12 ... tlz 4p) (updated 7/17)

The North Knox School Board has approved the second phase of a contract to replace another section of roofing on the Corporation's junior and senior high school building. The Board accepted the bid of Royalty Roofing for 226-thousand, 648 dollars. Royalty also won Phase One of the building's roofing project.

The project's Phase Two will cover the building's east side classrooms and its commons area. The second roofing phase will begin in the next couple of days. The overall roofing plan has a third phase; however, North Knox Superintendent Darrell Bobe says Phase Three's completion may be delayed. Work on Phase Three will depend on both available time, and available finances.

(Citco-- Redistricting) (Tuesday 7/17/12 ... tlz 6a)

The Vincennes City Council's Redistricting Committee recommends a complete re-shaping of the City's election precincts. The Committee consists of new members T-J Brink, Tim Salters, and Duane Chattin.

The Committee is also considering either keeping a five-district set-up with two at-large members, or switching to a four-district, three at-large member configuration. This would be the first re-drawing of City precinct maps since the early 1980's.

Yesterday's meeting was the first in a proposed set of sessions to discuss the issue. Brink says the Vincennes City Council needs the public's suggestions in setting the new precinct maps.

(USB-- Adequate water supply) (Thursday 8/19/12 ... tlz 6a)

Vincennes Water Utilities officials report despite the drought, water supplies in Vincennes remain plentiful. Vincennes Water Utilities superintendent Kirk Bouchie told the Vincennes Utlity Services Board yesterday City water supplies have operated with few problems. The smooth operation has taken place despite a 66 percent increase in water use from July of last year. The 66 percent increase comes on the heels of a 68 percent water use increase in June.

Bouchie reports despite increased water use, the City is using just over half its pumping capacity.

(Filtration ceremony) (Thursday $7/19/12 \dots tlz 4p$) (updated 7/20)

Federal, state, and local dignitaries gathered in Lawrenceville yesterday for the grand opening of the new Lawrenceville Water Treatment plant.

The new facility's job is to remove impurities from Lawrenceville's

water. City officials speaking at the grand opening praised Illinois and U-S-D-A officials for providing the funds to construct the new plant. The City funded the plant with a seven-million dollar low-interest loan provided by the U-S-D-A through its Illinois State offices.

VCSC to Advertise 2013 Budget - for 7/24/12

The Vincennes Community School Board approved the advertisement of an over \$28 Million Dollar budget for next year. The proposed budget is similar to this year's and estimates a slightly smaller enrollment in the Vincennes schools. Of the \$28 Million dollars, about \$15 Million is paid by the state and the rest is paid with property taxes. According to Superintendent Greg Parsley the advertised tax rate will be artificially high at \$1.74 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation, but he expects the final rate to be about \$1.25 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation - an increase of about ten cents. Following advertisement, a public hearing, and passage on the local level, the budget will be studies and possibly adjusted by the state department of local government finance.

The Vincennes Board of Works has approved the first step toward possible construction of a new pool in the City of Vincennes. The pool is being proposed as a replacement for the current over-40 year-old design of Rainbow Beach.

The layout was preceded by public information sessions. Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum says the first meetings were for information—but last night started the real process of putting the pool into play. The real test for the pool will be a referendum vote scheduled for May of next year. Yochum says the referendum will be the real chance for Vincennes residents to voice their feelings on a new Rainbow Beach.

(Tarrants takes over Gimbel) (Monday 7/30/12 ... tlz 12n) (updated 7/31)

Travis Tarrants has become the new owner of the Gimbel-Bond property at Second and Main Streets. Former owner Darrell Lommel (DARR-ull LUH-mull) sold the property to Tarrants, instead of selling to the City of Vincennes. The City of Vincennes wanted to buy the property to qualify for a grant to clean it up. Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum is disappointed by the sale.

The Vincennes City Council is preparing to review its budgets for the 2013 calendar year. The first step will be a review and finalizing of department head budgets. The City's budget will then be advertised later this month.

Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum says the first budget review steps have begun. Yochum also knows a state error in COIT and EDIT tax reporting has benefited the City.

(VU-Contract extension)(Wednesday 8/1/12 ... tlz 4p)

Vincennes University president Richard Helton celebrated his ninth anniversary as V-U president with another three year contract extension. The extension is valid through July 31st of 2015. In comments made just after yesterday's vote, Helton says the extension is a great way to celebrate his nine-year anniversary as V-U's president. Helton also credits V-U's faculty and staff for putting changes in place he feels will move the University forward.

The Board agreed to the extension following an executive session; a review during the closed session found Dr. Helton had met and exceeded the position's criteria. The Board unanimously approved Dr. Helton's three-year contract.

(Tarrants-- Gimbel-bond plans) (Monday 8/6/12 ... tlz 6a)

Further movement to clean up the Gimbel-Bond property may take place in the next couple of days. New property owner Travis Tarrants says the first priority is to clean up the site as soon as possible. Tarrants also says he will talk with a contractor about another ownership transfer-- possibly within the next couple of days.

(Pantheon Theater updates) (Monday 8/7/12 ... tlz 6a)

Work on downtown Vincennes' Pantheon Theater continues -- but slower than expected. Pantheon Theater property owner Travis Tarrants is continuing his work to restore the theater to its former glory.

Tarrants says work on the former theater is steady-- but slow. Tarrants also claims the Vincennes Lowe's has plans to help restore the Pantheon Theater.

Tarrants further hopes the structure's listing as one of Indiana's Ten Most Endangered Landmarks will bring further restoration grants. Currently, the Pantheon is open for tours, but the structure has not yet been cleared to host performances.

(NK-budget presentation)(Thursday 8/9/12 ... tlz 6a)]

North Knox School Superintendent Darrell Bobe laid out the proposed 2013 budget to the North Knox School Board yesterday afternoon. The nearly 20-million dollar budget will be advertised on August 29th and September fifth. A public budget hearing is set for September tenth, with the final adoption set for October 16th.

The budget calls for a nearly dollar-12 cent levy per 100 dollars in assessed valuation. However, Superintendent Bobe claims the amount is being advertised artificially high, and expects the final tax levy to be near the current 47-cent levy per hundred.

The budget has built in a small increase over last year. The small increase is a reversal of a 17 percent decrease in the North Knox budget since 2008. Bobe says despite the budget's planned increase, another slight budget reduction may eventually be needed for 2013.

(Gimbel-Bond hearing set) (Thursday 8/9/12 ... tlz 6a)

Knox Circuit Court judge Sherri Gilmore has set an October 16th hearing on a City request to mandate cleanup of the Gimbel-Bond property. Last week the City updated a standing petition, asking the Court to force new property owner Pantheon Theater Company to remove the debris. The Pantheon Theater group purchased the property outright last week from former Gimbel owner Darrell Lommel.

The Pantheon company also became the bearer of back taxes owed on the

property, as well as a City bill for expenses in demolishing the structure. Together, the two outstanding expenses total around 57-thousand dollars.

Pantheon Theater Company owner Travis Tarrants says he has plans to remove the debris in the near future. Tarrants also says the debris can be removed without much added difficulty. Tarrants also claims his name should not have been added to the lawsuit last week. He believes that despite being Lommel's power of attorney, he had no authority over its cleanup before purchasing the property last week.

(CoCo-- Clerk's remodeling) (Wednesday 8/15/12 ... tlz 6a)

The Knox County Council has agreed in principle to a remodeling project for the main Knox County Clerk's office. The office is located on the second floor of the Knox County Courthouse.

County Clerk Lisa Clark-Benock requested 15-thousand dollars to start the work in October. The remodeling would happen at the same time a new court-based computer system would be installed in her office. The additional appropriation could be approved during Council's September budget hearings—in time for the work to begin in October. The Clerk's Election Room could also be remodeled following the November general election.

(Farbest groundbreak-- Seger) (Tuesday 8/14/12 ... tlz 5p) (updated 8/15)

Dignitaries from across the area and state of Indiana gathered in the Vincennes Industrial Park for the groundbreaking of the new Farbest Foods plant. The 225-thousand square-foot plant will locate on 60 acres in the south end of the facility. Farbest officials project the plant will cost them 75 million dollars to construct.

Farbest Foods president Ted Seger says the plant will bring many jobs to the area. Seger also says state of the art technology in the new factory will help them maintain competitiveness in a global economy.

(Comm-no more burn ban)(Thursday 8/17/12 ... tlz 6a)

Knox County has become the latest Indiana county to lift its burn ban, due to recent rains easing this summer's drought conditions. Commissioners' president Kevin Meyer announced the lifting last night; he said the decision came after consultation with Knox County Emergency Management Agency director John Streeter. The decision was approved unanimously. Knox joins Daviess and Greene Counties as the latest to lift the prohibition against

Peabody Energy has announced it will close its Air Quality Mine near Monroe City by the end of the year. The Saint Louis-based mining company says around 230 employees will be affected by the move. The workers have received an official 60-day notice of the mine's closing.

The southern Knox County mine has produced roughly 630-thousand tons of coal through the first six months of 2012. The mine opened its Monroe City operation in 1993.

The Vincennes Utilities Services board learned yesterday that insurance will be changing.

Vincennes Water Utilities general manager Kirk Bouchie said every year the company evaluates its insurance benefits, and usually everything stays the same. However this year, a few things changed. The Vincennes Water Utilities will now offer employees an 80/20 payment plan in which co-pays may increase. However, deductibles will stay the same at 500 dollars per individual. The out- of-pocket maximum will be raised 500 dollars, and the drug card co-pays will be 10, 30 and 60 dollars instead of 10, 25 and 40. The company's dental and disability companies changed to Prudential and Unim respectively, but the medical coverage stayed with Anthem.

(Vinc. Parks-- Pool update) (Thursday 9/20/12 ... tlz 6a)

The City of Vincennes is considering a smaller design as part of reconstructing the pool at Rainbow Beach. City officials say a more traditional 25-meter design is being favored, over a requested 50-meter pool.

The Vincennes Parks Board officially learned of the move last night. Parks Board director Steve Beamon says the 25-meter pool would be a better overall fit for the community. Beamon informed a group of 50-meter pool supporters about the decision. Beamon says those in favor of the larger pool understood the reasoning behind the move.

Vincennes Mayor Joe Yochum says the Gimbel-Bond site could be filled in within a couple of weeks. Yochum is impressed with the progress contractors are already making to clean and restore the site.
