Midday, Nov 15, 2016, 11:46 AM, :20, Local:

The National Retail Federation says the average gift giver is expected to spend around \$935 on presents this year. This is the second highest year on record. People who live in Palo Alto are the season's top spenders, averaging about \$2,800 per person.

Midday, Nov 16, 2016, 11:46 AM, :17, Local:

Almost 49 million Americans will travel 50 or more miles over the holidays this year. That is the highest number in nine years. Experts say the boost is due to higher consumer confidence and lower gas prices.

Midday, Nov 4, 2016, 11:47 AM, 1:03, Local:

The United States is the first country to measure the economic impact of faith-based groups and businesses. According to a study by a Georgetown University professor, these religious groups combined to contribute \$1.2 trillion to the U.S. economy annually. Businesses like The Salvation Army bring in nearly \$310 billion. Congregations alone contribute \$418 billion.

The proposition to stop businesses from giving plastic bags to customers passed. People now need to bring their own reusable bags to carry products or pay 10 cents per bag.

Hundreds of jobs could now be heading to Fresno. Ulta Beauty could end up building an e-commerce and distribution facility. It's an industrial area in Southwest Fresno near Central and East avenues. The move is expected to create an initial 640 jobs, with the potential to expand to 1,200. The city council approved 18-million in tax rebates and other incentives for Ulta today to try to get it here. The company would also get eight-million in state tax credits. Ulta has expressed interest in the area, but no word from the company tonight.

The day after Thanksgiving isn't just the day to shop for many families. It's the time to check out some of the best holiday light displays throughout the Central Valley. And with those displays come a boom to some communities. Some light displays charge money for people to see them. And that money helps some non-profits and other businesses in the area.

Amazon is opening a new grocery store without any checkout lines. Customers check-in using an app on their phone. Shoppers then pick up the items they want and exit the store. Amazon says it can track purchases using advanced sensor technology. The first location is near Amazon's headquarters in Seattle.

If you are sending a package using the post office's ground service, it needs to be sent by today for guaranteed delivery before Christmas. The next deadline is December 20th for First Class mail. Priority mail packages need to be sent by December 21st.

Amazon delivered its first package from a drone. It took just 13 minutes from when the order was placed to the completion of the delivery. This trial is only available for a few customers near the company's British warehouse right now. Amazon expects to expand its drone delivery service to more customers next year.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 16, 2016, 10:20 PM, :16, Local:

People in Selma will be paying more for their water soon. That's because the California Public Utilities Commission approved a rate hike for Cal Water. The changes go into effect January 1, 2017. It's estimated the average residential bill will go up about \$5 per month.

Midday, Dec 19, 2016, 11:46 AM, :20, Local:

You can expect to pay a little more at the gas pump if you are planning to travel for the holidays. The national average has jumped six cents in just the past two weeks. It's now \$2.26 per gallon. In Fresno, the price of gas has remained unchanged for the past month. The average is \$2.60 per gallon.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 19, 2016, 10:09 PM, 2:08, Local:

Farmers rolled into Merced on their tractors this morning, trying to send a message to members of the state Water Resources Control Board. The board is meeting in Merced and Modesto this week, seeking input on a proposed Bay-Delta plan designed to revive the salmon population. The proposed plan would take water flowing into the valley and divert it to the delta. It would take water from the Tuolumne, Merced, and Stanislaus rivers; possibly as much as 50%, which angers farmers.

Midday, Dec 22, 2016, 11:45 AM, :20, Local:

Mortgage rates are at their highest level in more than 2.5 years. Mortgage giant Freddie Mac says the rate on a 30-year fixed rate loan jumped last week to 4.30% percent. The 15-year fixed rate is now 3.52%. Even though the rate has moved up since the Federal Reserve raised interest rates, it's still lower than what homeowners paid in January of 2014.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 22, 2016, 10:37 AM, :30, Local:

Those living in the Valley might not be able to enjoy a sweet holiday treat. There is now a shortage of egg nog. A major producer said that not enough of the product was made. That is because companies under estimated demand. It says sales are up 60% from last year. Company officials credit pumpkin-flavored products for the increase in sales.

Midday, Dec 27, 2016, 11:48 AM, :36, Local:

The National Retail Federation estimates 10% of gifts will be taken back and stores are actually tightening return policies. Stores like Macy's and Costco are reducing return periods. Items such as appliances and electronics have the strictest deadlines.

Great Day, Dec 28, 2016, 5:20 AM, 2:00, Local:

Holiday sales this year are expected to top one-trillion dollars. That is about a four-percent increase over last year. Possible reasons for the boost is that consumers remain positive about the economy, and their personal finances are doing better. Experts say retailers benefitted from Christmas falling on a Sunday because it gave consumers an extra Saturday to shop. Amazon says this was its best holiday season ever, shipping more than one-billion items worldwide.

According to the Wall Street Journal, the cost to make each one-cent penny was one and a half cents this year. This is the first time costs have gone up since 2011. The nickel also loses money when minted. The U.S. traditionally makes money when producing the quarter and the dime.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 12, 2016, 10:07 PM, :30, Local:

The Fresno Unified School District superintendent now says he will step down at the end of the school year. Michael Hanson says he'll see his contract through August 2017. He has been in at helm since 2005. In a statement the superintendent says he's grateful for the opportunity and that: "This decision did not come easy, but I am confident that we have created a solid foundation for the next leader of this amazing district." The announcement comes as the district is in the middle of a federal investigation into no-bid contracts.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 20, 2016, 10:24 PM, :32, Local:

Graduation day is still months away, but valley schools are asking families to sign up & pay for any items. We informed parents that they don't have to pay for a cap and gown, which can be more than \$250 at some schools. A California law says that the school must provide a loaner cap & gown for high-school seniors graduation ceremony for free.

Great Day, Jan 2, 2017, 6:01 AM, :28, Local:

Voters passed a bill that now brings back bilingual education in schools, but educators say it will be challenging to get bilingual teachers back in the classroom. There used to be a program to help English speakers learn other languages - like Spanish and Mandarin - about 20 years ago. It was banned for two decades in California. The goal of these bilingual programs is to help students compete globally for jobs. In other states with similar programs, teachers have been brought in on visas from overseas.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 5, 2016, 10:00 PM, 2:04, Local:

More rain is now on the way toward the Central Valley, and with it, some slightly warmer temperatures. There's also a chance that we'll see a lot of thick valley fog. We told viewers what exactly we know about the path of the storm system, and when exactly we could start to see some rain.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 12, 2016, 10:04 PM, :21, Local:

The Secata fire burning in the Sierra National Forest is still going strong. Right now it's only five percent contained. It started yesterday on the north side of Pine Flat Lake. Firefighters are using planes and a helicopter to drop fire retardants and water over it. Forest service officials say the fire has grown to more than 1,500 acres. The cause of the fire is not yet known.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 12, 2016, 10:02 PM, 1:43, Local:

The first rain is heading toward the Central Valley, and we told viewers how to prepare for it. We showed where and when the showers were expected to hit. We told viewers to watch out, because the water will raise the oil on the roads, making them slick. We told viewers to drive slowly, to replace their windshield wipers if need-be, check tire pressure, and headlights.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 13, 2016, 10:08 PM, :23, Local:

We first told you about the Secata Fire Tuesday. Since then authorities say the fire has now grown to more than 1,500 acres. Firefighters say they'll be staying on the fire lines throughout the night to try and beat back this fire. More resources and reinforcements are expected to join the battle tomorrow.

Great Day, Oct 14, 2016, 8:01 AM, :15, Local:

Firefighters are still working on that fire north of Pine Flat Lake. They have been there all night trying to get a better handle on it. The fire started Tuesday. Firefighters are calling in more reinforcements today, and will be working to put out the fire through the weekend.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 14, 2016, 10:01 P.M., 2:42, Local:

It's been months since we've seen heavy rain in the valley. Now, we've have a storm moving in. But, it's becoming less-and-less likely we'll get a good soaking. We tracked how much rain was headed to the Central Valley, and told viewers where and when it would come. We told viewers to watch out, because the water will raise the oil on the roads, making them slick. We told viewers to drive slowly, to replace their windshield wipers if need-be, check tire pressure, and headlights.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 14, 2016, 10:04 PM, :24, Local:

We told viewers that the smoke that can be seen in the valley sky could be from a wildfire still burning in the Sierra National Forest. The Sacata Fire is burning just north of Pine Flat Reservoir. Fire officials say it's grown to a little more than three-square miles, and half of it is surrounded or contained. Fire crews say it is burning in tall and dry grass. The fire started on Tuesday. No word yet on the cause.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 26, 2016, 10:00 PM, 4:47, Local:

For the first time in more than half a year, a strong storm is heading our way. That's going to mean a lot of rain in some areas in the Central Valley. We explained exactly how much rain we're expecting, told viewers where it was going to fall, and when.

Ten O'clock News, Nov 21, 2016, 10:05 PM, :38, Local:

The Central Valley got its first major storm system in a long time, but it didn't just bring rain. The Kings Canyon National Park now has a nice blanket of snow. We showed shots taken by the Kings Canyon post office where it's starting to look a lot like Christmas. According to the National Weather Service, as much as seven to ten inches of snow fell above seven-thousand feet. We also showed viewers a picture of the snow taken from on top of Yosemite's Half Dome.

The big story for us in the valley is more of that much-needed rain. We showed viewers a look at just how much rain has already fallen today and how much more is on the way.

Shaver Lake got its first major snowfall for the winter season. This storm dumped more than 10 inches of snow in parts of Shaver Lake. Just look at this winter wonderland. Shaver wasn't the only area in the higher elevations to see some snow. China Peak, which according to their website, plans on opening later this week, got more than 15 inches of new snow.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 1, 2016, 10:01 PM, 1:00, Local:

Frigid air is moving in, bringing below-freezing temperatures to many areas of the San Joaquin Valley. We told viewers about the multiple freeze watches for the valley, as well as the high-wind warning for the Sierra Nevada mountains. We also explained the factors that will be causing the wind to be so strong.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 4, 2016, 10:04 PM, 1:25, Local:

After a series of cold nights, our temperatures are now sitting where they should for early December. We told viewers what they can expect for temperature changes, and exactly how cold it's going to get in each part of the valley.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 7, 2016, 10:00 PM, 1:56, Local:

More rain is now on its way to the Central Valley right now. We told viewers that off-and-on showers may continue for several more days. We showed the latest rainfall on the Doppler Radar, and explained how much more is expected for different communities.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 9, 2016, 10:01 PM, :44, Local:

The Central Valley has a chance of more rain now that a storm will be arriving in a matter of hours. We looked at which areas could see rain, and told viewers how much rain those areas could expect.

Another big winter storm will soon be moving across the Central Valley. We told viewers which neighborhoods will be hit the hardest, and just how cold it's going to get.

It's raining hard all over the Central Valley, and now there is the potential for flooding in some areas. We warned viewers about driving on flooded streets, and to clear out the gutters around the home. We told viewers to watch out for downed power lines, and what to do to check power outages. We also told viewers to watch out for people walking on the streets, since they can be hard to see.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 14, 2016, 10:00 PM, 6:20, Local:

People in Shaver Lake are hoping a storm will bring them some much-needed snow. We explained when the storm would be hitting the various part of the valley, and said how much precipitation it's expected to drop in the valley, foothills, and mountains. We also showed other areas of the country affected by extreme cold right now.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 14, 2016, 10:13 PM, 1:32, Local:

Several earthquakes have rocked California in the last 24 hours, including a small swarm near Mammoth Lakes on the eastern side of the Sierra Nevada. There was also a magnitude 5.0 earthquake near The Geysers, west of Sacramento. We showed where today's quakes hit, and explained if it means anything in particular.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 15, 2016, 10:01 PM, 7:28, Local:

A strong storm is making its way across the valley tonight. Rain has been coming down steadily all day, but will become intense overnight. We showed what the storm did to many areas of the valley. We also explained that a building collapsed during the rain in Sanger, causing an ammonia leak. In addition, we informed people that they could install batteries into their alarm clocks as an emergency backup, in case the power goes out where they live.

Great Day, Dec 16, 2016, 8:10 AM, :22, Local:

Experts say real Christmas trees are better for the environment than fake trees. Nature conservationists say that real trees reduce the impact on climate change and give a boost to the local economy. The majority of fake trees are shipped from China and contain plastics and possible metal toxins, such as lead.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 16, 2016, 10:01 PM, 4:16, Local:

A storm that swept through the valley brought more than an inch of rain in some places. We gave rain totals, and also showed the problems the storm caused. The storm dropped rain in the valley and snow in the Sierra Nevada. We also explained that a large portion of the southern San Joaquin Valley is still in a bad drought. Most counties in our coverage area are dealing with either an "extreme" or "exceptional" drought, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor.

Temperatures in many areas of the valley will go below freezing again tonight. We showed viewers the areas that are under a hard-freeze warning. They include all of Kings County, and the western sections of both Tulare and Kern counties. The warning will be in effect until 9:00 AM

Ten O'clock News, Dec 21, 2016, 10:02 PM, 3:33, Local:

Another storm is on the way to the valley, and right before Christmas weekend. We explained when the rain & snow would start falling, which areas would be impacted, and how road & air travel would be for the holiday weekend.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 23, 2016, 10:01 AM, 1:30, Local:

A rain storm moved into the Valley and brought with it flooding to parts of Fresno. Several cars were damaged by the high water as well as two houses in central Fresno on Friday night. That same storm also brought as much as three feet of snow to parts of the mountains. Forecasters say the precipitation will help ease some of the drought affecting California but that much more is needed to help the drought in the valley.

Ten O'clock News, Dec 28, 2016, 10:00 PM, 2:11, Local:

Thousands of people on the other side of the Sierras felt the quakes just after midnight. While it shook a lot of people out of bed a Fresno State Earth and Science professor says it's nothing out of the norm. The distance from Fresno to Hawthorne, Nevada as the crow flies is 141 miles. But when two back to back 5.7 quakes shook the Eastern Sierra it didn't take long for us to feel it on the other side of the mountain and down in the valley. Another 5.5 quake hit less than an hour later. Walker Lane is a common area for earthquake activity. Erin Davis felt the rocking and shock his Christmas tree to give us an idea of the shaking involved just before 12:30 Wednesday morning. Gilbert Sierra was turning in for the night when the shaking began. Nick Foster in Lemoore says that a crack in his concrete wasn't there before the earthquake. Keith Putirka says moderate earthquakes in Hawthorne are nothing to worry about. There aren't any reports of any damage, or people being hurt.

Great Day, Dec 29, 2016, 8:52 AM, :12, Local:

2016 could be the hottest year on record. That's according to a new assessment from the World Meteorological Organization. That would mean 16 of the 17 hottest years on record have been this century. The other was in 1998.

HEALTH

Great Day, Oct 3, 2016, 7:18 AM, :22, Local:

Sammy's Milk baby food is now being recalled because it may contain a deadly bacterium. The bacteria can cause serious blood infections in infants. The Federal Drug Administration (FDA) has also found the baby food did not have the recommended amount of iron in it. People who have this baby food with expiration dates between 2016 and 2018 should return it to the store where it was purchased for a full refund. So far, there have been no reports of babies getting sick.

Midday, Oct 3, 2016, 11:47 AM, :26, Local:

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) now says more health care workers should be getting flu shots. According to the CDC, roughly one in every five American healthcare workers skip the yearly vaccination. In some cases, that number can be close to half of the workers in any given facility. CDC officials say vaccination coverage dropped 1.5% last season, with only about 40% of people getting the annual vaccine.

Great Day, Oct 4, 2016, 7:45 AM, 1:55, Local:

It is important to be aware of the risk of breast cancer in your family. Dr. Molly Sebastian says that many women are intimidated by breast self-exams. She says it is important to do them once per month to establish what normal feels like for you, that way, if something feels wrong, you will know. Dr. Sebastian recommends looking for any change in appearance, including dimpling of the skin, redness, or fluid. She also recommends feeling for changes like lumps, swelling, or soreness. The doctor says that if you find something, you should visit your doctor as soon as possible.

Great Day, Oct 5, 2016, 8:17 AM, 1:10, Local:

It's Mental Health Awareness Week. Mental health experts are using the week to spotlight mental health issues. We informed viewers about the many reasons for mental illness. We also described some of the early signs of mental health issues. Finally, we pushed users to visit our website for more information about Mental Health Awareness Week and resources for treatment.

Midday, Oct 5, 2016, 11:47 AM, :37, Local:

Botox injections may help control bladder leakage better than an implanted device. While doctors say that both treatments are effective, in head-to-head comparisons, women given Botox had fewer episodes related to an overactive bladder.

Great Day, Oct 6, 2016, 5:47 AM, 1:34, Local:

It is not too late to get your flu shot this year, and it's not too early either. Doctor Donald Clark tells his patients that getting a vaccine isn't always just about them. He says getting immunized also protects everyone around you. It is a big concern that the number of adults who get the vaccine actually went down, even though it is now recommended for everyone over the age of six months. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) estimates that if flu vaccination rates went up in all age groups, eight-hundred-thousand fewer people would get sick this season. While right now you need to get a flu shot every year to stay protected, a one-time flu shot is in the works that could come out in the next few years.

Midday, Oct 6, 2016, 11:47 AM, 1:17, Local:

Some foods, such as kale or quinoa, are not for everyone. There are alternatives to these so-called "super foods." Cabbage can be a great substitute for cauliflower, as both vegetables are known to boost immune systems and act as natural detoxifiers. Similarly, cranberries can be a good replacement for bitter goji berries.

Great Day, Oct 7, 2016, 6:16 AM, 1:15, Local:

We informed viewers about alternative activities that can provide health benefits. We told viewers about a new study that suggests volunteering helps reduce stress. We also told viewers about a separate study that shows people who cook more generally eat healthier.

Great Day, Oct 7, 2016, 9:15 AM, :19, Local:

A new report shows the price of cancer treatment drugs is rising. The study included 86 different chemotherapy medications, all covered by Medicare. Almost two-thirds received a price increase between 2010 and 2016. Eleven of the drugs doubled in price.

Great Day, Oct 11, 2016, 6:01 AM, :37, Local:

A new, international study now shows exercise and anger may lead to a heart attack. Researchers say they have found that heavy exertion while stressed or mad can triple the risk of having a heart attack within an hour. Regular exercise is a great way to beat stress, and prevent heart disease. The problem is that too many people get too little exercise. Experts say people have the greatest risk for heart attack between 6 p.m. and midnight. This study didn't look at health factors like smoking, high blood pressure or obesity. But according to the study, men around the age of 58 are the most likely to suffer from a heart attack if they exercise while mad or stressed.

Great Day, Oct 12, 2016, 5:47 AM, 1:00, Local:

Before you switch to a gluten-free diet, it is important to learn about how it can affect you. Gluten is a type of protein found in wheat, rye, and barley. The hardest thing you would have to give up is probably bread. The good news is that most grocery stores carry a wide array of gluten-free products. For example, bread that is made from rice, or potato flour. There is also gluten-free pasta made from corn. Most cookies and cakes have gluten, but hard candies are usually gluten-free. Most beers are made with Barley malt, which has gluten, but wine and liquor are usually gluten-free.

Great Day, Oct 13, 2016, 5:44 AM, :37, Local:

A new study shows that calcium supplements could be bad for your heart. The American Heart Association now says people who take calcium pills are 22-percent more likely to have plaque build-up in their arteries. Researchers looked at medical tests from almost three thousand people. They say that is how they found a link between calcium pills and plaque build-up. The researchers say they do not know why the link exists, because calcium from foods like milk and yogurt helps prevent heart disease.

Great Day, Oct 17, 2016, 5:44 AM, :19, Local:

A protein in breast milk may help protect premature babies from getting infections while in the hospital. Researchers looked at 60 premature babies who were given a protein found in breast milk. Those babies had half as many infections from their hospital stay as babies who did not get the protein. The protein also does not have any side effects. Researchers say a large scale trial is needed before this becomes standard.

Great Day, Oct 17, 2016, 6:17 AM, :25, Local:

A large waistline and type-2 diabetes may raise the risk of liver cancer. That's according to a new study. We informed viewers that these two health conditions more than double the risk of cancer. We also told viewers about the methodology of the study and how it accounted for other risk factors such as drinking, smoking and race.

Great Day, Oct 18, 2016, 5:45 AM, :34, Local:

Women may now be able to wait longer between cervical cancer screenings thanks to the HPV vaccine. Researchers say women who get the vaccine for Human Papillomavirus can now be screened every five to ten years, instead of the current recommendation of every three years. The researchers say women can now wait longer because they have a lower chance of getting this type of cancer after getting the vaccine.

Great Day, Oct 18, 2016, 9:15 AM, :31, Local:

Older women who get pregnant through fertility treatments may be less likely to have children with birth defects. Researcher looked at more than 300,000 births between 1986 and 2002 and found that six percent of naturally conceived babies had birth defects. That number dropped to below four percent for those who used fertility treatments to get pregnant. Previous studies show that these treatments actually increase birth defects. Researchers are now planning to look into how age plays a role in this risk.

Great Day, Oct 19, 2016, 6:15 AM, :34, Local:

A new study finds people who do not drink enough water may have a more difficult time shedding pounds. Experts think the reason for the finding could be that our bodies sometimes confuse thirst for hunger. We told our viewers how to identify their hydration levels by look at the color of their urine.

Great Day, Oct 19, 2016, 9:46 AM, 1:12, Local:

Researchers say that sleeping at certain times during the day can be healthier for different age groups. Adolescents tend to go to sleep later and wake up later because their bodies release melatonin later than adults. Researchers also say the best work schedule for people in their twenties and thirties reflects whether the person likes to stay up late or get up early. Deviating from a regular sleep schedule can have a negative impact on overall health. For people 40 and older, a three-day work week could be best for their health.

Some women may be more likely to experience hot flashes because of their genetics. Scientists now say they know which genes affect how much estrogen is released in a woman's body. The amount of estrogen can increase the amount of hot flashes a woman has. The researchers say they hope this discovery will lead to new treatments for symptoms related to menopause.

A diet rich in whole grains may help lower blood pressure. We informed viewers about a new study that found whole grains lowered diastolic blood pressure more than refined grains. We also told viewers about current guidelines that suggest people eat 50 grams of whole grains per day.

A growing number of children are being treated in emergency rooms for headaches. The reason for the increase is unknown. Study authors say the findings are a sign that headaches are becoming an increasing burden on patients and hospitals.

The American Academy of Pediatrics has updated its recommendation for where infants should sleep. It says infants should sleep in the same room as their parents for at least the first six months. The reason the academy gives is that it is easier to monitor the baby while it is within reach. It also is stressing that the child needs its own sleep surface though, and should not sleep in the parent's bed.

Using copper in hospital bedding may help lower infection. One hospital in Virginia is using this special bedding, and it seems to be working. Doctors say they may be able to save up to 500 more lives each year. Almost 200,000 people in the United States are now waiting for organ transplants. 82 percent of those need kidneys.

We told viewers about a new study that finds a 15% greater risk of death for people who work high demand jobs where the boss is controlling or overbearing. Dentists say that a new trend among teenagers is dangerous for their health. Do-it-yourself braces are growing more popular because of YouTube tutorial videos. Rohan Suri, a 17-year-old high school student, has invented something that, along with a special Smartphone app, can help assess the likelihood of a concussion. The application tracks the user's eye movements which may help with early diagnosis. The app costs six dollars. The device is currently being tested by a physician and two local high schools. If the test results are positive, Suri hopes to have the device available to the public by next fall.

A New study now says the T-DAP vaccine, which protects against Tetanus, Diphtheria, and Whooping Cough, is safe for pregnant women. Researchers looked at information from more than 300,000 births. They are now asking for more research to look into what can be done to help these people.

British scientists are now working on an HIV test that uses a USB stick to give a fast and accurate reading of how much of the virus is in a person's blood. Researchers say this allows patients to check their virus levels similar to the way diabetes patients check their blood sugar. They say it can be especially helpful for people who do not have easy access to their doctor. Current tests to detect HIV levels take at least three days, and involve sending a blood sample to a lab. The researchers say this technology is still in development, so it will be a while before it is ready to hit the market.

Researchers say this means doctors should keep an eye on patients with 'white coat hypertension' because they could get heart disease as they age.

More doctors are prescribing exercise for their patients. At least two medical schools are teaching students how to prescribe exercise as a way to prevent a variety of ailments. Physical activity can improve memory concentration and mood. It also helps lower blood pressure and cholesterol.

A new study shows that people with high levels of iron may have a higher risk of diabetes during pregnancy. More than 100 of the 300 women in the study had gestational diabetes. Researchers believe iron may be causing damage to cells in the pancreas.

The researchers say people may be able to lessen the effects of childhood stress by living a healthy lifestyle.

Chipotle is now being sued by three people who say the company is lying about how many calories are in its food. The chorizo burrito is specifically named in the lawsuit. The researchers say even people who quit smoking in their sixties were more than twenty percent less likely to die during the next six years, compared to people who did not quit.

Working long, 24-hour shifts could take a toll on your heart. Researchers studied 20 healthy radiologists in their 30s. Researchers say after the shifts, the group showed significant changes in blood pressure, heart rate and increased levels of the stress hormone cortisol.

A new study says that getting counseling for teenagers suffering from depression can make a significant difference and possibly stop it from returning. It found the 70% of the teenagers struggling with depression got significantly better after counseling.

Doctors say people are not washing their hands as well as they should. Most people wash their hands for just ten seconds. Washing your hands for thirty seconds instead can increase the amount of bacteria you wash off by one-thousand percent. Research shows antibacterial soap does not work any better than regular soap.

A new European study finds eating nuts every day lowers the risk of a variety of different diseases. The diseases include cancer, heart disease, respiratory conditions, diabetes and infections. Legumes, like peanuts, also lowered the risk. Experts say nuts pack a lot of fiber, protein, magnesium and polyunsaturated fats.

Stopping people younger than 18 from using tanning beds could prevent thousands of skin cancer deaths in the United States. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says people who use indoor tanning beds are exposed to ultra-violet radiation, which is a major risk factor for skin cancer. Researchers say an age restriction could prevent more than sixty thousand cases of melanoma, and nearly seven thousand melanoma related deaths. This would also mean a savings of more than 340 million dollars in cancer treatment costs.

Midday, Dec 7, 2016, 11:52 AM, :37, Local:

A new study finds that missing an hour or two of sleep can nearly double your risk of getting in a car crash the next day. The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety found a driver's sleep routine, changes in sleep schedule and the amount of sleep a driver gets can affect the likelihood of a crash. Study authors say driving with less than four hours of sleep is equal to having a blood alcohol level well above the legal limit.

There may be a new way to treat Alzheimer's disease with lights. Research with mice shows that exposure to lights that flash at a specific frequency is able to fix faulty signals to the brain, and helps the immune system fight Alzheimer's disease. The therapy is not ready to be tested on humans right now. Researchers say even if their work does not end with a new treatment for Alzheimer's, they hope it helps people understand how the brain's dedicated immune system works.

U.S. health officials are dealing with a mumps outbreak right now. According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, there are more than 2,800 cases in the country. That is the highest level in a decade. Mumps is a contagious disease caused by a virus, and is spread through saliva and mucus.

Doing yoga may help reduce blood pressure in people with hypertension. Half of the people in a study were asked to exercise and eat healthy food. The other half were also asked to add in yoga. After three-months people in the yoga group showed signs of lower blood pressure, while those in the control group did not. The researchers say people with hypertension should try doing yoga because it may help their blood pressure, and also give them a sense of well-being.

A new study finds a “feel-good” chemical in the brain is activated when people find a bargain or get a good deal on something. The “feel-good” high is even stronger when you think you’re the only one who got the deal. Experts say the feeling is related to the chemical called dopamine. When you find a bargain the reward feeling ends and people feel compelled to start the whole cycle over again.

Sunburns are responsible for thousands of expensive visits to the emergency room every year. In 2013, the total cost of sunburn-related visits was more than \$11 million. The American Medical Association says the cost could be higher, but many sunburns go unreported. Experts say the report shows the importance of teaching people about the risk of sunburns and how the long term effects can lead to skin cancer.

For the first time there are now more deaths in the United States from heroin use than gun violence. A report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says more than 33,000 people died from opioid overdoses last year. That includes both legal and illegal types of prescription painkillers. This is an overall increase of nearly 5,000 deaths from the year before, and deaths from some specific opioids rose by nearly 50 percent. These increases come during a year of high death rates across the board, causing the first decline in American life expectancy for the first time since the early 1990’s.

Researchers found babies that are exposed to secondhand marijuana smoke are taking in the main psychoactive chemical known as THC. The chemical was found in urine samples of babies in Colorado. The researchers also found that babies exposed to marijuana smoke are also more likely to be exposed to tobacco smoke too.

Fewer babies are being born chubby in the U.S. That’s according to a study of children ages two and younger who were enrolled in a government nutrition assistance program. Researchers found the rate of babies at risk of being overweight dropped from 15% to 12% over four years.

Quest Diagnostics, a company that performs medical tests, has been hacked. The company released a statement saying that hackers gained access to the personal health information of more than 34,000 people. That includes names, birthdays, phone numbers and lab results. Social security numbers, insurance information and credit card numbers are not included in the hacked information. Quest claims that anyone who had their information stolen will be notified by mail.

Statins, which are drugs meant to lower bad cholesterol, may also be able to lower a person's risk of getting Alzheimer's disease. A new study looked at more than 400,000 people over the age of 60 who are prescribed statins, and showed no signs of Alzheimer's disease. The study then kept track of how many of those people were diagnosed with Alzheimer's over the next four years. The study found people who took statins are ten percent less likely to be diagnosed with Alzheimer's than people who do not take the medication. The researchers say no specific brand of statins seemed to do any better at reducing Alzheimer's risk.

When the weather starts to get colder it may seem like a no-brainer to wear pants and a jacket, but for many parents it can be a battle to get their kids to bundle up. Experts say children of all ages need to be kept warm and dry, regardless of the temptation to leave the house with something light on. People who have never been divorced or widowed, and are in a stable marriage may have the best chance of surviving a stroke. Researchers looked at more than 2,300 stroke patients. Patients who were divorced or widowed showed a 25% higher chance of dying after a stroke than people who stayed married. Patients who divorced more than once had their death risk go up to 40%.

There may now be a way to reverse the aging process. Researchers used a process called cellular reprogramming to affect the aging process of mice. They also made human skin cells look and act young in a Petri dish. The researchers say their work shows aging may not be locked to a single direction, and with cellular programming there is a chance that it can be reversed. The researchers say it could take up to ten years for this to be tested on people.

Regularly eating cured meats like ham and salami may trigger asthma symptoms. That's according to a new French study. Researchers say cured and processed meats contain nitrates. Proposition 67 challenges the law passed by the state legislature that keeps grocery and retail stores from giving out plastic bags to carry out your purchases. The only confusing part is, a "yes" vote means you support the contested law banning plastic bags. A "no" vote means you want to overturn it. If Proposition 67 is approved California would become the first state to ban plastic single-use bags. A coalition of environmental groups and grocers is leading the "yes" campaign. The American Progressive Bag Alliance, is leading the "no" campaign to repeal Senate Bill 270. Right now, you can get plastic bags anywhere in the Central Valley. But you can't get them in San Francisco. They were banned there in 2007. Los Angeles also banned single use plastic bags and placed a ten-cent charge on paper bags. If 67 is approved, grocery stores and pharmacies would stop handing out plastic single use bags. Small grocery stores, convenience stores and liquor stores would have to follow the same rules a year later. Stores would be required to charge ten cents for recycled, compostable and reusable grocery bags.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 18, 2016, 10:07 PM, 1:52, Local:

Proposition 55 extends a tax measure approved by voters in 2012. It impacts only the wealthiest Californians who make 250-thousand dollars or more. What was billed as a temporary tax ending in 2017 would now remain on the books thru 2030. People who support Proposition 55 say the money will go to schools and the legislature can't touch it. The state's legislative analyst estimates prop 55 will raise 4 to 9 billion dollars a year from the wealthiest Californians. The legislative analyst says only about half the money from proposition 30 passed in 2012 has gone to school funding. The rest found its way into the general fund. Supporters claim it will help schools hire new teachers, prevent overcrowding, help restore arts and music. It also supports California community colleges, preventing tuition increases and making more classes available. The Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association opposes the measure because. It believes temporary should mean temporary. It says California has a balanced budget, school spending has been increased and the state still has a 2-point-7-billion-dollar surplus. Governor Brown remains neutral on Proposition 55.

It's called the California Drug Price Relief Act. Money appears to be no object when it comes to Proposition 61. The No on 61 campaign has outspent the yes campaign 7-to-1. The money difference is 109-million to 15-million. Pharmaceutical companies have waged war on 61. Proposition 61 would regulate drug prices by requiring state agencies to pay the same price that the US Department of Veteran's affairs pays for prescription drugs. In 2014 through 2015, California spent 3-point-8 billion dollars on prescription drugs. 83 percent of the amount was spent on drugs through Medi-Cal and the California public employee's retirement system better known as Calpers. State agencies negotiate drug prices with manufacturers to try and receive discounts and lower prices. But sometimes those state agencies independently negotiate prices leading to different agencies paying different prices for the same drug. Pharmaceutical companies are spending millions on billboards, TV and radio commercials to defeat proposition 61. Supporters of 61 have billboards too. They've also enlisted the help of former presidential candidate Bernie Sanders who is featured on one of their commercials. The majority of the money being spent to pass Proposition 61 comes from the Aids Healthcare Foundation.

The race for the White House is now tightening as a new Fox News poll shows Hillary Clinton is only three points ahead of Donald Trump. In one week, voters will decide if California should legalize recreational marijuana. Prop 64 would legalize the use of pot under state law for adults 21 and older. Supporters have outspent opponents by a ten to one margin. With a week to go before the election polling shows California will become the fifth state to legalize marijuana. A yes vote means adults 21 and older could legally grow, possess and use up to an ounce of marijuana. Adults could also grow as many as six plants. The state would regulate non-medical marijuana businesses and tax people who grow and sell it. The tax would be fifteen percent on retail sales. The legislative analyst predicts tax revenues could range from hundreds of millions of dollars to over a billion annually. Most of the money raised by taxes would support drug research, treatment, enforcement and afterschool programs. Marijuana is an illegal substance under federal law. Legal experts believe proposition 64 can take effect despite the conflict in law just like it has in Alaska, Colorado, Washington and Oregon. Since it would be legal criminal justice costs would be reduced by tens of millions of dollars. If it's approved people serving criminal sentences for marijuana offenses would be eligible for resentencing.

Correctional officers at the Tulare county jail will soon wear body cameras. The county received a \$100,000 federal grant. Tulare Sheriff Mike Boureaux says he wants his officers to be as transparent as possible. Deputies in the department have been wearing cameras since April.

Ten O'clock News, Oct 11, 2016, 10:03 PM, 2:20, Local:

A grandmother is grieving after her baby grandson is left in a car with the windows rolled up and dies in her care. Police say it was just after 1:30 PM when they were called to the Hunter Place apartments near Griffith and Teilman in Central Fresno. Neighbors say that's where the grandmother lives. What we do know is that the baby was in the care of his grandmother and that police say he was left in the car outside of his grandmother's apartment for at least an hour. Police say an 11-month-old baby was left in the back of a car with the windows rolled up for at least an hour. Police say even though the temperature was only 75 degrees outside, when they arrived the temperature inside the black car left in direct sunlight was much hotter. Officers say when they got there, neighbors were trying to give the baby CPR. They also had only good things to say about the baby and his grandmother. Experts say that in one hour a vehicle can heat up by 45 degrees. It hasn't been confirmed whether or not the baby died from a heat stroke.

Great Day, Oct 12, 2016, 6:00 AM, :30, Local:

Toyota is now recalling 340,000 gas-electric hybrid Prius cars. The company says there is a problem with the parking brakes. It affects Prius cars made from August 2015 through October 2016. Toyota says the parking brake can release itself, causing the brakes to stop working properly. If the car is left in any gear other than park, it can roll away. There are reports of crashes, injuries and deaths, but Toyota has not released details on those incidents.

Great Day, Oct 14, 2016, 5:19 AM, :38, Local:

Honda Motors is recalling more than 350,000 of its Civic cars because the parking brake may not work correctly. The company says a software glitch could stop the electronic parking brake from engaging. That could allow the car to roll away, and possibly hurt someone. Honda says there are no reports of any accidents, or anyone being hurt. The problem affects some of the 2016 Civic coupes and sedans. Honda will begin letting customers know next month so they can go to a dealer for a free repair.

A 17-year-old girl is on life support after an accident at Reedley College. No one has said exactly how the girl and the other person fell out of the pickup, but the girl hit her head and was very badly hurt. School psychologists were brought to the scene last night and were available to talk to students today. The girl is a high school student attending classes on campus. We're told the other student that fell out was not injured.

Great Day, Nov 17, 2016, 7:17 AM, :42, Local:

A new study shows companies that make car booster seats for kids are getting better at making them safe. The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety tested 53 new booster seats. 48 of them got the highest safety rating. When the Institute started testing seats almost a decade ago, only a quarter of the seats earned the best rating. Safety experts say kids who use booster seats are 45% less likely to be hurt in a car crash, compared to kids who only wear a seatbelt.

Ten O'clock News, Nov 19, 2016, 10:00 PM, :30, Local:

A teenager who fell out of a truck in the parking lot of the Reedley College Campus last week has died. It happened last Tuesday night. We're told the 17-year-old girl was put on life-support after hitting her head. Another teenager that fell was not hurt badly. The 17-year-old girl attends high school classes on the Reedley College campus. Investigators say they don't believe drugs or alcohol played a role in the accident and charges aren't likely to be filed against the driver.

A deadly crash on the 99 has traffic at a standstill. At least two lanes are still closed along the northbound 99 after the CHP says one person was killed in a crash. It happened just north of the 41 interchange. They say these lanes will remain closed for at least the next two hours. We told viewers that this was just one of many crashes along Fresno freeways tonight. We showed pictures of another bad crash along Freeway 168 that happened around 5:30 pm. We reminded viewers to drive slowly during the rain.

Firefighters are now mopping up after a house catches fire in Hanford. That fire started around 8:30 tonight near Douty and Fargo streets. At one point, the roof of a home lit up the sky with some very big flames. Firefighters with the Hanford fire and Kings County Fire departments did manage to get control of the flames. We told viewers that we called to get more information about the cause or damage, but no one got back to us.

Ten O'clock News, Nov 22, 2016, 10:00 PM, :20, Local:

The Fresno Fire Department is now trying to figure out what caused a gas explosion at a home in Southwest Fresno. We told viewers that when our crews arrived, we saw windows blown out, and the roof pushed outward. Firefighters say a man, who was in the process of moving out, was badly burned all over his body. He's been taken to the hospital.

Car maker Kia is now recalling some sports utility vehicles because the engines could catch on fire. The company says an electrical problem is the cause of the fires. That can lead to fire. Kia says dealers will either replace a computer, or if the problem can be solved by replacing a cover, they will do that instead.

The California Highway Patrol says someone is dead after a head-on crash west of Fresno. It happened on Shaw outside Bishop near the community of Biola. The CHP says one car was driving with its lights off and collided with another car. At least one person died and another person is very badly hurt. That person was taken to a Fresno hospital. The wreckage blocked the road for quite some time. Investigators say alcohol may be to blame.

A holster buckle appears to be what caused a Fresno County Sheriff's Deputy gun to go off, hitting him in the leg. It happened a little more than a month ago in Southeast Fresno. The eight-year veteran was treated at the hospital and was released later that same day.

The chancellor of UC Merced has now confirmed that one of the universities grad students was among those killed in the deadly warehouse fire in Oakland. Her name is Jennifer Mendiola, and she's a 5th year health psychology graduate. Her remains were positively identified as one of the fire's 36 victims. The chancellor says a moment of silence for Jennifer is being planned for the UC Merced campus at noon, December 12th in front of the library.

A man is dead after he was hit-and-killed while crossing the street near Clovis High School. Police say he was hit by a car on the corner of Barstow and Fowler in city of Clovis. The road could be shut down for several more hours.

If the wearer answers "no", or does not answer within ten seconds, the watch calls emergency contacts. It also sends its location to a dispatch team. More than one hundred officers surrounded the house, trying to negotiate with Zamora, but police say the known gang member wouldn't have it, and soon answered with gunfire, forcing police to evacuate people nearby. Tactical teams eventually had to use a bulletproof Bearcat "tank" to pump gas into the home. A search of the home with a robotic camera showed Zamora dead with a gun by his side. As of our last update, investigators say the mother has gone through two surgeries.

Both had been shot. Both women were taken to the hospital. Their current condition is unknown. We asked viewers to call police with any information on the shooting.

The hunt is on right now for a man who, sheriff's deputies say, shot six people. They're looking for Michael Vance. He's accused of killing his aunt and uncle in Oklahoma and shooting two deputies. Now, Vance is on the run, and we know he has family here in the valley. Early yesterday morning he showed up at a truck stop. This one provides overnight parking for RVs. It is said that he went up to one those RVs and demanded a ride from the driver. That was in Oklahoma, but it turns out this guy has a long history of violence that started right here in the Central Valley. Police say that man is armed fugitive Michael Vance who has been on the run since Sunday after a shootout with deputies. They say he shot and injured two of them, then stole one of their cars, before driving to an RV park and stealing another car. Deputies say he then drove to his aunt and uncle's home, killed them both and tried to cut off his uncle's head. Along with all that, Vance is also dealing with sexual abuse charges right now, involving a 15-year-old girl. Vance posted this on Facebook Live video after the shootings. The crimes he served time for in Kern County, are eerily similar to the crimes he's running from right now, except current charges obviously much worse.

A mother who kidnapped her own son in northern California has now been found along with the child. Police say the 7-year-old Henry Massey was taken on Monday. His grandmother has legal custody over the child. Authorities found the two not far from where Henry was taken. The mother had completely changed her appearance by cutting and dyeing her hair. The mother is now facing charges including kidnapping.

A man led multiple law enforcement agencies on a high-speed chase through three local counties today. It started in Fresno around 2:30 this afternoon, and came to an end after a terrifying hour-and-15-minutes later on Freeway 99 in Merced. If you were driving southbound on highway 99 today your life could have been in some real danger because a man was driving the wrong way toward Merced, all in a high-speed chase that didn't end well for 3 innocent people. The CHP says the guy was a danger from Fresno to the Madera Ranchos, into Madera, and all the way up the freeway to Merced. The driver was arrested at the scene. The three people in the car that was hit, all badly hurt, were taken to the hospital.

Thieves are now smashing their way into businesses, and snatching TV's from right off the wall. The latest one happened at a Fresno dentist office. Marketplace Smiles Dentistry has had to deal with not once, not twice, but three times in the last year or so. Now workers say it's getting expensive to replace everything each time crooks walk away with their TV's. Two crooks use a rock to smash the door at Marketplace Smiles Dentistry and rip the t-vs right from the wall. Blake Carpenter says it happened last Thursday. One TV isn't enough, just watch as one crook walks to the other side of the office and yanks another one from the wall. Carpenter says the thieves used a rock to try to break into this door first. Carpenter says the crooks tried to take the TV, but ended up breaking it. So they ran off empty handed. Now Carpenter says he's put cable wiring around the TVs to make sure the crooks can't take them if they try again. Carpenter says the security alarm went off. But he says crooks were so quick that by the time police got there they were long gone. The owner of the nail salon next door says the same thing happened to them earlier last week.

It was a terrible accident caused by a drunk, wrong-way driver on Highway 99 yesterday, investigators say. Police say James Cruz had been hiding in Fowler and Shaver Lake, before they were able to find him hiding in a Southeast Fresno home. Police say when they arrested Cruz he had several things with him that he'd been using for disguises. Police say all three could be charged with trying to kill the officer and his passenger.

Three people are in the hospital. They were shot in a Merced neighborhood this afternoon. The gunman is behind bars, but that arrest came hours after the shooting. Fresno Police says a man and a woman were grazed by bullets, after being shot at in a drive-by shooting. Investigators say that two of the bullets grazed the man's arm, and the woman's back. Both were treated at the scene. The black SUV was last seen headed toward Clovis on Freeway 168.
