There are several programs now at the Gilbert Godnick Senior Center in Rutland that help strengthen 'Seniors'. Shared meals are also offered and that was discussed. As the spring draws near the Center will offer several other programs to get older people in Rutland, outside and interested in moving-around and getting some fresh air. For others; The Rutland Department of Parks and Recreation is offering a wide range of programs from winter Mountain Biking to Snowshoeing. In Part two we covered all the Ice Fishing Tournaments offered Locally and how to join. We also spoke with Greg Bog at Field-Sports in Middlebury in Part 3 who called us from the Field while he was rabbit hunting in West Addison and talked about the latest outdoor products at Vermont Field Sports. 2-phone calls.

Sat 2-19-2022 Outdoors in Vermont @9am till 10 am...On today's show we discussed the ramifications of using a chemical spray to mitigate nuisance vegetation in Vermont lakes and ponds. Outdoor Guide Capt: Matt Trombley of 3rd Alarm Charters was our guest along with James Valaydaka who is also a fishing guide. Both men were on to discussed the issue. (Issue: A group of Lake Bomoseen Area property owners want to spray chemicals in front of their lake shore properties to rid the area of invasive vegetation. They claim that aquatic vegetation if not checked will reduce property values and make it more difficult to utilize their property rights relative to Lake Bomoseen.) Opponents to spraying see it as a danger to fish, animals and people if a spray is used. The lake's fresh water fishery is one of the best in the country. Bomoseen lake-front property is considered prime real estate, in Vermont. 4-calls.

Sat 2-26-2022 On the Outdoors in Vermont Show this week, we went to Week-#2 of spray or no spray in Lake Bomoseen to rid the lake of nuisance vegetation. The discussion was lively and it was informative with several calls both pro and con. We also discussed ice fishing derbies and the results of the most recent Lion's Club Derby. A 10-pound Lake Bomoseen brown trout was caught giving an indication of the health of the fishery. Bomoseen has a 3-tier fishery- with trout, bass, pike pickerel and pan-fish in the offering. 3-calls.

Sat 3-5-2022 On The Outdoors in Vermont Show we took a look and listen to people who wanted to discuss the traditions and folklore surrounding the sport of Turkey Hunting here in the state of Vermont. Morgan Govea' who is a Vermont board member for the National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF) joined the show via phone to discuss the Turkey restoration program in the State of Vermont that started in 1971 when a small flock of mature birds were released in Hubbardton and in Pawlet. Since then, the Turkey population has thrived in Vermont and has created additional hunting destination revenue for Vermont since then. 4-calls and a letter of acknowledgement were generated by this show.

Sat 3-12-2022 The Outdoors in Vermont show generated some interesting comments about the general subject of private land ownership, hunting, trapping, hiking and recreational vehicle access to the privately held land. This was a robust discussion and both sides of the issue had a chance to air their views.

Posted land is continuing to be a problem for outdoor enthusiasts who would like to gain permission to access these lands for recreation. Greg Bog our show-sponsor also joined in to mention that the store (Vermont Field Sports in Middlebury) is having a big "Spring Sale". 6-calls.

Sat 3-19-2022 The Show was set for 5-parts this week. We gave a shout-out to the Rutland Recreation Department for their summer camps for kids. There was a discussion about spray proposals now being entertained to kill weeds in Lake Bomoseen. A group of property owners has filed a spray application with the state. Opponents are protesting that proposal. Turkey season will begin soon and annual NWTF Banquets are being held to celebrate the sport. The end of ice fishing season means removing "Bob Huts" from lakes, ponds and rivers. Greg Bog was on via call-in and we discussed the trout fishing and bull-head fishing traditions in Vermont, especially in the Lake Champlain Basin as spring has officially begin in the Green Mountain State, 2-calls.

Sat 3-26-2022 This was a 4-subject show: We began with an important community meeting scheduled for Castleton University. At issue is the spraying of a chemical in near-by Lake Bomoseen to control weeds. Property owners say Yes. Fishermen and women say No.

There was also a brief discussion of late season Ice conditions and how on again-off again thawing conditions weaken the ice and can make it unsafe for recreational purposes. We had a brief discussion of hypothermia, cell-phone usage and safety gear while on the ice.

Turkey hunting was discussed, including but now exclusive to how to bag a Tom safely.

Greg Bog also joined us for a closing discussion about getting ready for the Vermont Trout season and why fly-fishing in Vermont has become so popular with women. 4-calls
