Description: KBSI's daily local business spotlight featured an interview with Kendra Eads, representing the Southeast Missouri Network Against Sexual Violence, to promote the group's All Hallows Gala fundraising event to be held November 1st in Cape Girardeau. Funds from the event will go towards the organization's Green Bear Prevention Education Program, which works with local schools, to teach children about personal body safety and staying safe against abuse and abduction.

Description: As National Domestic Violence Month wraps up, the Cape Girardeau Safe House for Women is trying to do its part to educate kids about the signs of domestic violence. According to Safe House educator Dakota Deering, dating abuse can start as early as sixth grade, so she has begun teaching a "Safe Dates" course to middle and high school students. She says the goal is to teach them what healthy relationships look like and how to avoid dating abuse. Studies show that between three to ten million children are exposed to adult domestic violence each year. Kelly Middle School counselor Janine Mayberry says this course makes it easier to talk to students. Mr. Deering adds that many students are afraid to talk to their parents, so learning at school helps them learn more about avoiding abusive relationships.

Description: Interview with Dr. Robert Hamblin, retired professor from Southeast Missouri State University, and recently author of "Darkness Descending," a book of poetry inspired by his experiences taking care of his wife, Kay, who has been stricken with alzheimer's. He discusses some of his experiences and difficulties that he encountered as Kay's health deteriorated. He explains how the book began as a project that his wife began in an attempt to write about her experiences; but as she lost the ability to write, he took over the project. He found that writing the poems became therapeutic to help cope. Dr. Hamblin reads some of his poems for the program.

Description: Cape Girardeau, Mo., first responders are now using cellular technology to send EKG information while still at the patient's location, providing valuable time to help the patient recover from a heart attack. Cape Girardeau Fire Chief Travis Hollis says that previously they would provide a printed EKG strip when they arrived at the emergency room; but now that same information can be sent while still in the patient's living room. Dr. Steven Jaggerst, an interventional cardiologist at St. Francis Hospital says the additional 10-15 minutes that the hospital knows about the patient's condition gives them the extra time to prepare for what to do when the patient arrives at the emergency room.

Description: The Jefferson County Health Department cut the ribbon today on the newest milk depot in Southern Illinois. The facility allows mothers to donate breastmilk to NICU babies. Peer counselor Jamie Spells says she's been in the area for several years, and she's excited that the facility is finally available. Outreach Specialist Nicole Robbins says 80% of the milk will go to hospitals for babies which aren't yet able to digest formula. Ms. Robbins adds that the facility will not only make it easier to donate; but will increase the supply of breast milk. Ms. Spells says it's easy to become a donor. The mother will first have to go through blood screenings, and once they pass they are assigned a donor number.

Description: Illinois lawmakers are discussing recommendations regarding pharmacy safety following a report which found that more than half of Chicago area pharmacies that were surveyed failed to warn customers about potentially dangerous combinations of drugs. One recommendation of the report is that pharmacists be required to take more breaks. Local pharmacist Ben Calcaterra, from Logan Primary Pharmacy, says too often pharmacists find themselves going for long periods without taking for basic needs like lunch or going to the restroom. He adds that they need to take breaks not just for physical needs; but also to help relieve mental stress. A bill with these recommendations passed in the committee and will now go to the House floor.

Description: Interview with Ron Escarda, Group Director for Universal Health Services, to discuss the creation of the Southeast Behavioral Health Hospital which is expected to open in December 2020. UHS is a health care business which currently operates about 250 behavioral health facilities throughout the country. UHS will partner with Southeast Health in building the new 102-bed facility near Cape Girardeau, Mo. According to Mr. Escarda, the facility will offer state-of-the-art inpatient services to all ages, with a safe and therapeutic environment. UHS will provide educational and training services to locally employed personnel; as well as operational support resources. Mr. Escarda also discusses some of the various types of therapy programs that the facility will provide.

Description: Interview with Dr. Debbie Lee-DeStefano, Professor of Spanish Language and Culture at Southeast Missouri State University, to discuss the school's Spanish for Health Professions minor study program. She discusses how the program came from a presentation concerning the need to include linguistically and culturally competent health care, which developed into a series of classes which grew into a minor program. She discusses how although there may be a low percentage of Hispanic people in an area, there is still the need to be sure that health personnel be able to communicate with a patient whose primary language is Spanish, to make sure a correct diagnosis is made. Dr. Lee-DeStefano also talks about how part of the program involves students travelling to Ecuador to spend time learning from local medical instructors, as well as going into the rural areas of the country to experience first hand medical care for the indigenous people.

Description: The President has signed a new law which will set a national age limit of 21 to purchase all tobacco and vaping products. The intent of the law is to lower smoking rates among teenagers. Some tobacco and vaping companies have supported the new regulations, partly to avoid laws that would be more restrictive. Wardell Williams is a 20-year old who says he vapes to relax, and that he agrees partly with the new law. Fortunately for him, he'll only have to wait six months before he can legally purchase; but it will be difficult for younger people who vape as a coping mechanism. Also a smoke shop located near Southern Illinois University and serves a large number of students, say they expect a drop in sales of at least 10%; plus they added that the new law will cause a loss in tax revenue that is generated by the sale of tobacco products.

Social Sciences teacher Jamie Nash-Mayberry says that if there are floods again next year, everyone will be right back where they were because nothing is being done to prevent new flooding. High School senior Ryan Schefer says they are getting ready to move on from school; but many people have had to leave their homes with no chance of coming back. The students ask that other people who have also been affected by flooding to reach out as well by sending letters.

Ms. Metelski also discusses the Adventuring program, for coed scouts fourteen to twenty, and the Exploring program, a mentoring program which allows scouts to learn more about various careers.

Each of the three founders offer insight into their backgrounds and how they are using their own personal experiences to create positive role models for the young men, giving advice on how to communicate their feeling and how to avoid difficulties by finding ways to better use their energy for positive opportunities and achievements.

Description: Interview with Julie Hopkins, Assistive Technology Development Specialist at SADI, to discuss how the organization helps provide medical support equipment to people, including their “loan closet” which provides donated items, at no charge, such as wheelchairs and lift chairs to people who may not be financially able to get it elsewhere. Ms. Hopkins also demonstrates some new technological items that are useful to people with a disability, such as a reading pen that can scan and read out loud printed material, and a Bluetooth TV audio amplifier headphones for people with hearing difficulties. Also, her office works with Rehab Services for the Blind and Low Vision Center, where they can do an assessment of a person’s need to determine what services or equipment can help them overcome their vision difficulties.

The organization is preparing to move into new facilities, which previously had been the headquarters for the Cape Girardeau Police Department. Ms. Stickel says the new facility will give them about triple their current space, and will allow much more room to operate. One new service that will now be available is the Homeless Resource Center, which will offer aid to individuals seeking housing. Ms. Stickel says the new facility will also be helpful in expanding programs in areas such as mentoring for new parents, senior socialization, serving at-risk youth and community needs assessments. She also discusses how the organization works with local churches in providing services to those in need.

The program has also began working with Junior Achievement, in which high-school students can also learn more about creating and operating a business.

Description: This week more than 80 new businesses began as a part of Missouri's new medical marijuana industry, including some in Southeast Missouri. The state health department approved cultivation centers in Caruthersville, Chaffee and Perryville; as well as medical transport services in Butler and Cape Girardeau Counties. One of these transport services is 5th Meridian, which will provide security and skilled drivers to transport cannabis between licensed facilities and the homes of card carrying patients. 5th Meridian CEO, Michael Allen, says it's a high-risk job, so they must meet high standards of safety and security. He says they are hiring people who are used to working in dangerous situations; and the delivery trucks are GPS tracked and equipped with cameras that will constantly monitor the driver and cargo area. Allen adds that medical marijuana deliveries in Missouri will likely start in April. The state health department is expected to release a full list of all dispensaries in January.
