Through the structure, accountability, and camaraderie set in a Christian environment, Teen Challenge offers adolescents and their families constructive time and space to regroup and rediscover life, health, and well-being.
- Checking Smoke Detector: Smoke alarms should be tested weekly and batteries changed twice a year. Residents should have an alarm on every level of the home and outside every bedroom. If you would like to have

your smoke alarm checked or would like one installed and you live inside the Greensboro city limits, call our Community Affairs office at 336-574-4088

- Community Arts: David Briggs is the manager of the High Point Theatre and he talked about how the arts contribute to the local economy and the overall cultural atmosphere in our community. Having a vibrant arts community will attract more jobs and industry to area.
- Earth Day: Spend a day caring for and celebrating our planet. This event follows Greensboro Beautiful's Great American Cleanup. Begin the day there and then come to the library for the celebration, exhibits and entertainment. - Free services offered through NC Extension: The NC Cooperative extension service in Guilford county offers programs on food preperation, gardening, landscaping and more free to the public. They also available for consultation to farmers and homeowners and families on a variety of topics.
- Gardening this Spring: Hanna offered ideas for helping local residents create their own local food gardens. You don't need a large plot of land. You can actually grow your own food just on a patio.
- Hunger among children: Don Milholin is director of Out of the Garden, an organization helping to fight the problem of children and families not having enough to eat. They provide food for children during the summer months when children are out of school and on the weekends when children cannot attend school to get a good meal.
- Improving your families health: At home, you and your family can try out small changes to find what works for you like adding more veggies to favorite dishes, planning meals and cooking at home, and incorporating physical activity into time with family or friends. Schools can improve the selection of healthy food choices in cafeterias and vending machines, provide nutrition education programs and school gardens, increase school-based physical activity, and encourage parents

and caregivers to promote healthy changes at home.

- Job training: Jenny Moore is with 2nd Harvest Food Bank and she talked about the program they have started to train people to work in the food service industry in the local area. They accept people who cannot otherwise afford to learn the trade and give them a free education in learning to be a chef and operate their own restaurant or catering facility.
- Local Foods: North Carolina Cooperative Extension and many organizations and stakeholders are working with our communities to develop and expand local food systems across the state. Local Foods is a collaborative Flagship Program for the Cooperative Extension Program of NC A&T State University and the North Carolina Cooperative Extension Service of NC State University. A new Local Food web portal at localfood.ces.ncsu.edu provides information and links to resources from Cooperative Extension and other NC local food partners.
- Master Gardening Prog: Gardening is considered our nation's most popular pastime, yielding fresh fruits and vegetables for the dinner table, a cleaner environment and aesthetically pleasing landscapes. North Carolina Cooperative Extension helps gardeners learn more about new plants, native plants and environmental stewardship. Extension-trained Master Gardener volunteers are instrumental in these efforts, sharing their knowledge of plant selection, cultural practices and pest management with fellow gardeners, school students and others
- NC CoOp Ext service: Programs offered @ NC Co Op Ext office. The NC Cooperative extension service is one of the oldest in the US and helps out both urban and rural citizens in North Carolina and Guilford County.
- New Dietary Guidelines: New Dietary guidelines from Govt have just become available and details can be found through the NC CoOp Ext service website and their representative.
- Nutrition Education: Eating healthier is not only better for you, it is also easy to do with help from the new guidelines from the US government.
- Protecting your home from Radon: January is National Radon Action Month. Each year upwards to 22,000 people die from radon-induced lung cancer. Roughly 54 percent of those diagnosed with early-stage lung cancer are expected to live no more than five years after diagnosis. Radon is the odorless, colorless gas that is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States. The effects upon the families it touches can be just as devastating as lung cancer caused by smoking tobacco. The North Carolina Radon Program of the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services educates families and homeowners about radon gas, how to test for radon gas and how to lower the radon levels within a home. Lowering the radon levels in a home lowers the risk of lung cancer.
- Radon in homes: Testing your home for Radon. Radon is one of the leading causes of lung cancer and can exist in any home. Free testing

kits are available from the Guilford County health department.

- Sexually Transmitted Disease: STIs present significant issues for the health of residents of Guilford County. Rates of chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis and HIV disease are consistently higher in Guilford County than in the state as a whole and the nation. Large racial disparities exist for STIs, with African Americans experiencing rates as much as ten times that among whites. The problem of STIs is also concentrated among teens and young adults.
- Syphilis outbreak in south: Syphillis in the Triad is exploding. Most people think that with antibiotics, syphillis is no longer a problem, but they are wrong. It is very difficult to spot the symptoms and people can harbor the disease for years without knowing it. Persons at risk should get checked to see if they are infected.
- Training for Master Gardener Program Guilford Co.: To become an Extension Master Gardener volunteer in Guilford County you must submit an application and be accepted into the training program. You can request an application on-line or by phone, 336-375-5876. Applications are accepted all year, but the formal acceptance process, which includes an interview, begins in the fall and the training classes are taught during the winter. Upon acceptance into the program you will be required to complete a 15-week classroom training program (10 weeks during the winter and 5 in the fall).
- Zika Virus: The Guilford County Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health wants residents to be aware of Zika virus and measures to prevent the spread of Zika virus. Although there have been no cases of Zika virus in Guilford County or even in the state of North Carolina, Zika virus has been around since 1947 and has recently been associated with travel outside of the United States.
