Blanchard talked about his current album *Absence*, an homage to legendary saxophonist and composer Wayne Shorter, which teams his E-Collective band with the renowned Turtle Island String Quartet, all of whom were performing with Terence Blanchard at UCSD.

The second segment featured Mary Zimmerman, the Tony-winning Creator and Director of *The Notebooks of Leonardo Da Vinci*, a genre-busting play drawn entirely from Leonardo's own notebooks at The Old Globe Theatre. Zimmerman specializes in adapting classic stories of world literature for the stage. She's a 1998 MacArthur Genius grantee and a Professor of Performance Studies at Northwestern University. Zimmerman talked about her chameleon-like cast who take audiences on a journey through da Vinci's mind as he considers everything from math and engineering to philosophy and love, exploring what it truly means to be a Renaissance man.

The show's Director and NVA Executive Artistic Director Kristianne Kurner discussed the making of this play and the re-making of the New Village Arts Center in Carlsbad.

Maria spoke about her rural Midwestern roots and good fortune in being mentored as a pianist from a young age by an accomplished teacher and performer who'd moved from New York to settle in her rural Minnesota town. She shared some of the highlights of her rise to becoming a respected composer, bandleader and innovator in the early days of independent digital downloading and artist ownership of their electronic music rights. Schneider also spoke about the themes behind *Data Lords*, a double album project comprised of two distinct, yet complimentary themes inspired by the troubling changes brought about by the rise of "big data" and the antidote as she sees it to return to a more naturalistic experience of the world around us.

Levy has become a leading jazz instrumentalist based in Boston while serving on the faculty of the New England Conservatory of Music. He's also a featured member of the European-based Rick Hollander Quartet. Levy spoke about his career journey, Wayne Shorter's influence as a saxophonist and composer and previewed the music and supporting players coming to Dizzy's Jazz Club.

In the second segment, award-winning San Diego author Corey Lynn Fayman discussed his newly released fifth mystery novel following the exploits of guitar playing detective Rolly Waters. As with Fayman's previous books, *Gillespie Field Groove* is set and steeped in the unique ecosystem of the San Diego region and features a healthy and humorous dose of musical references. With *Gillespie Field Groove*, the story follows Waters' effort to track down a missing, potentially Jimi Hendrix-owned Stratocaster guitar - involving an aging rock'n'roll impresario, his trophy wife, a Russian gangster and the FBI. Corey talked about his inspiration for the novel and his explorations of San Diego's East County in his research for the story and characters.

Topic: San Diego Poet Laureate Jason Magabo Perez/Devlin's Wild Women

Description: The first segment welcomed San Diego's new Poet Laureate for 2023-2024 Jason Magabo Perez. Perez spoke about his duties as an ambassador for the arts, advocating for poetry, spoken word and literary arts on behalf of the city, plus creating original works aimed at broadening poetry audiences, inspiring critical thinking and cultivating community connections. He talked about his long career blending poetry, prose, performance, film/video, ethnography and oral history to explore Filipino American histories, colonialism, state violence, migration, memory, and intimacy. Perez also performed an excerpt from a forthcoming collection of poetry to be published soon.

The second segment featured longtime San Diego vocalist and musical theatre artist Devlin, who was bringing her New York Cabaret show *Wild Women* to Point Loma Playhouse. Originally produced and performed in New York City at Helen's and The Metropolitan Room, *Wild Women* combines jazz, blues, emotional ballads and pop songs, proving wild women do get the blues but they also have a heck of a good time along the way. Devlin talked about the making of this show in the 1990s and her desire to revive it now given her more seasoned life experience as a subtext. She described many of the songs that are featured and her work with accompanying pianist Richard James for the production.

Public Interest Issues: The role of a Poet Laureate to add reflection, purpose and human context to civic ceremonies and events. New strategies for engaging ordinary citizens in the process of writing and performing poetry that reflect the diversity of San Diego's neighborhoods and populations.
