in the 2013 Fetal Infant Mortality Report (FIMR.) Statewide, there was a decrease in the number of infant deaths as compared to 2012. However, both Orange and Seminole counties still have high rates of infant mortality in the African-American community. In 2013, there was a rate of 14 deaths per 1,000 live babies in Orange County and 13.5 per 1,000 live births in Seminole. Burroughs-Girardi discussed steps that the Health Department is taking to improve the odds for babies and their mothers. She spoke about the importance of healthy eating, early pre-natal care, safe sleep environments,

and addressing social needs like access to insurance.

Finally, Burroughs-Girardi gave tips for improving the health

of babies after they are born.

First, he explained that amoeba and other germs are out in fresh water and can make people sick, so swimmers might want to use nose plugs. Second, pools can also have dangers due to improperly maintained chemicals and/or 'diaper accidents.' So, pool owners should monitor the chemicals and get everyone out of the pool when necessary. Finally, he advised everyone to do what they can to prevent accidents and drowning. One key piece of advice:

never leave children in the pool unsupervised.
