The property was built in the Mayan Revival style and was originally known as the Research Studio. Artists were able to live there and experiment with new art forms. Cox explained that Smith's legacy continues because artists from across the nation are still invited to participate in residency and studio programs.

Issues: Blasewitz described the findings detailed in the newly released ALICE Report (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed.) This report, commissioned by the Heart of Florida United Way (HFUW) shows that more than 203,000 households in the tri-county area are unable to consistently afford Florida's cost of living. The data includes housing costs, transportation, childcare, and more. Blasewitz added that the data shows the federal poverty line is not an accurate description of the true scope of need.

Issues: Oakley explained that the mission of Goodwill Industries is to connect people with jobs and he reviewed some of the organization's successes in 2014. First, the non-profit increased the number of Central Floridians served at its *Job Connection Centers* – reaching 38,000 people with resources, support and training to help them find meaningful work. Second, Goodwill opened a new *Job Connection Center* in Pine Hills, providing residents with access to job resources and training. Finally, just last month Goodwill launched the *Good Source Staffing Services* program. Oakley explained that this effort will connect 250 homeless individuals with employers in 2015.

Oakley said that Goodwill Industries depends on the community to provide donations to fund their life-changing services.

Issues: Shepherd's Hope is advising everyone to get on a navigator and sign up for insurance before mid-February. Stahlman said that it is important for people to do so they are not penalized on their taxes. She also detailed the newly released insurance data which shows that out of the 50 states, Florida ranks only 41st based on the number of people who have insurance. Shepherd's Hope conducted their own survey of 1,200 patients and 20% reported that they lost their insurance during the last year, often because their work hours were cut and they couldn't afford insurance on the exchange.

The grant will allow Valencia to start training individuals for high tech manufacturing jobs within the next four years.

However, it allows people an option so they will get a needed mammogram or diabetes treatment.

She enlisted researchers to support the cause for an innovative cell treatment that became known as the *Noah Protocol* after Noah, who died in 2012. The Noah Protocol, which stands for <u>New Opportunity Advancing Hope</u>, recently received FDA approval for a Phase 1 Clinical Trial.

> Noah's Light continues to encourage supporters to fund pediatric cancer research. Until the Noah Protocol, there hadn't been a new pediatric cancer therapy in 30 years.
