An Other Theater Company launches Provo debut

The presence of RadioShack may have dwindled in Utah County in recent years, but the surprising thing to have replaced it in one of its old Provo locations may seem even less popular: a theater that doesn't flinch at producing works outside of the "family-friendly" category. But if money talks, the demand for such a theater in Provo does exist. An Other Theater Company set out to raise just under \$7,000 on Kickstarter over the summer, with the promise to produce a season of underproduced plays in Provo — plays that emphasize female and LGBTQ playwrights and characters, and that don't shy away from adult language or situations — and the company ended up raising just over \$8,000, more than \$1,000 over the goal.
