The Speaker of the Ohio House says a snowstorm is the only thing which could stop an override of Governor Mike DeWine's veto of a bill banning so-called "gender affirming care."

Ohio House Speaker Jason Stephens told reporters Governor DeWine's administrative rules announced Friday on the subject did not sway members of the G-O-P. Today's session of the Ohio House is scheduled to start at two P-M.

The Ohio State Highway Patrol's St. Clairsville Post is investigating a fatal, one-vehicle crash that happened early this morning in Belmont County. Officials say 49-year-old Peter David Byers died in the crash. Troopers say Byers was traveling south on Township Road 101 when his truck veered off the edge of the road, down an embankment, and overturned into a creek. According to the OSHP, Byers was unrestrained, and alcohol is believed to have been a factor. The crash remains under investigation.

The drive is set for Jan. 22-23 at Wheeling Island Hotel-Casino-Racetrack from 11:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Donors must bring a driver's license or blood donor card. Sharon Kesselring is the executive director of the American Red Cross of the Ohio River Valley says this year's goal is to collect 160 units of blood in two days. She said that once a donor is cleared of any illness, it takes less than an hour to donate. It could take a few more minutes if you are a "power red," which means that you can give two units in one appointment. If you're unable to give blood but are willing to help, the organization is still looking for volunteers. Just visit Red Cross dot org.

The process is moving forward in the Blaine Hill Water Sewer Project in Belmont County. It would completely redo the lines extending from Blaine Hill to the Ohio Valley Mall. Commissioner Josh Meyer explained that what is now an 8-inch line will be updated to a 12-inch line. The nearly \$2 million project won't cost the county a dime. To start, \$800,000 came from Congressman Bill Johnson's Office last year, and Meyer said funding came through the OMEGA, the Appalachian Regional Commission, and also through the federal EPA. Officials will have bids open Feb. 7 for the project and then proceed after review.

Ohio launched its first homebuyer's program this week, designed to encourage home ownership in the state. It's Ohio Homebuyer Plus, a program that allows residents to open a savings account with an additional interest rate of 2.5 percent, plus an income tax reduction from the state. State Treasurer Robert Sprague said a resident can deposit anywhere from \$100 to \$100,000 in one of these savings accounts and you can keep that money for up to 5 years. If the individual doesn't use the money toward the down payment or closing cost of a home within those 5 years, they are no longer eligible for the program and will have to pay back the reported income tax. The only other parameters for the account are you must be 18 or older and a resident of Ohio. The maximum the account can hold is \$100,000. The program is available to a growing number of certain financial institutes.

On Wednesday, the city of Wheeling is set to start its efforts to bulldozing homeless camps on public property. This comes two weeks after the postponement given by the city manager's office to provide people with ample notice. Just two days from the start date, homeless advocates are urging city council to halt the implementation of the camping ban. Monday morning, a letter was constructed by over 30 homeless outreach service providers requesting a suspension. The letter states that there are flaws in the ban and says it will place more barriers on the fight to end homelessness. The letter sent to council also addresses several gaps in the ban. According to those who signed the letter, some of those gaps include obtaining land, identifying and procuring finances, and building the camp and facilities. In addition to the letter, the group is encouraging citizens to come and speak at the upcoming council meeting on Tuesday. They have also launched an online petition for the public to join their voices.

Wellsburg swore in three new police officers on Monday - Richard Reinard, Kaylin Ferguson and Danny Casto. One was hired as a full-time officer and the other two as part-time officers. During his tenure as Mayor unemployment has fallen in the Wheeling area from 6.6% in 2016 to 3.8% at the end of 2023. The Mayor says one of his key accomplishments has been his collaboration with the West Virginia Division of Highways and the U.S. Department of Transportation on a \$33 million project to replace the entire streetscape on Main and Market Streets in downtown Wheeling.

The City of Wheeling faces a deadline from the West Virginia branch of the A-C-L-U... which has threatened to sue the city if it tries to enforce a ban on camping on public property in the city.

In a letter made public Monday... over two dozen homeless service agencies and public interest groups asked the city to pause enforcement of the ban... until the city establishes a managed camp. No site has yet been identified for that managed camp... and city officials say local agencies and faith-based groups would have to do the operations and managing.

Ohio Republican Governor Mike DeWine wants state lawmakers to ban the sale of so-called "Delta-8 THC." Advocates of "Delta-8 THC" – a less powerful version of Delta-9 THC, treated as regular marijuana, with both made in the production of C-B-D items – say the substance helps with chronic health issues. The nation's largest retailer plans to roll out A-I tech to warehouse club check-outs by the end of the year. Matt Murphy reports.

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Across nine different categories, the 2023 Wheeling Fire Department's total incident report was down by 10 percent from 2022, with a drop in all categories ranging from EMS, fire service and weather calls leading to this reduction. Wheeling Fire Chief Jim Blazier said that 2024 started off with several runs, but he thinks it will be another normal year after the spike in incidents from 2022. This year, the department will be doing significant internet upgrades to all fire stations and accept the delivery of a new rescue truck in the fall. The department also anticipates the completion and opening of its new headquarters, located at the corner of 17th and Wood Streets in East Wheeling sometime this spring.

A Marshall County woman whose car went into Big Grave Creek on Wednesday afternoon, apparently climbed onto the roof of the vehicle when it started to take on water. The woman was rescued from the roof of the car by first responders. Authorities say the woman said she drives across the creek regularly, and had driven across it on Wednesday morning. Apparently by Wednesday afternoon the water level had changed.

A railroad worker was killed early Wednesday morning in Jewett. According to Harrison County Sheriff Joe Myers, the victim was found Wednesday morning when more employees arrived and discovered the male victim. The incident is now being handled by the coroner, who will work to determine the cause of death.

The Veterans Memorial Bridge connecting U.S. Route 22 over the Ohio River between Ohio and West Virginia was reopened on the westbound side to all three lanes of traffic as construction barrels have been removed. Weirton Police Chief Charlie Kush said just because the bridge is no longer an active work zone it doesn't mean that drivers will be seeing fewer patrols or officers. The traffic changes in downtown Steubenville are a concern that city leaders have been evaluating and working to learn more about as the future of the Market Street Bridge remains uncertain.

The City of Wheeling began to bulldoze homeless camps just after 10:15 am on Thursday, and in response, the American Civil Liberties Union of West Virginia (ACLU-WV) has filed an emergency request for a temporary restraining order against the City of Wheeling. Many of these individuals stay at the Life Hub Winter Shelter, and were still there at 7 or 8 a.m. when the first warning was given that the bulldozer would be back at 10. Now, despite hopes about a temporary injunction, the camp is being torn out. The ACLU filed a lawsuit Tuesday evening to block Wheeling's habitation ban, which criminalizes being homeless in public. ACLU-WV previously gave the city four days to reconsider enforcement of the ban, which took effect on Jan. 1. Wheeling Council met on Tuesday night to approve the camping ban.

The city of Steubenville has partnered with a company that offers a voluntary program for Steubenville homeowners, if it fits their needs. The partnership is with the Service Line Warranty Program which aims to educate and assist homeowners with their lateral water and sewer line responsibilities. Account Manager Christopher Rebar said it lets homeowners know what they're responsible for within the communities with their lateral water, lateral sewer lines, but also their interior plumping and drainage for their homes. Three different protection programs -- all optional -- are being offered to Steubenville residents. The water service line program, which deals from the main line to the home, the sewer service line program, which is from the home to the sewer main, and the interior plumbing and drainage program, which is for any of the pipes that are within the house. Residents can choose one, two or all three programs. If a program fits your needs, there are a couple of options for payments with no deductible as long as homeowners stay under the coverage caps. They can also pay for the program monthly, quarterly, or annually. Informational mailers have been sent out to residents.

An Ohio County legislator is looking to pass through Raylee's Law, which would prevent people who have an open CPS case from homeschooling children. Delegate Shawn Fluharty's bill has gained national attention. Raylee Browning died in 2018 of abuse and neglect after she was taken out of school by her father following a teacher's report under mandatory reporting requirements. Fluharty said the move was part of a small loophole that he says needs to be closed. Raylee's law says if you are facing an investigation for child abuse or that you've been convicted of child abuse, you cannot take your child out of public school and home school them behind closed doors, so nobody can see what's going on, which happened in Raylee's situation. The bill was introduced in 2019 and has generated heated debate since then. Fluharty said he hopes 2024 is the year it finally gets passed through.



New details have been released after a Wheeling Park teacher was relieved of his duties. Former Wheeling Park teacher Micah Kovacs Farmer of Wheeling was arrested and arraigned this week on a felony charge of sexual abuse of a minor 16 years or older by a parent, guardian, or custodian. According to a criminal complaint, Farmer was told to avoid any contact with the victim and to avoid any private interaction with the victim on December 15. Farmer is out on a \$5,000 bond. If convicted, Farmer could face jail time of no less than 1 year and no more than 5 years. The West Virginia State Police is investigating this case.
