[Guests: Scott Walker, Mike D'Amato] "It's Not Our Fault" That is the reaction of officials in two central Wisconsin counties being asked to pay a portion of the cost associated with last year's crash of the Milwaukee County Sheriff's Department helicopter. Two Deputies were killed when the chopper crashed in central Wisconsin while returning from a search for a fugitive cop killer from Chicago. The Milwaukee helicopter was requested by Sauk County and the search was in Juneau County. But neither of them want to pay a penny. The costs could be enormous. The family of one of the dead deputies has a big workers compensation settlement coming and the other family is planning to file a major lawsuit. Milwaukee County is self-insured meaning any payout will come from county taxpayers. There is no written agreement for any county to pay for any of the costs associated with Sheriff Lev Baldwin's helicopter. Does that mean local taxpayers should have to foot the bill, Mordecai Lee?

That's the gap in anticipated state tax revenues and planned spending. The decade long Wisconsin economic boom has allowed the legislature and former Governor Thompson to both spend like crazy and lower taxes, but a recession is looming and those coffers aren't fat with cash anymore. McCallum is telling the legislature to cut spending but won't offer any suggestions as to where. It won't be easy. By law, the state provides about two-thirds of public school costs. In addition, the usual special interest groups are already carping for more not less money. What should be done here, JJ?

The Democrats approved 300 million dollars in spending on new programs and raised another 350 million dollars in taxes. Among the components of the Democratic plan: Gutting School Choice in Milwaukee spending 100 million dollars on a new senior citizen prescription drug program. An extension and increase of the state garbage tax to pay for recycling 41 million in new spending on special education programs, merger of the Bradley Center and Milwaukee Convention Boards and 25 million dollars to buy the Pabst Brewery and convert it to a UW-M research park, something the University never even asked for. To pay for all of this, the Democrats propose a myriad of tax increases including a 22 cent a pack increase in cigarette taxes, a 100 million dollar increase in taxes on Wisconsin Corporations with out-of-state operations, a new tax on local telephone companies, a tax increase on corporations who pay high salaries to their executives, there is even a new tax on atm machines. The Republicans are still working on their version, which they will pass through the State Assembly, but it will scale back or do away with everything the Democrats came up with. Republicans will also expand school choice and charter schools while cutting state spending by 150 million dollars. The two Parties couldn't be farther apart. Is the tax and spend approach of the Democrats the face your Party wants to put on itself and its vision for the State of Wisconsin, Matt?

Almost all of the new ballpark's popping up around the country are being built in downtown areas including Pittsburgh's new stadium which features the city's skyline towering over the outfield wall. Selig says Miller Park would have been downtown except city officials never produced a workable site, pointing out the only downtown site ever produced by Mayor Norquist, a Water Street parcel, was smaller than the stadium itself, much less with parking lots. So, just who is to blame for the fact that the stadium isn't downtown, Selig, Norquist, or somebody else, Joel?
