NOTICE CONCERNING COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAMMING

Mon, 03, 2023 Local Mid-Hudson News • WOODSTOCK - Fines leveled at owner of company that illegally dumped thousands of tons of contaminated fill at private property. Fines are unlikely to be paid or dump cleaned as the individual is being held for unrelated manslaughter.
