We treat our pets like a part of the family, and we feel that they can understand us in a way other animals cannot. 'Fruitvale Station' Recalls Real Life Drama of Oakland Man's Final Hours:
"Fruitvale Station," a new film by Ryan Coogler, tells the story of Oscar Grant: a young, black Oakland man who was shot and killed on a train platform by a Bay Area Regional Transit police officer. To battle unemployment in the Great Depression, Franklin D. Roosevelt creates the Civilian Conservation Corps, which spawns a "golden age" for the parks through major renovation projects.
