#### D. Feature Programming

- 1) How's It Growin'? Wednesdays at 11:00 a.m. (60 minutes)
  - On a weekly, basis, this gardening/outdoor program takes calls from local listeners to answer their gardening and outdoor questions.
  - February 7: Lucinda Mays, Chadron State University, discussed best practices for soil prep and maintenance, cover crops and more in Nebraska.
  - February 28: Skylar Falter, Buy Fresh Buy Local Nebraska, discussed what the nonprofit is doing to promote local growing and local food as a means of sustainability in southeast Nebraska.
  - March 14: Heather Byers, Great Plains Nursery, discussed tips and the benefits of growing and planning native Nebraska trees.
- 2) The Servative Hour, Tuesdays at 11:00 p.m. (60 minutes)
  - Normal programming on "The Servative Hour" focuses on political subjects and issues in the news – both local and national – with commentary by guests and comments from callers.
  - January 23: Discussion of recent developments in the immigration debate and what is being done in Nebraska on that front.
  - January 30: Candidate for U.S. Congress Dennis Crawford discussed his campaign and position on issues relevant this election cycle.
  - February 20: A discussion of recent gun violence and how the country and state of Nebraska are approaching the issue as it relates to public health.
  - February 27: Candidate for U.S. Congress Jessica McClure discussed her campaign and position on issues relevant this election cycle.
  - March 6: Roundtable discussion on the status of legalizing cannabis in Nebraska and the possible health and economic benefits it could have for the state.
     Featuring Jane Stanley, Nebraska's 420 Women Warriors; Christopher John Rose and Mikaela Findlee, Legal Marijuana Now Nebraska; and Edward Williams, Nebraska Veterans for Medical Marijuana.

- March 27: Discussion of and summary of campaigns of candidates for Lancaster County Treasurer, one of the most active races this election cycle.
- 3) Our Street, Mondays 6-6:30 p.m. (30 minutes)
  - The program regularly features city leaders and representative of nonprofits and other organizations to discuss issues affecting local neighborhoods.
  - January 1: Follow up on Lincoln neighborhood betterment initiatives the show first highlighted in June 2017.
  - January 26: Brie Frickenstein, UNL Lancaster County Extension discussed farm and food policy as it relates to encouraging local sustainability.
  - February 5: Featured guest speaking about the Mental Health Association of Nebraska's work with local former inmates to reduce recidivism.
  - February 26: Candidate for Lancaster Country Treasurer Allen Simpson discussed his campaign and position on issues relevant this election cycle.
  - March 5: Lonnie Burkland, assistant director of transportation for the City of Lincoln, discussed traffic flow in the city and what upcoming changes recent studies are about to bring and what drivers should be aware of.
  - March 12: Discussing the new Sunday Farmers Market in College View with Kevin Loth and Jerry Cornett
  - March 26: Candidate for Lancaster County Treasurer, Rachel Garver, discussed her campaign and position on issues relevant to this election cycle.
- 4) Lavender Hill, Sundays, 11-11:30 a.m. (30 minutes)
  - a. On a weekly basis, this program addresses a wide variety of national and local issues relevant to the LGBT community, frequently hosting local experts and guests to speak about different topics.
- 5) Community Matters, 11:30 a.m.-noon (30 minutes)
  - a. This weekly program features leaders from Lincoln's political, creative and economic communities, as well as those from across the country, engaging in conversation about how positive psychology and community participation can make Lincoln an even better place to live.
  - b. February 12: Discussing human flourishing and how it can help Lincoln become a more vital and involved community.
  - c. February 26: Rex Walton discussed the importance of literary identity for Nebraska.
- 6) Human Services Connections, Thursdays, 1 p.m.-1:30 p.m. (30 minutes)
  - a. This weekly program is produced through a partnership with the Human Services Federation, a network of 120 local nonprofit agencies. Each week, hosts interview a leader from a different nonprofit organization, to discover what they do and how listeners can take advantage of their services.
  - b. January 4: Rhonda Mattingly, executive director of Bridges to Hope, discussed the local nonprofit's work assisting the recently incarcerated to transition back to society in Lancaster County.

- c. January 17: Monica Zinke, Fresh Start Home, discussed the nonprofit's work helping women in our area invest in self-sufficiency through safe, strutctured, alcohol-free environments.
- d. January 25: Dennis Hoffman and Tammy Sassaman, with Family Service Lincoln, and the nonprofits work to provide programs and services to assist individuals and families in our community with meeting their basic needs.
- e. February 14: Guests from Legal Aid of Nebraska discussed the nonprofit's work assisting low-income and new Nebraskans navigate legal services which they could otherwise not afford.
- f. February 22: Teresa Harms, executive director of Clinic With A Heart, discussed the nonprofit clinic's work providing free medical care to low income individuals in Lincoln and talked about upcoming opportunities to access care.
- g. March 1: Discussion of mental health services available in Lincoln, especially to those with low income and other barriers, with Abbi Swatsworth and Tami Lewis-Ahrendt of Centerpointe.
- h. March 29: Learning about activities available for families and children in the Havelock neighborhood at the Northeast Family Center.

## 7) Earth to Lincoln, Tuesdays, 6-7 p.m. (60 minutes)

- a. This weekly program focuses on ecological and social justice issues with an emphasis on the Lincoln area. The program features interviews with policy makers, politicians, community leaders, nonprofits and more.
- b. February 6-27: Black History Month was marked weekly with excerpts from historic speeches by Martin Luther King Jr., Malcom X. Shirley Chisolm and others.
- c. March 13: Program about the Sandhill Cranes and their importance to the ecosystem in Nebraska.
- d. March 27: Students who participated in the March For Our Lives march in Lincoln joined the program to discuss their viewpoints of how the nation and the state are handling gun violence, especially in schools.

# 8) Sports from the Grassroots, Saturdays, 8-9 a.m. (60 minutes)

- a. The weekly program looks at sports from a social angle, examining how issues related to racism, sexism and other forms of discrimination in sports reflect our entire society.
- b. March 17: Retired NBA player, author and social activist Etan Thomas discussed his book.
- c. March 31: Author and historian Larry Lester discussed the history of African Americans in baseball and the state of race and sports today.
