News	7:00/8:00 AM	1 Apr-21	Pfizer has announced that its COVID-19 vaccine is safe and strongly protective in kids as young as 12, a step toward possibly beginning shots in this age group before they head back to school in the fall. Most COVID-19 vaccines being rolled out are for adults, who are at higher risk from the coronavirus. Right now, Pfizer's vaccine is authorized for ages 16 and older, but vaccinating children will help schools, at least the upper grades, start to look a little more normal after months of disruption.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	1-Apr-21	Dozens of Lynchburg residents voiced concerns over a possible increase to the real estate tax. City council held a public hearing and then voted to table the topic for the time being. Council members said they'd be willing to revisit the topic at a future meeting.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	1-Apr-21	Lynchburg City Schools announced it will offer two learning options for its students in the coming school year. Starting in the fall, the first option available to students is attending school for five days of in-person learning. The second option is called the LCS virtual academy which will require completing an application. If students participate in the virtual academy, LCS said they would still have opportunities to participate in extracurricular activities at their zoned school.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30	1-Apr-21	The Corolla Wild Horse Fund in North Carolina has welcomed a new foal. Billie is its name since they are giving "B names" this year per tradition. Officials are warning residents that it is extremely important that the family is not stressed or harassed in any way.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	1-Apr-21	President Joe Biden will convene his first Cabinet meeting today, that will be used to promote his new infrastructure plan. The full Cabinet won't meet in the room that bears its name, instead assembling in the more spacious East Room to allow for social distancing. All attendees, including the president, will wear masks.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	1-Apr-21	Originally launched to help provide appointments for those 65 and older, now any adults in Phase 1a and 1b can call to make a COVID vaccine appointment. Those who are eligible to be vaccinated can now call the dedicated hotline between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. to schedule an appointment. These two health districts cover those living in Alleghany, Botetourt, Craig and Roanoke counties, as well as residents of Covington, Roanoke and Salem.

News	7:00/8:00 AM	1-Apr-21	With the March Madness basketball tournament ongoing, the Supreme court heard arguments in a case about how colleges can reward athletes who play Division I basketball and football. Under current NCAA rules, students can't be paid, and the scholarship money colleges can offer is capped. If the Supreme Court sides with the students, those caps could go away and schools could offer tens of thousands of dollars in education benefits for things such as postgraduate scholarships, tutoring, study abroad opportunities, vocational school payments.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	1-Apr-21	Movie lovers, Regal has some good news for you! After a little over a year of being closed Regal Theaters announced it's reopening its theaters in our region starting in May. Lynchburg will see its theater at River Ridge open on the 14th, with Christiansburg and Roanoke having their Regal theaters open a week later on the 21st. You will have to wear a face mask at all times, unless eating, and sit two empty seats apart from other groups to maintain social distancing.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	2-Apr-21	U.S. health officials have authorized two more over the counter COVID-19 tests that can be used at home to get rapid results. The move by the Food and Drug Administration is expected to vastly expand the availability of cheap home tests that many experts have advocated for. The home tests allow users to collect a sample themselves with a nasal swab that is then inserted into a test strip. Results are usually available in 10 to 20 minutes.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	2-Apr-21	Just in time for Easter the Cherry Blossoms are in bloom in Washington DC's Tidal Basin. So far, the crowds have been manageable and well-behaved. But the park service will be watching the area around the Jefferson Memorial to make sure social distancing can be maintained. This year you can live stream the festival, and experience 26 different sculptures painted by local artists, around the city. Residents are encouraged to track down all 26, and post the photos on social media.
News	6:00/7:00/8:00 AM	2-Apr-21	If you are a fan of drive-in movie theaters, you're in luck. One man enjoyed drive-in theaters so much as a child, he just opened up his own in Chesapeake. The land off Yadkin Road is now the new Chesapeake Family Movie Park, a drive-in movie theater. The lot fits about 100 cars, and it will cost you about \$30 per car.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	2-Apr-21	If you are looking for a unique opportunity with the Easter Bunny River Ridge Mall in Lynchburg is offering free selfies. Today and tomorrow from 11am -7pm the bunny will be in front of mission house coffee, and you can get a free goody bag as well.

News	7:00/8:00 AM	2-Apr-21	According to Governor Ralph Northam, all Virginians will be able to get a coronavirus vaccine in a little over two weeks. On April 18th all Virginians over the age of 16 will be eligible. You do still need to preregister though.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	2-Apr-21	A bill that would require school districts to offer in-person summer school that targets children at risk of academic failure due to poor virtual learning during the pandemic has passed in the North Carolina General Assembly. The bill now heads to Governor Roy Cooper's desk for consideration. While targeted to at-risk students who've struggled during the pandemic, it would be open to all families that want to participate.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	2-Apr-21	Gleaning For The World will be hosting their third collection of nonperishable foods and household supplies next week from Tuesday through Thursday, 10am until 6pm each day at Sam's Club on Wards Road in Lynchburg. All of the supplies collected will be distributed to those in need in central Virginia. They are asking for donations of boxed or canned foods, hygiene items, baby formulas and diapers, as well as household cleaning supplies and paper products.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	2-Apr-21	Several veterans' organizations worked together to honor their fallen comrades. The nonprofit organization Veterans & Athletes United partnered with the Monument Terrace Troop Rally to set up a memorial display in Lynchburg. The tribute is 28 feet wide and six feet tall, made entirely of dog tags with all the names of those who have fallen in the War on Terror.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	5-Apr-21	The Center for Disease Control and Prevention issued new coronavirus restriction guidelines. Those fully vaccinated can gather without a mask, according to health experts. However, the agency recommends those who aren't fully vaccinated, meaning two weeks since the final shot, should still stick to being around those in their own household.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	5-Apr-21	With the increasing supply of the COVID-19 vaccine, Phase 2 residents who are pre-registered in the Roanoke City & Alleghany Health Districts, Pittsylvania/Danville Health District and Southside Health Districts can now receive a vaccine starting today. The Virginia Department of Health announced it's moving into Phase 2, which is the general population, this week. Everyone still must pre-register for an appointment as walk-ins are not allowed.

News	7:00/8:00 AM	5-Apr-21	Summer is coming and that means America's Favorite Pastime, Baseball. Major League Baseball is moving the 2021 All-Star game and amateur draft from Georgia following the passage of a bill imposing voting restrictions. In a statement, the Atlanta Braves said moving the game from Georgia was not their decision or recommendation. A replacement city for the game has not yet been announced.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	5-Apr-21	Get those hummingbird feeders ready! Bird watchers have reported the first sightings of hummingbirds in Southwest Virginia as the tiny birds are making their migration back to the states. As of April 1, ruby-throated hummingbirds were spotted in Salem, and Blacksburg. Many more sightings are expected by mid-April, early May.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	5-Apr-21	A once-secret unit within the Guantanamo Bay detention center that had fallen into disrepair has been closed and the prisoners moved to another facility. The prisoners at Camp 7 were transferred to a facility next to where the other detainees on the base are held as part of an effort to increase operational efficiency. Among those held at Camp 7 were the five prisoners charged with war crimes for their alleged roles planning and providing logistical support for the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	5-Apr-21	If you want a vaccine, the City of Lynchburg is making sure you can get one. Anyone 18 or older can sign up for a shot. This week, Lynchburg announced they were opening a call center to allow you to book vaccine appointments. To schedule an appointment, you call 434-455-5889 and they will tell you what date to show up at the clinic at the Candler's Station Shopping Center to get your shot. In two weeks, the center will be open to all residents seven days a week.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	5-Apr-21	There is now a call for businesses to put a stop to the sales of fake vaccination cards. 45 attorney generals nationwide are calling on companies to prevent the spread of fraudulent cards. Following vaccination appointments, you are given a COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card to prove you've been vaccinated and to provide a reminder for when to get the second shot. Providers administering the vaccine hand these out to patients to keep. The forging of these cards and sale of forged cards violates many state laws.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	5-Apr-21	Johnson Health Center has received over \$4 million in grant funding from the American Rescue Plan Act, which officials plan to use to vaccinate individuals and overall improve the services and care it provides to the community. New mobile medical and dental units will also

			be arriving in a month or two and will be utilized in partnerships with the school systems.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	6-Apr-21	The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention finally issued the next phase of guidelines that will lead to getting cruise ships sailing again in the U.S. Cruise ships have been unable to sail in U.S. for more than a year. This next phase will include trial voyages to practice new COVID-19 operational procedures with volunteers before sailing with paying passengers. Several cruise lines have already announced they will require passengers to be fully vaccinated in order to sail.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	6-Apr-21	Coronavirus vaccines are now on the go in Danville with the help of two new buses. By creating a clinic on wheels, these two buses can administer 250 Johnson & Johnson vaccines in one day. If there are leftover vaccines, you can sign up for an appointment the day before to get a dose. The next stop will be at Cane Creek Parkway today. You can check the City's website daily to see if any appointments are available for the mobile clinics.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	6-Apr-21	Construction is already underway on the expansion of the J & J Truck Sales in Chatham. The new project will create 27 jobs in the community. Chatham beat out South Carolina to be selected as the site for a new construction.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	6-Apr-21	The Academy Center of the Arts announced their return to live, outdoor music events in Lynchburg this May after a year of event restrictions. They will be using the Pacific Life Parking Lot on 7th Street as a new outdoor venue. Guests can enjoy the concerts from their own pod, allowing up to 10 guests maximum and you are encouraged to bring blankets or camping chairs, as seating is not provided. In addition, masks will be mandatory for all guests, except when seated within their pod.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	6-Apr-21	April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, and the Evangelical Council on Abuse Prevention is seeking to bring awareness to the issue. April 25 is called Blue Sunday which is a day of prayer for victims of child abuse, and a day for ministries to commit themselves to preventing abuse and creating safe environments for the vulnerable.

News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	6-Apr-21	Health officials at Ocracoke Health Center and Engelhard Medical Center will be hosting a COVID-19 vaccination clinic this month. The event is scheduled for April 13 for patients 18 and up. No appointment is required but, anyone wishing to get a vaccine will have to be registered as a patient of the facility. They will be administering the Moderna vaccine, on a first-come, first-served basis. Ocracoke will offer vaccinations from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Engelhard will offer vaccinations from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. or until vaccines run out.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	6-Apr-21	Roanoke Fire-EMS crews responded to a hazardous materials incident yesterday. Crews were dispatched to Coulter Drive to find a 1,000-gallon cylinder containing Ammonia that leaked an unknown amount of its contents. Everyone was evacuated and no injuries were reported.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	6-Apr-21	God's Pit Crew is partnering with Martinsville Speedway and Mercy Crossing to host a Farmers to Families Food Box giveaway tomorrow. The food boxes will be distributed from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the speedway. Each box will have produce, meats, and dairy products and will be available to those living in Martinsville and Henry County.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	7-Apr-21	President Joe Biden is promoting his \$2.3 trillion infrastructure plan by asking for public support. President Biden wants the investments in roads, schools, broadband and clean energy approved by summer. Congress is now starting to draft legislation and hoping that continued public attention will create that support.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	7-Apr-21	United Airlines says it will train 5,000 pilots, including taking on applicants with no flying experience. United will take you at the beginning of your flying career and train you at its own academy, which it bought last year. Airline officials said they are now accepting applicants for United's flight academy.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	7-Apr-21	The roof of Templin Hall at Thomas Nelson Community College's Hampton campus collapsed. School officials say no injuries were reported and no one was inside at the time. Officials from the school and Virginia Community College System offices in Richmond are set to conduct an investigation into the incident. Templin Hall will remain closed until further notice along with the college's library, which shares a wall with Templin Hall.

News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	7-Apr-21	The Roanoke Valley's newest 5K requires you to roll up your sleeves, throw some gloves on and grab a garbage bag. The goal is to get everyone together to pick up trash in honor of Earth Day on April 22. When you register, you receive a reusable bag that includes trash bags, gloves, hand sanitizer and souvenirs. You can decide to run, walk or hike your miles before, during or after you pick up litter. Where you do your clean-up is also up to you. Prizes will go to the teams that fill the most trash bags. The 5K begins Saturday, April 10 and goes until the day after Earth Day, April 23.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	7-Apr-21	President Joe Biden announced that he is shaving about two weeks off his May 1 deadline for states to make all adults eligible for coronavirus vaccines. With states gradually expanding eligibility beyond such priority groups as the elderly and essential, front-line workers, the president says that every adult in the U.S. will be eligible by April 19 to be vaccinated.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	7-Apr-21	A Navy medic got into it with two individuals at a Maryland business park before fleeing to a nearby military base where he was taken out by police. One victim remains in critical condition while the second is expected to be released today.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	7-Apr-21	Southern Virginia Health's Danville Emergency Room has been approved for more than \$12 million in renovations. The funds are intended to enhance access for patients and improve emergency care for residents across Southern Virginia and Northern North Carolina. Construction is slated toward the end of this year and will include a complete overhaul of the current layout of the ER with an expansion to improve patient and staff flow, and reduce wait times.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	7-Apr-21	A fun initiative in Bedford is hoping to inspire folks to get out and enjoy all that the town and county have to offer. The Bedford Area Chamber of Commerce and Destination Bedford have teamed up for a month-long photo challenge. Each day there is a new photo prompt or theme about Bedford, like Smith Mountain Lake or the D-Day Memorial. On that day, you are encouraged to post a photo on your social media about that theme.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	8-Apr-21	China's government warned the US not to boycott next year's Winter Olympics in China after President Biden said we were talking with allies about a joint approach to handle China's human rights abuses. The U.S. State Department suggested an Olympic boycott was among the possibilities, but a senior official said a boycott has not been specifically discussed.

News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	8-Apr-21	New jobs are coming to the New River Valley. Governor Ralph Northam announced that Oransi, a veteran-owned air purification company, will invest over \$5 million to establish its first manufacturing facility on Corporate Drive, and create 101 new jobs. These jobs will focus on developing and manufacturing the company's air purifiers for consumers, businesses, and professionals in the health, dental, and medical fields.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	8-Apr-21	All North Carolinians 16 and older are now eligible for a COVID-19 vaccine. North Carolina officially moved to phase 5 yesterday, nearly two weeks ahead of President Biden's April 19 goal. Virginia will have eligibility open to all adults statewide by April 18.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	8-Apr-21	Authorities gave the all-clear at Hidden Valley Middle School in Roanoke yesterday after they said a threat made toward the school was fake. Officers responded to the school, but they didn't find anything. This is currently under investigation.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	8-Apr-21	In the United States, more than 100 million Americans have received at least one dose of a coronavirus vaccine. With each dose that is administered, the CDC and health providers give out 4-by-3-inch paper COVID-19 vaccine cards. In a post-pandemic world, these cards could help those vaccinated travel more freely. The CDC said if someone lost their vaccination card, or doesn't have a copy, they should contact their vaccination provider directly to get another. They also recommend keeping the card somewhere safe, and not posting pictures of the card on social media.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	8-Apr-21	If you're collecting unemployment compensation soon you will have to prove that you're looking for jobs to receive benefits. The weekly job search is a requirement of state and federal law, but was temporarily suspended during the pandemic. If you're currently receiving benefits, you will be notified soon of reinstatement of the requirement to apply for two jobs each week and report information about your job searches to the state.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	8-Apr-21	Accomack County Public Schools are expanding in-person learning to four days a week for hybrid students. All pre-K through 5th grade students will transition to four days on April 19, with middle and high school following on April 26. Students who chose virtual instruction will still have that option. The school board also decided to cancel this year's prom and changed guidelines to allow for one student per seat on school buses.

News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	8-Apr-21	With the weather getting warmer ticks are resurfacing and there are some things you need to be aware of. To avoid ticks, the CDC says to use registered repellents, and equally as important to know what to do if you're bitten. The first step is removal, in which you should use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible to make sure you remove the whole tick. Also, you can dispose of a live tick by putting it in alcohol, placing it in a sealed container, wrapping it tightly in tape, or flushing it.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	9-Apr-21	Seniors are still one of the top-priority groups as many are hesitant to get the vaccine. Even though supplies have increased, the number of seniors getting the vaccine has stalled. This is a growing source of concern because of the potential for preventable deaths and serious illness among seniors.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	9-Apr-21	Over 100 new jobs are coming to Wythe County. STS Group AG, a supplier of interior and exterior parts for commercial vehicles, will invest \$39 million to establish its first U.S. manufacturing operation in Wythe County's Progress Park. The new facility will supply Volvo Trucks in Pulaski County and other truck and automotive facilities throughout Southeastern and Midwest U.S. markets.
News	6:00/7:00/8:00 AM	9-Apr-21	The Virginia Beach Police Department has had to reassign 10 school resource officers away from their duties with the school division. Virginia Beach police said the reassignments are temporary and are simply happening earlier than usual ahead of summer break. Those affected officers will report back to their positions as resource officers when school resumes in the fall.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	9-Apr-21	The Small Business Administration is now offering grants for venues that closed due to the pandemic. The program offers more than \$16 billion in grants for closed venues. Eligible applicants can apply for grants equal to 45% of their revenue. The maximum grant amount for a single award is \$10 million.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	9-Apr-21	The U.S. government picked up nearly 19,000 children traveling alone across the Mexican border in March, the largest monthly number ever recorded. A complex mix of factors in the United States and Central America drove the increase. This has left the government scrambling to find space and hire staff to care for children long term until they can be placed with sponsors.

News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	9-Apr-21	The Department of Motor Vehicles said that many aren't showing up to their scheduled appointments and it's adding to wait times in Virginia. Right now appointments are necessary to accommodate required social distancing mandates. If you no longer need your appointment, the DMV is asking you to cancel it to allow time for someone else who needs it.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	9-Apr-21	Governor Ralph Northam is backing Terry McAuliffe in the race to succeed him. The Nov. 2 general election will include the governor's race, the attorney general, lieutenant governor and seats in the House of Delegates. The Democratic primary is scheduled for June 8 and republicans have opted to cut down their field at a convention on May 8 that will be held at sites across the state.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	9-Apr-21	Liberty University has announced its new campus pastor. Jonathan Falwell, current Senior Pastor at Thomas Road Baptist Church, has been named to the position. It's not clear what his role at TRBC will be moving forward.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	12-Apr-21	The CDC is tracking reactions to COVID-19 vaccines through its Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System. So far, there are close to 1,300 reports of severe reactions from the vaccines statewide. While Wake County and UNC Health put a pause to Johnson and Johnson vaccinations after more than a dozen bad reactions, the CDC said the vaccines are still safe to use.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	12-Apr-21	Honda is recalling more than 600,000 vehicles in the U.S. to replace fuel pumps that can fail, causing the engines to stall. The recall covers much of the Honda and Acura model lineup from the 2018 to 2020, including the CR-V. Owners will be notified by mail in late May and dealers will replace the fuel pumps for free.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	12-Apr-21	A memorial to enslaved workers who built the University of Virginia has been dedicated. The memorial commemorates more than 4,000 enslaved and free laborers who built and worked at the university in Charlottesville, Virginia.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	12-Apr-21	King's Dominion announced that they are reopening on May 22. The parks' water attraction, Soak City, will open the following Saturday on May 29. They will also be hiring 2,100 seasonal associates. Daily tickets and passes are now on sale.

News	7:00/8:00 AM	12-Apr-21	Both the City of Portsmouth and the Western Tidewater Health District which encompasses Suffolk, Franklin, Southampton County and Isle of Wight will be moving into Phase 2 for vaccines today. Phase 2 includes those over the age of 16 that work or reside in the respective districts. Anyone under the age of 18 must be accompanied by an adult. Appointments are required to visit clinics and those appointments can be made through the state's vaccination website.
News	6:30 7:30/8:30 AM	12-Apr-21	The Giles County Department of Social Services is in crisis and needs your help. Right now, there are only six approved foster families in Giles County, and 35 foster kids in the system. In Virginia, there are more than 5,200 kids in foster care. To learn more about becoming a foster home, contact DePaul Community Resources, or your local department of social services.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	12-Apr-21	With broadband internet expansion is a continued county priority, that was accelerated by the pandemic. Now with millions in federal funding, Campbell County looks toward a plan to deliver fiber broadband to area homes. This would bring internet access to the most remote areas of the county.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	12-Apr-21	Prince Philip's funeral will take place on Saturday at Windsor Castle in a family service that will be closed to the public. The 99-year-old duke passed away last week. Prince Harry, who stepped away from royal duties last year and now lives in California, will attend the service along with other members of the royal family. His wife, the duchess of Sussex, who is pregnant, has been advised by her doctor not to attend.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	13-Apr-21	President Biden has struck an agreement with Central American nations to temporarily send security forces to their borders in an effort to reduce immigration to the U.S. border. Mexico will maintain a deployment of about 10,000 troops, while Guatemala has sent 1,500 police and military personnel to its southern border and Honduras deployed 7000. Guatemala will also set up 12 checkpoints along the travelling route throughout their country.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	13-Apr-21	The USDA has issued a public health alert for more than 200,000 pounds of ground turkey meat over salmonella concerns. The products were produced by Plainville Brands. Consumers who have purchased these products are urged to throw them away or return them to the place of purchase.

News	7:00/8:00 AM	13-Apr-21	The weather was perfect for the VMI cadets that went out to Smith Mountain lake yesterday to learn from Firefighters how to preform water rescue missions. The cadets learned how to extinguish boat and dock fires and how to maneuver boats in the tides and wind.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	13-Apr-21	Angels of Assisi, a Roanoke nonprofit animal shelter announced that they received a \$500,000 grant from Petco Love. The money will help fund the new facility that's under construction. The new building, which is at the corner of Elm Avenue and Franklin Road, is expected to be completed the end of the year.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	13-Apr-21	If you've had a loved one pass after contracting the coronavirus, you may be eligible to receive thousands of dollars from the federal government. FEMA's COVID-19 Funeral Assistance program is now accepting applications. The program is designed to provide financial assistance for COVID-19-related funeral expenses incurred after January 20, 2020.
News	6:30/7:30/8:30 AM	13-Apr-21	The Virginia Beach Convention Center vaccination site will start allowing you to schedule an appointment in-person this week. The walk-up option is available to those who live and work in Virginia Beach from 10am-3pm, teenagers who are 16 and 17 still need a parent or guardian with them to receive the vaccine.
News	7:00/8:00 AM	13-Apr-21	Saturday marks the return of the Foot Levelers Blue Ridge Marathon. The marathon has more than 2,700 runners already registered. There is a virtual option, but the majority of those registered are competing in person.
